


We cannot rise physically higher than our mental picture of ourselves. What-ever picture you carry of yourself phy-sically, mentally, morally, that you


If you wish health, think health, virualize images of health, carry in your imagination pictures of robust-ness, strength, physical wholeness, completeness and not the opposite.
