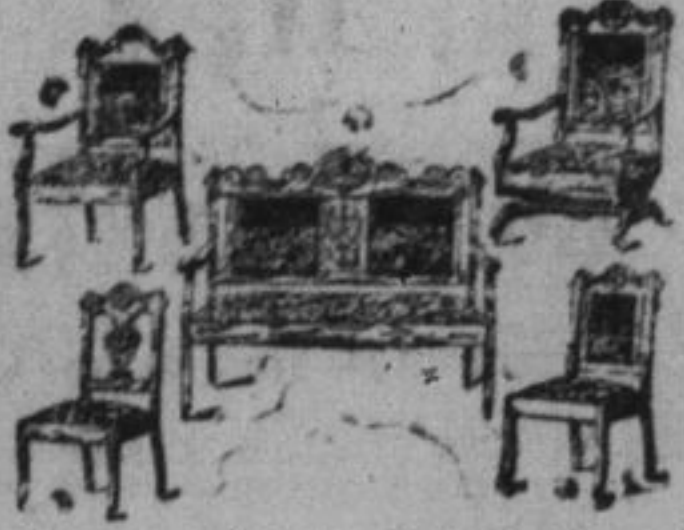


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## THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

POLITICAL SCIENCE HONOR STUDENTS WILL STUDY

The Social and Moral Conditions of Kingston—Elections in Faculties and Years on Friday—Budget of University News.

The honor students in political science are busy getting first-hand information concerning the social and moral conditions prevalent in Kingston. It is their purpose to make a study of the housing problem, which now faces the city. In this connection they will give the result of their observations in regard to the proportion of people living in their own houses and compare it with the number of citizens who occupy rented houses. They will report on the extent to which overcrowding exists, and on the general level of rents and their tendency. They will also come to a definite conclusion regarding the questions of sanitation and fair rent as connected with the houses of workingmen.

Another factor in city life which will come under their consideration will be the recreation facilities of Kingston. Questions such as these will be answered: Does Kingston provide a sufficiency of recreation facilities, free or otherwise, for the young men and women of the city? Do the saloons and the park answer all the needs?

The nationality problems of the city will also come in for investigation. The place of the Jew, the Greek and the Chinaman in the life of the city will be set forth. Their numbers, trades, religion, isolation, prosperity and status as citizens will all be elucidated.

Another feature which should prove valuable to the city councilors will be the conclusions arrived at for the provision of the future growth of the city. In having done plans for the future, the students will offer suggestions as to the provisions for roads, harbors, docks, parks and playgrounds. They will work on the assumption that Kingston will have a population of 40,000 in the course of the next ten years and will plan accordingly.

Some of the classes will consider the part played by the university in the life of the city. Others will deal with questions of taxation, with the taxation of unimproved lands, etc. Another section will fall the task of reporting upon the labor conditions of Kingston, woman and child employment, the position of trades unionism, strikes, the level of wages and the social welfare work carried on by employers will all come in for consideration.

The results of this investigation should prove of inestimable benefit in the way of providing valuable civic data, while the students at the same time will profit by dealing with concrete and practical problems.
