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### W. T. STEAD APPEARED AT A SEANCE HELD AT HIS LATE HOME.

His Daughter and Others Declare That He Appeared to Them in Visible Form—Hold That He Still Lives.

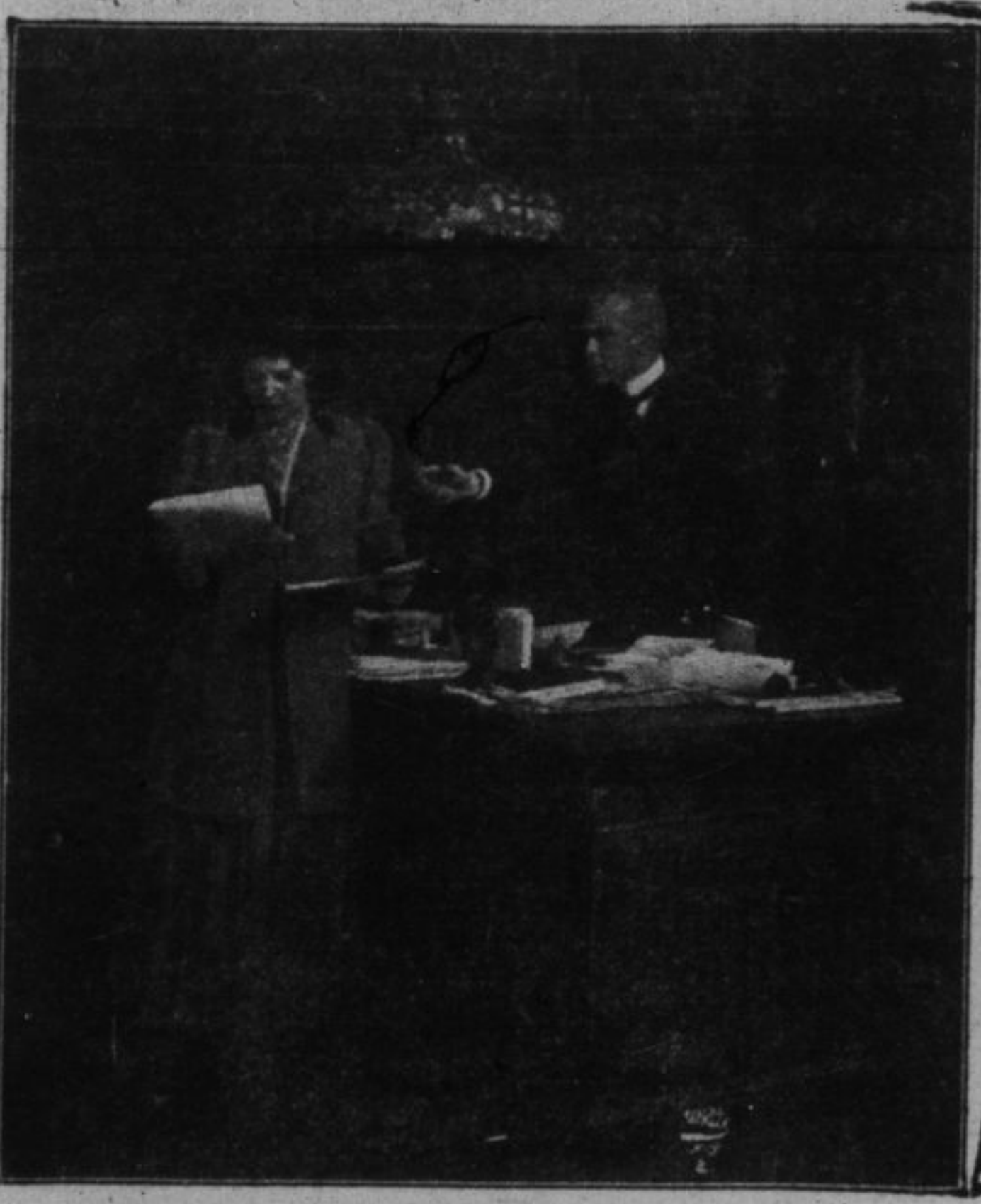
Kingston, Oct. 7.—(To the Editor) Sir,—No more fearless advocate of the cause of oppressed humanity has lived in our time than William T. Stead, who perished in the wreck of the Titanic. Now the question is asked, is William T. Stead still alive, and does he still take an interest in the affairs of our world? To those who still cling to the old-fashioned ideas regarding death and the resurrection there is no question. Stead is dead. But now comes a widely-circulated high-class magazine with an article from Mr. Stead's daughter, Miss Estelle Stead, containing the most explicit and positive assertions of Mr. Stead appearing in visible form at his late home at Wimbledon, Surrey, E.S., in "Julia's Bureau."

