TICKET SALE STOPPED

TILL OFFICIALS ARE SELECTED
FOR THE GAME.

Ottawa College Calls a Halt—Father
Stanton Complains That the Other
College Teams Act as Bullies.

An Ottawa despatch says: Pending
the selection of officials for Sat-
urday's big football struggle at
Varsity oval between University of
Toronto and Ottawa College, the sale
of seats has been stopped. Father
Stanton, of the local university, com-
ing forth with a statement, last
evening, that Ottawa College would
sacrifice Saturday's gate receipts ra-
ther than have another exhibition at
Varsity oval similar to that of Sat-
urday last. The reverend coach fur-
ther stated that unless the Intercol-
legiate clubs would give Ottawa Col-
lege more consideration regarding of-
ficials than they have done in the
past, there would be no game on Sat-
urday. "They are trying to work
the usual game on us regarding of-
ficials as in the case each fall. Uni-
versity of Toronto have refused such
notable football authorities for Sat-
urday's struggle as McMaster, Pul-
ford, (Maney, Phillips, Ryan and Wil-
lams. They have also refused to
accept our proposition that they
bring two Toronto men down with
them under the conditions that we
take two Ottawa officials to Toron-
to when we play there. Another pro-
position turned down by the Toronto
club was that one Toronto and one
Ottawa man be selected. All three
of our propositions were refused, the
Toronto university putting the selec-
tion into the hands of Graham Ross
of McGill."

Queen vs. McGill.

Queen's association team will play
its first game in Montreal on Sat-
urday. The local team is in good shape
and with a few days' practice should
make a good showing. Out of last
year's team all will be back, with the
exception of about four, and their
places will be filled by a number of
players who have entered the college
this season.

FATE OF JOSHUA LEACH.

Fell Off a Scow Near Trenton and
Was Drowned.

Joshua Leach, who resided at 31
Johnson street, Kingston, met an un-
timely end near Trenton, on Monday
afternoon, when he fell off a scow and
was drowned. He was engaged in
working on a dredge owned by the
Randolph Macdonald Dredging com-
pany, who have the contract of doing
some work in that vicinity. The point
where the accident occurred is just
near the entrance of the Murray can-
al. He had been working on the
scow, which is used in doing the work
in connection with the dredging and
when the boat arrived back in the
evening, it was noticed that he was
missing, so a party immediately left
and made a search and the body was
later recovered.
The deceased only left the city a
few weeks ago, and the news of his
death came as a great shock. The
remains arrived in the city on Wednes-
day afternoon and were taken charge
of by S. S. Corbett, and later remov-
ed to his late home.

IN MILITARY CIRCLES.

Nine Army Service Corps May
Mobilize at Barriefield.

Efforts are being made to have a
camp for eight or nine volunteer Army
Service Corps, next summer, and it is
understood that the mobilization will
take place at Barriefield. This will be
before the regular militia infantry
camp, No. 3 company, A.S.C., under
Maj. G. H. Gillespie, is the one which
has acted at the Barriefield camp for
some years, and in all appearances
1,000 men would be under canvas at
the time. Enough officers and men of
the permanent Army Service Corps
would attend to take charge of the
schemes that would be worked out.
Maj. J. Hamilton, quartermaster,
R.C.H.A., has been granted leave from
October 29th to November 17th.
Lieut. H. T. Whitley, 23rd battery,
C.F.A., has been granted three
months' leave to attend college in
Montreal.
Sergeant Maj. W. G. Bailey, C.M.S.C.,
is on furlough.

Sportsmen Are Worried.

Local sportsmen were very much
worried over a report sent out from
St. Catharines, by Dr. Jessop, M.P.P.,
to the effect that the Ontario govern-
ment, by a recent order-in-council, has
prohibited the killing of pheasants and
Hungarian partridges this year.
The local game inspector, James An-
grove, stated that he had received no
word of the new regulation as yet.
The game laws of 1912 state that
no person may hunt, take, kill or de-
stroy "any grouse, pidgeon, prairie
fowl or partridge, except from the
15th day of October, to the 15th day
of November, in any year, both days
exclusive, but no person shall take or
kill more than ten partridges in any
one day."
The new law for the protection
of pheasants and Hungarian parti-
tridges applies only in Welland and
Lincoln counties. The impunity
with which these birds were slaugh-
tered since the prohibitory meas-
ures for their protection was with-
drawn in 1910, has resulted in the
new order. This law has no refer-
ence whatever to the Kingston dis-
trict.

WEIGHING OF CHEESE.

Island Cheese Maker Gives His
Views on the Question.

Kingston, Oct. 9.—(To the Ed-
itor):—In your issue of Oct. 5th, I
was amused to find written by a
supposed cheese maker, an item, re-
lating to the weighing of cheese. I must con-
fess, I cannot agree with his
marks, even if he has had fourteen
years' experience, which I doubt
very much. I really think by the
tone of his letter his ideas of
cheese making are very frail and his
1 1/2 pound per box all hush. I am
a maker of twenty-five years expe-
rience and had short weights only
twice and both times my scales were
out. I always make it a point to
allow half a pound up beam, on
each cheese. I consider this only a
trifle on cheese five days old, which
I have been in the habit of sending
out all the past season. The patrons
will bear me out, in this, the cheese
being inspected, weighed and paid
for on the spot. We can make our
books up on it about the seventh
day of the month and having made
many trips from different sales-
men and makers, they all bear out
what I say. There are no griev-
ances whatever, in this Kingston
district, or in any other where in-
vestigated, and it will be hard to
"dope" the farmer or make him
believe that he is not getting jus-
tice, especially those who had some
experience, as salesmen, are posted.
Let the agitator prescribe for him-
self. I hope he knows more about
it than the weighing of cheese.
