ACQUITTED ON CHARGE THE R.C.H.A. SPORTS

OF HAVING MURDERED A KINGSTON MAN.

Jury at Sandwich Returned Verdict of "Not Guilty" in Case of William Dalgon, Accused of Causing Death of Thomas Mills—Jury Out But Fifteen Minutes.

At Sandwich, a jury returned a verdict of "not guilty" in the case of William Dalgon, (colored) who was charged with the murder of Thomas ("Tucker") Mills, of Kingston.

It will be remembered, that Mills was found dead in the yards of the Michigan Central Railway, at Windsor, on Sept. 16th last. An investigation followed, and some time later Dalgon was rounded up at Chicago, on a charge of having murdered Mills.



AT THE POLICE COURT.