Miss Stead, writing in Nash's Magazine, gives a brief chronological history of her father's interest in and conversion to the acceptance of spirit-return as a fact, in support of which she adduces his experiences (and her own) with Mrs. Tomson, A. V. Peters, Mrs. Wreidt and others. It is all deeply interesting, though much of it is already public knowledge. But what makes her article of special value are the testimonies included regarding the actual manifestation of her father shortly after his transition. The testimonies are five in number, signed by those who were present at a seance with Mrs. Wreidt, at Cambridge House, Wimbledon. The letters are as follows: "My mother and I were present at the seance on May 6th. We saw Mr. Stead, absolutely unmistakably, and heard him speak.—Edith K. Harper, S. A. Adele Harper. Minnie Mallison, of Kingston-on-Thames, says: "His voice (Stead's) floated above and around us; his rapturous greeting to his daughter is engraved on our memories." E. R. Serocold Skeels, a London solicitor, adds: "I distinctly saw the head slightly whiter than I remember it. I am certain that which I saw was objective. Ella Anker, of Wimbledon, states that "the room was perfectly dark and we had been sitting for some time without hearing any voices or seeing any lights, when suddenly William Stead's face appeared in brilliant light. It lasted several seconds, perfectly clear and distinct, till it disappeared suddenly. After a while his face again appeared in the corner of the room. Afterwards his voice was heard, speaking characteristically in his own way. We all distinguished what he said."

Then comes Vice-Admiral W. Osborne Moore, of the United Service Club, Pall Mall, London, who says: "I was present on the 6th of May when a simulacrum of your father appeared to you (Miss Stead). Mrs. Harper, Miss Harper and Mr. Skeels, your dear father presented himself to me." "A brightly illuminated face and bust. There was no question, however, of its being a simulacrum of Mr. Stead." Now the question is bluntly this: Were these people self-deceived or wilfully lying? The place was Julia's bureau, the people present all intimates of Mr. Stead, the medium of irrefragable honesty. The testimony is decisive and direct. If it proves anything at all it proves that Stead is still alive! Space does not permit of more at the present time. The editor of the magazine referred to, closes an open-minded introductory note with the following sentence:—"Perhaps it is not miraculous that the mind which saw the merging of nations has manifested itself across the borderline of worlds."—S.P.P.

**To Explore Resources.** Anglo-American capitalists, heretofore conducting extensive mining operations in the Transvaal, are preparing to thoroughly explore the mineral resources in eastern British Columbia, along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway between Mile 53, the present head of steel and Fort George, west of Edmonton. Samples brought out by prospectors the past summer, show high returns in assays made at Vancouver and Toronto. G. L. McDonnell, mining engineer, who has been connected with the Sandeman-Cope company, also engaged with mining groups of the London stock exchange and in Johannesburg, made the foregoing announcement in Edmonton. It has taken up with the Edmonton Board of Trade, the question of establishing an assay office, where minerals from the mountain and north country could be tested for values. Mr. McDonnell intimated that if the ore proves in quality and quantity, as forehanded by prospect, a large smelting plant will be located either in the vicinity of Tete Jaune Cache or in the Fort George district. Many of the samples brought in from the territory along the Fraser river run \$30 to the ton in silver, lead and copper. Gold in commercial quantities has also been found on the claims.

**THANKSGIVING DAY SALE.** Hon. Robert Rogers Sets Precedent in Administration. Ottawa, Oct. 10.—Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the interior, perhaps with the possible result of the Masonic bye-election in mind, does not seem to view Thanksgiving day this year in the proper light. Instead of leaving the day to be generally observed with the usual church services in public thanksgiving for the mercies of the past year, the department of school lands by public auction at the interior is advertising a sale of Postage la Prairie on October 28th, Thanksgiving day. This is a new and unwelcome precedent of departmental administration. The pitcher that goes to the box too often is knocked out.

