MEN PLACED IN DANGER

THROUGH THE IMMODEST DRESS OF WOMEN.

Archbishop Spratt Asks the Women to Dress More Modestly, and Not to Expose Men's Minds and Souls to Danger.

At high mass in St. Mary's Cathedral on Sunday morning, His Grace Archbishop Spratt preached a pointed sermon upon the necessity in these days of walking with prudence. His text was Ephesians V, 15-16: "See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise; redeeming the time because the days are evil."

The world is progressing the Archbishop said, and is progressing constantly. If, however, modern inventions and improvements are a help to better living, human nature, which is also depraved, turns these improvements for the purpose of sin, thereby making, as the apostle says, the day evil and more than evil. It is a great difficulty for men to live with the spiritual sense. To remain virtuous and live so, they must walk more circumspectly than heretofore.

His Grace spoke of the danger to which men's minds and souls were exposed and preyed upon by the immodest dress of women which leaves them partly naked. The lines of their bodies are hardly veiled, and a source of temptation. He advised women to dress more modestly.

The archbishop also spoke of Paul's admonition "and be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess." He strongly condemned the abuse of liquor which made men unable to walk circumspectly. His Grace did not condemn liquor itself, but the excessive use of it for worldly purposes.

THE LATE WILLIAM LAWSON.

A Well-known Resident of Elginburg Passes Away.

An old resident of Elginburg, William Lawson, J.P., died, near Sydenham, on Sunday evening, at 6:30 o'clock, at the home of his son-in-law, J. McKory, after an illness of about one year. Mr. Lawson was a carriage builder by trade, and a justice of the peace. He was a native of Nottingham, England, and came to this country in 1851. He is survived by a family of two daughters, Mrs. McKory, of Sydenham, and Mrs. W. Smith, of Sassafras, N.Y.; and two sons, Sherman, of Rock Island, Ill., and J. H. Lawson, of Detroit. The funeral will take place on Wednesday, at 10 a.m., from the residence of F. McKory, Sydenham, to Catawagui cemetery.
