LOCAL GREEKS READY SHOULD WAR BE DECLARED AGAINST TURKEY.
 Have Been Notified That Volunteers Are Wanted and Will Respond—Grecian Government to Furnish Transportation From New York.
 Should war be declared, against Turkey, there are a number of Greeks in Kingston, who are ready to take up arms, and fight for their country.
 Local Greeks have been notified that volunteers are wanted, and the Whig was informed to-day, that a number would respond to the call. The present serious conditions in south-eastern Europe have become so acute, that the Greeks in America have received word to prepare themselves to help their mother country, in case that war should be declared with Turkey.
 Kingston Greeks are watching events with keen interest. They are being kept informed of the situation by means of a Greek newspaper, which is published in New York. At the present time, the reserves of the Grecian army are mobilizing along the frontiers, and those in other countries are preparing to leave for their mother country, on a moment's notice.
 A number of Greek papers, giving an account of the situation, have been received in Kingston, during the last few days. In one of the papers there is a notice, requesting all those who wish to go to the aid of their native land, to prepare for a trip to Greece. The Greek consul, in New York, has received notices from Athens, informing him that the situation is very acute.
 It is expected that a large number will go from Toronto and Montreal, as in both places, there is quite a large Greek population. They will meet in New York, and take passage on a steamer for Greece. All those who decide to go, will have to pay their expenses as far as New York, but when they reach there, they will embark on a steamer provided by the government, at Athens.
 It is stated that over ninety per cent. of the Greeks in America, had, at least, two years' experience in military training before leaving home, for it is compulsory in Greece, for all males, when they reach the age of twenty-one, to serve a term of two years in the militia.

SHUN DRINK IS ADVICE GIVEN BETHEL YOUNG MEN BY A. W. WHEATLEY.
 A Banquet Held on Monday Evening in Honor of the Champion Baseball Team—Bethel Girls Lovelier Than Flowers.
 On Monday evening about sixty men, young and old, sat down to supper in the Sunday school room of Bethel church, the gathering being two-fold, in that it was meant to further fellowship among the men of the church, as well as honor to the Bethel baseball team on its second winning of the Richardson trophy in the S.S.A.A.A. baseball league. The tables were laden with good things which had been prepared by the ladies of the church and the company sat down at 7.30 o'clock. At 8.30 the second part of the programme commenced which consisted of the presentation and speeches.
 J. R. Forster, president of the S.S. A.A.A., presented the cup to Bethel team, Captain George Holland making a suitable reply. After the presentation, the young ladies presented the captain with a lovely bouquet as a mark of their appreciation and Mr. Holland replied thanking the ladies for their kindness, saying he considered the flowers lovely, but thought the Bethel girls lovelier.
 The pastor, Rev. A. P. Mershon, who acted as chairman, then called upon A. W. Wheatley, manager of the Canadian Locomotive company and introduced him as the speaker of the evening. Mr. Wheatley, in his opening remarks, complimented the boys on their victory telling them he was somewhat of a baseball fan himself. "One thing I know," said the speaker, "and that is that baseball and drink do not go hand in hand. Strong drink and excessive smoking clog and injure the brain, and if there is any line of sport where a player needs a clear brain for quick thinking, it is in baseball. Shun drink as you would shun leprosy, for we must beware of selfishness, for when we are flushed with success we are apt to neglect helping someone else less fortunate than ourselves."

MANDAMUS REFUSED.
 Escapes Further Trial—on Alleged Breach of Law.
 A. J. Amiro, Nanawau, was convicted on a charge of an offence under the Motor Vehicles Act in not stopping when a farmer with a restless horse signalled him to do so. He was fined \$10, the buggy having been overturned into the ditch and the horse having broken loose.
 Amiro appealed, and the county judge of Frontenac, without going in to the merits, allowed the appeal on the ground that the information was defective. Later the judge agreed with the parties to re-open the matter and to try it again if a mandamus was secured authorizing him to do so. Justice Riddell, of Opechee Hall, has given judgment refusing to grant a mandamus.