The disturbances west of the great lakes is moving quickly eastward, while an important area of high pressure is spreading southward over the western provinces and north-western states. Sharp frosts were general last night in the western provinces and occurred locally in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Owing to the increased demand for help in western Canada, the Grand Trunk railway has decided to run another farm laborers' excursion on Oct. 14th under the same conditions as for previous excursions, namely, \$10, from any station in Canada to Winnipeg, and a cent a mile to points beyond. C. Hamilton Wickes, Imperial trade commissioner, predicted at Toronto that Canada commercially would dominate North America.

### TO BREED BLACK FOXES.

One Was Secured 1,100 Miles North-east of Edmonton.

Edmonton, Alta., Oct. 10.—Returning from a stay of four months on Lake Athabasca, more than 1,100 miles northwest of here, where they made scientific explorations, Alfred Hare, of Tees, Alta., Professor Burwash, of the University of Chicago, and A. W. Haigh, a local prospector, brought to Edmonton a pure black fox and a red fox, marked with black. The two animals are valued at \$1,000.

Mr. Hare paid \$350 to Indians in the Fond du Lac and Great Bear Lake regions for the foxes, which he will take to his farm at Tees for propagating purposes. The plan is to breed the black variety for their fur, which has a high commercial value throughout the world. Trappers in this district say that interbreeding of the red and black foxes will gradually produce the pure black variety. The result of this experiment will be watched with interest in the United States, Canada and Europe, because of its possibilities.

The two foxes have had most unique experiences. They were transported from the far northern wilds to civilization by every mode of travel except aeroplane. The black fox was carried 900 miles, while the other animal in its trip from Great Bear Lake travelled fully 1,100 miles. The animals were transported in canoes and packed to Athabasca, ninety-eight miles north of here. When finally landed at Tees they will have travelled more than 200 miles by rail. They are in good condition.

Professor Burwash, who has made a long study of wild animal life, declares that while the experiment to be conducted by Mr. Hare is novel, there is no reason why it should be otherwise than a success from the other animals. The black is not a freak any more than is the red fox, that interbreeding is recognized, he said, and if the animals are congenial, as they appear to be, they should reproduce their kind. It is probable that the pure black, being the stronger animal, will predominate by careful propagating.

### A PICKED CLASS.

Women Students of Very Fine Character.

Jacob Gould Schurman, who is president of Cornell, and in a recent review of Cornell University about one-tenth of the student body is composed of women. I suppose they are a picked class, certainly they are able and of noble character. As I have watched them for twenty years, I have been greatly impressed by their ability in managing their own affairs, and their potential helpfulness in managing the larger affairs of the University. "I have come to the conclusion, as a result of my observation that in the administration of many public affairs men would be greatly helped if they enjoyed the co-operation of women. I mention, as example of these governmental activities in which women could be of surely great assistance, the problem of health and municipal cleanliness, of education, of social purity. I believe also that women might, and would exercise great influence for good in the extension of international good-will and the preservation of international peace, as I have thought upon this subject during many years, and have come to the deliberate conclusion that the extension of the suffrage to our women would educate and develop women themselves by putting on their shoulders a responsibility from which they have hitherto been free."

### PRINCESS MARY IS HER FATHER'S TYPIST

King George Dictates His Private Correspondence to His Charming Daughter.

Princess Mary, who is at present paying a visit with the Queen to the Dowager Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, at Neu Strelitz, a prettily old-fashioned little town, some 60 miles from Berlin, is having her first taste of continental life—part of the necessarily arduous preparation for a throne.

For all the young members of the British royal family the upbringing is at all times of the most exacting character, but as the only daughter of the king, particular care has been taken that Princess Mary should be equipped as befits an English Princess.

Queen Mary, knowing the responsibilities of Queenship, is aware that the education of her daughter, who will probably one day fill a European throne, is too vital for any mistakes to be made, and in consequence Princess Mary's career has been mapped out with painstaking care. Princess Mary began her schooling at the age of four together with her brothers in the royal schoolroom. This continued up till three years ago, when the question was discussed whether Princess Mary should go to boarding school; but it was finally decided that it would be best for her to continue her studies at home under special tutors.
