INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM THREATENED.

The liberty of the individual is not recognized in either Canada or the United States. In the republic to the south life is imperilled by the lawlessness of the criminal classes. The man who exposes wrong-doing is conspired against and even murdered. This has been indicated by events in New York. The man who would raise his voice in counsel or protest, in a grave labour crisis, is assaulted, arrested, and imprisoned. This is what happened to the mayor of Schenectady when he essayed to address the strikers in Little Falls.

In Manitoba during an election men were arrested and roughly handled whose only offence was that they were opposed to the government of the day. Police officials, or police thugs, carried about blank warrants for urgent use, and in the enforcement of the anarchistic rule to which the Roblin government resorted. Two impersonators, who were guilty of a grave infraction of the election law, were secretly tried and freed. The prosecutors were denied all information with regard to the case, and profanely addressed by the magistrates.

CANADA IN PEACE AND WAR.

To-day the premier will make his official announcement with regard to cabinet changes. He will explain the circumstances under which Mr. Monk retires from office. The document will be carefully drawn, in order to minimize the differences between Mr. Borden and Mr. Monk, and in order that there may not be any public contradiction of statements. Mr. Monk, however, proposes to make a declaration of his own account.

This is to be expected, and it is eminently fitting, because he has been represented as making certain observations which are not exactly in keeping with his performances. He is said to have admitted, after attending the sessions of the government, and hear all that Mr. Borden and others had to say, that the situation in Britain was "grave and even critical," in a naval sense, but he could not support an emergency grant of \$30,000,000 unless the people were to be consulted upon the subject. Mr. Monk will not let any one, even the premier, represent him in any way, and his explanation will be anticipated with great interest.

It is significant to note that in Montreal Kerr Hardie, the socialist M.P., has been speaking on the naval question.

THE UNIONISTS LOSING GROUND.

The imperial parliament has been regarded as a model of its kind. There scenes have occurred betimes. Men, in the heat of debate, have lost their heads, and used language that was most unbecoming. Some have broken away from the usual restraints and fallen under the caustic criticism of the speaker. An occasional one has been humbled and made to apologize for his rashness. All of the member have felt at times the power of that rule which they themselves adopted, as a measure of self-government, called the closure. Generally the house has been under reserve, and its proceedings have been dignified and decorous.

Last week there was a new experience. The premier was absent through illness. The Home Rule bill was under discussion. Some of its clauses were being passed with less obstruction than was anticipated. Inidentally the land valuation of England came under review. This valuation is being made by committees appointed by the government and it work has been necessarily tedious and exacting. Before the committee many witnesses have appeared, confidentially, and have given information which they were not free to give openly. There was the evidence of

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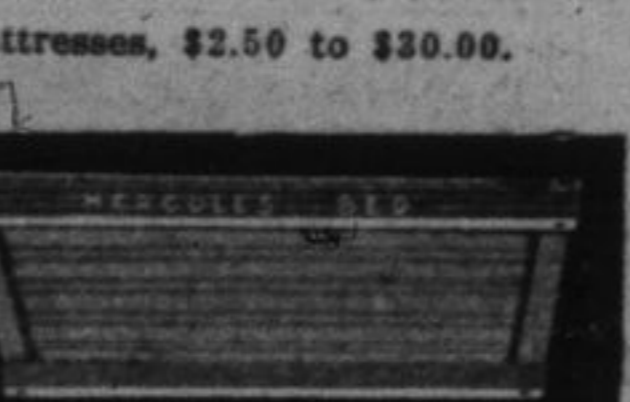
