ACQUITTED ON CHARGE OF HAVING MURDERED A KINGSTON MAN.

THE R.C.H.A. SPORTS WERE A SUCCESS ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Jury at Sandwich Returned Verdict of "Not Guilty" in Case of William Dalgon, Accused of Causing Death of Thomas Mills— Jury Out But Fifteen Minutes.

At Sandwich, a jury returned a verdict of "not guilty" in the case of William Dalgon, (colored) who was charged with the murder of Thomas ("Tucker") Mills, of Kingston. It will be remembered, that Mills was found dead in the yards of the Michigan Central Railway, at Windsor, on Sept. 16th last. An investigation followed, and some time later Dalgon was rounded up at Chicago, on a charge of having murdered Mills.

A despatch from Sandwich states that the jury was out but fifteen minutes, when they returned a verdict acquitting the accused. The prisoner broke down and wept, when he heard the result. Mills was a well known Kingstonian, and lived here for many years.

PREMIER BORDEN TO SPEAK

At Queen's University Fall Convocation on 10th October.

The Right Hon. R. L. Borden, premier of Canada, has accepted an invitation of the exec. of Queen's, to be present and deliver an address at the annual fall convocation of the university in Grant hall, on the evening of October 10th, that day being known as university day. Premier Borden is



an honor graduate of Queen's, having had that honor conferred upon him on the occasion of the installation of Principal Gordon, nine years ago. Sir Sandford Fleming, chancellor, will preside at this convocation, and the degrees awarded as a result of the supplemental examinations will be conferred. On the same evening, the formal opening of the Nicol mining and metallurgy building will take place. Arrangements for the ceremonies are not yet complete.

COULD GET NO TERMS.

Students Going to the East and West Must Pay.

Last spring the railway companies issued orders declining to grant any special rates to students coming from the far east and far west to attend college or teaching at those points during the vacation. The college authorities sought to have the order rescinded and appealed before the railway commission in connection with the matter. The authorities then sought to have all those who had registered up to last year allowed a special rate, but this also was declined.
