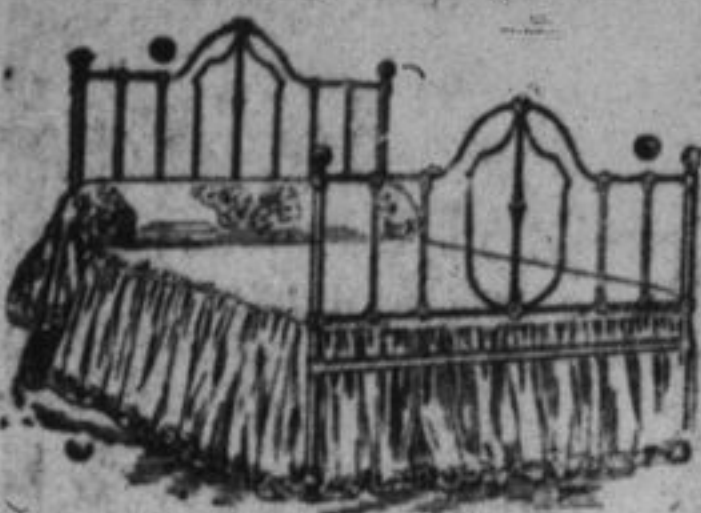

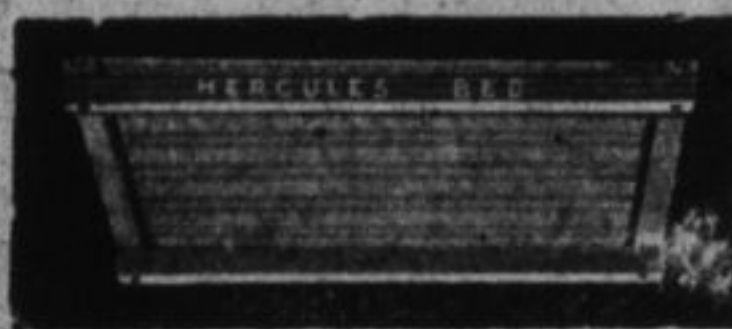

### ALL HANDS MUST SURRENDER

The minister of education, or his deputy in his name, has issued a circular which may be in the proper form. In the French-English school there has been a disposition to ignore or decline to act on, the regulations of the department. These regulations are designed to reduce the time in which French is used or taught in the bilingual schools. They imply such a radical change in the custom or practice. In the course of many years the French have made great progress in the teaching of their language. To have this checked or ended suddenly could not be contemplated pleasantly. The Education department was sure to encounter difficulty in the enforcement of its own regulations. But whether the premier was justified in storming over the protests he received or scolding and threatening, is now the question. And if the premier erred so did the minister of education. His circular emphasizes these points:

### THE NEED OF THE HOUR.

The city must, apparently, call in the experts to advise it upon the wisdom or unwisdom of filtering the water in order to guarantee its purity. The Board of Health handed the question over to the Utilities Committee, without defining what it wanted, and the Utilities Committee has become so much befogged that it is unable to determine what it should do. As Ottawa called in the Provincial Board of Health, to tell it how it should act, so apparently Kingston will have to depend upon outside counsel in order to get out of its present dilemma. The provincial officials may be able to enlighten it upon the one point which now seems to trouble the committee—whether filtration should proceed the disposal of the sewage. The plant which will take care of the refuse of the city, which will save the water in the harbour from further taint, is important, and may have to be provided very soon, for

the public and legislative bodies cannot much longer ignore the demand that our streams and rivers shall not be contaminated as they are now by the refuse of many municipalities. Meanwhile, and as a first consideration, is the filtration of the water drawn from the lake for domestic consumption. It is certainly not pure and the city would be exposed to its poisons without filtration, though it had the finest methods and machinery for taking care of its sewage. There has been much typhoid fever at Niagara Falls, at Sarnia, and Port Huron, and the conviction has been forced upon the people that the dreaded bacilli are carried down the lakes, and in the wake of the craft which navigate it. The only safety for these places is filtration, effective and complete, and the only salvation for Kingston is filtration. Sewage disposal must follow, as a matter of course.

### VISIT OF MR. ROWELL.

Mr. Rowell's visit to Kingston will be pleasantly remembered. He came to the city in fulfillment of a promise he had made to the Canadian Club and the Queen's College Alumni Association, and while here his time was wholly and profitably occupied. The two fine addresses which he made, on Workmen's Compensation, and the "Formation of Empire," were able presentations of the subjects. They carried with them the evidence of much thought, and they were followed by expressions which marked the deep appreciation of the audiences. Mr. Rowell has been a great student and is a student still. He has the power to readily grasp the details of any question and the faculty of earnestly and eloquently marshalling the facts.

On the one subject he briefly surveyed the legislation dealing with the compensation of workmen for the injuries they sustained in accidents showing how necessary it was to improve upon the protection which the present law afforded and how ready the legislature should be to adopt changes, such as Sir William Meredith

**PREHISTORIC PAINTINGS.**  
Interesting Helle Found in Walls of Bacon's Hotel.  
London, Oct. 15.—The Times announces that the first example in Britain of prehistoric cave paintings of the kind already familiar to paleontologists from the caves at Bordeaux, South France, the Pyrenees, and the peninsula of Spain, were recently discovered in the walls of Bacon's hotel, near Mumbles, by Prof. F. H. St. John. The discovery was not a picture, but a number of horizontal bands of vivid red arranged in vertical series about a yard in height, with a deposit of staining formed over them and sealed up so that no use of the paint can be removed by rubbing. Similar bands have been described from the walls of Font de Gaume in Dordogne. It is believed the discovery belongs to the aurignacian stage of the upper palaeolithic epoch, since aurignacian bones have been found in caves in this vicinity.

**THOUSANDS COME TO MARRY.**

**Mormon Temple for Alberta.**  
Lethbridge, Ala., Oct. 15.—Great excitement prevailed throughout all the Latter Day Saints colonies in Alberta over the announcement by President Joseph F. Smith, of the Mormon church, at the general conference held at Salt Lake City, that a temple would be built in one of the settlements near Raymond, Alta.

The temple will be similar to those in Utah, and all the rites and ordinances of the church will be administered within its precincts. It will probably cost about one or two hundred thousand dollars.
