That he had a few drinks with some friends, and that he took the wheel, on a dare from his friends, was the excuse given by Russell Bell, a young man, when before Magistrate Farrel, Wednesday morning, charged with the theft of a bicycle, owned by William Jackson, of the Jackson street police, and brought back to Kingston Tuesday night by Constable Samuel Ansel. The wheel was also recovered.

D. A. Givens appeared for Bell and asked for leniency on the ground that the accused had never been in trouble before, and had a wife and two children. He had been taking a few drinks with his friends and had been dared to take the wheel. The wheel was on the curb, on Wellington street, and Bell jumped on it and rode away to Napanee, and later went to Toronto.

After getting away Bell realized what he had done and repented, although he was afraid of being the wheel back to the owner. Bell spoke a few words in his own behalf, asking for a chance on account of his wife and family. The magistrate remarked that it was another case of the innocent having to suffer, but allowed the accused to go on suspended sentence. Bell will make good the expense incurred in his arrest.

**THE FIRE COMMITTEE**

Met on Tuesday Afternoon—Report of Chief Armstrong.

A meeting of the Civic Fire committee was held on Tuesday afternoon, with Aids Fair (chairman), Bailey, Stroud, McCarthy and Sutherland in attendance. Chief Armstrong reported that only \$262.48 remains at the credit of the committee. The appropriation, together with the amount received from the sale of a horse, amounted to \$4,266.41.

Up to October 1st the fire department has responded to seventy-three calls, which is nine more than at the same time last year. Recently, the elevators of the Montreal Transportation company and James Richardson & Sons have been connected with fire station No. 1 by private telephones.

The chief reported that the invitation to the city to the Provincial Fire Chiefs' Association, to meet in Kingston in 1913, was accepted.

**RINK STOCK PAID WELL.**

Shareholders Received \$420 For Every \$100 Invested.

A meeting of the shareholders of the Kingston Skating and Curling Rink Association was held on Tuesday afternoon, to receive a statement of the company's affairs. The property, consisting of the buildings of the skating and curling rinks, having been sold to Queen's University, getting further was required to be done except divide the assets of the company and wind it up.

A detailed statement was submitted showing assets on hand of \$81,299.70 which being divided amongst the present holders of stock, gave each one \$420 for every \$100 of stock. The principal stockholders were Richardson & Sons, J. B. Walker, K.C., J. R. Caruthers, W. H. Macnee, F. C. Ireland and M. E. Flanagan.
