DRUNK IN THEIR HOME

AGED MOTHER AND HER SON WERE ARRESTED.

There Was Danger of a Fire—The Son Fined, and the Mother Was Sent to the Home for the Aged.

An awful instance of the ruin of a home caused by drink was brought to the notice of the police on Sunday afternoon when a chimney was noticed to be on fire. The fire was noticed by neighbors and the firemen after trying all the houses in the row, found them all right but one, and the door of the one locked. They forced the door and found the house in a state of disorder and the two occupants, William Keiso and his mother, both drunk. The fire had been neglected and was blazing away to the great danger of the house and all the houses in the row. The fire was extinguished and the indignation neighbors called the police.

Keiso lay on his back dead drunk and his mother, herself dazed with drink, sat on a sofa with her clothes half torn off and bearing the marks of abuse on her head and shoulders. The neighbors complained that they had been fighting all night, and Sunday morning. Policemen Timmerman and McAdoo took the man down after a short struggle and the mother was also removed in a cab and the care of Policeman Mullinger. The neighbors complained that the place is a regular bedlam and the drunken rows are not only a disgrace to the community but an injustice to the neighborhood.

At Police Court.

Keiso and his mother had sobered up sufficiently to face Magistrate Farrell in the police court on Monday morning. The son was given \$5 and costs or one month for his "blow out" on Sunday and his aged mother was sent to the Home for the Aged for the present, on remand. William pleaded guilty to the charge of being drunk in his house. "And you thought you would have a little fire this time," questioned the cad. "I heard there was," he answered, "but I didn't see any fire in my house. It must have been next door."

"No, I guess you did not," said the magistrate, "all you see is fire-water."

Keiso asked for a chance, but the magistrate told him that from information by neighbors he and his mother habitually "went out on these times." And, also, if it hadn't been for Mayor Hoag and some neighbors, they would have been burned up.

Mrs. Keiso, ragged with black and blue marks on her wrinkled face, when asked by the magistrate whether she knew that she had been drunk, informed the court that "We never know just what will happen in this world." She revolted at the idea of going to the Home for the Aged, saying that as long as she could she would work for her living. The magistrate was of the opinion that she enjoyed her "blow-outs" more than work. She was driven to her new home shortly after court.

MOVEMENT OF THE AGE

IS TOWARDS DEMOCRACY IN RELIGION.

Sermon on "The New Protestantism and the New Age" by the First Congregational Church Pastor.

On Sunday evening in the First Congregational church, the pastor, Rev. Lefroy Rice gave the first of a series of Sunday evening addresses on "The New Protestantism and the New Age." The speaker said that by way of protest he desired to say something about the weakness and strength of Romanism. "If our Protestantism is to be a vital force in this new age it must embrace all that is noble and true in the past. It is just possible," said the speaker, "that our Protestantism has not a monopoly of truth." Continuing he said: "It is not for destructive purposes, but rather for constructive ends, that to-night I speak of the weakness of Romanism. We cannot close our eyes to certain dangerous tendencies on the part of the ultramontane element in the Roman church. The first is to rest absolute and unconditional authority in the Pope. To pretend to an independent judgment in morals and religion is for the Roman Catholic to commit treason against the church. The second dangerous tendency is the confusion of religion with politics, and the insistence that the church has governmental power. The effort to make the state subordinate to the church and to declare that ecclesiastical law has precedence over civil law must inevitably interfere with civil loyalty. When ecclesiastical law conflicts with state law the Roman Catholic must obey the ecclesiastical law, and hence civil loyalty is interfered with."

The last notable tendency on the part of this ultra-conservative element in the Roman church is to put the bias upon science and liberal education. Rome distrusts the enlightened intellect. In the province of Quebec she has contested every advance toward a more thorough and liberal education. Rome knows full well that there are aspirations in her religion which will not pass muster at the bar of reason."

In summing up the preacher said: "Our Protestantism, if it is to meet the needs of this new age, an age which rebels against force and coercion, but which recognizes the inner law, must rest its authority upon the enlightened conscience of the individual and not in the hands of a bishop or pope. The great movement of the age is towards democracy in religion as well as in politics, but the tendency of the Church of Rome is towards an absolute ecclesiastical monarchy. The rising rebellion against this superstitious authority will be one of the strongest forces for the disintegration of the Roman church unless in the providence of God reforms come from within and come quickly, but I fail to see how this is possible when the church is excommunicating her would-be reformers. The policy of the Roman church prohibits reform."
