##### Cause of the Railway Fatality Near Sharbot Lake.

The evidence in the inquest held into the death of the late Conductor William Greene at Sharbot Lake on Saturday, went to show that the trains were following too close. The train in which Conductor Greene was in charge had been put on a siding on the Kingston and Pomfret line so as to allow the other trains to pass on the main line. After the train that was due passed, Conductor Greene's freight left the yards, and the next train followed in about ten minutes.

Some difficulty was experienced in closing the switch and this took up some little time. Then the train was stalled about three miles down, and without warning the crash came.
