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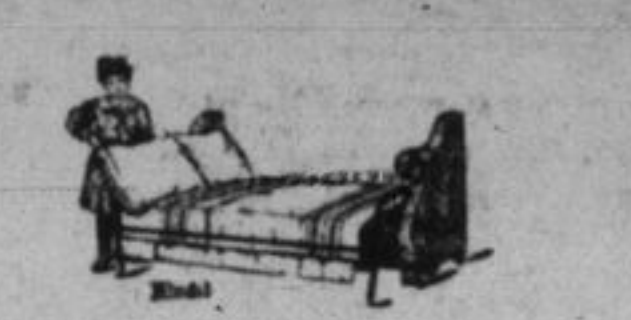
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LADY MISSIONARY SPEAKS

In Cooke's Church on Her Work in India.

Miss M. McKellar, M.D., a graduate of the Woman's Medical college Kingston, and a missionary of India spoke in Cooke's church on Sunday at the morning service on her work in India. She recounted in an interesting way, the value of medical aid to the suffering in India as a preparation for carrying to them the gospel message.

Dr. McKellar also called attention to the strength of England's hold in India. She said that while there was a measure of unrest there, England's hold was most secure. She outlined the work that was being done by the Presbyterian church in India, and what was hoped for by the missionary.
