Telling Distanced by Sound.

There is an old saying that if you can count five between the flash and the thunder you are safe. Modern science tells us that if you can see the flash at all you are safe because if it struck you you would have no time to see it. The speed of lightning is about 180 times that of sight.

The old idea was that if you could count five the instant it strikes a mile away, which was considered a safe distance. Sound travels at the rate of 1142 feet a second, about a mile in five seconds, about a mile in five seconds, about a mile in five seconds.

In order to count seconds accurately, many photographers start by saying to themselves: "No one thousand, one thousand, two one thousand, three one thousand," etc. This gives you a count of one, two three, etc., if you stop at the number of seconds, you want to time. With a little practice with a watch beside you, you are accurate up to half a minute or more.

If you see a steam whistle blowing and note the instant it stops blowing, you count the seconds until you hear the sound and by allowing a fifth of a mile for each second you can judge of the distance. The same is true of guns, or an explosion, or even of hammering or any loud sound.
