PITH OF WORLD NEWS.

From Telegraphic Despatches and Newspaper Exchanges.

Peter Sawyer, of Guelph, formerly of Esqueping and Nassagaweya, died suddenly in his 67th year.

King Victor Emmanuel of Italy proposes to assume the title of Emperor of Rome at an early date.

The cornerstone of a new Roman Catholic church to cost \$300,000 was laid in St. Catharines.

A farm hand named Burkholder was fatally injured while threshing near Hepworth, his arm being caught in the machine and torn out.

Walter Manuel, eighty-six years of age, fell from a ladder while picking apples at Whitby and was instantly killed.

It is rumored that Hon. Hugh Armstrong, provincial treasurer, of Manitoba, will retire from public life at the end of the parliamentary term.

It is understood that the Canadian Northern R.R. is going into the contract of hotels in the various large cities of Canada as a sideline to the transportation business.

In one of the biggest raids made on disorderly houses in Montreal's red light district, 105 prisoners, 52 of whom were women, were taken into custody during the early hours of Sunday morning.

It is stated that the C.N.R. has finally decided to establish its main car shops at Rideau Junction, a suburb of Ottawa, where its company a few months ago purchased several hundred acres of land.

At Watertown, N. Y., while playing about, Fred Pendergast, 8-year-old son of John E. Pendergast, proprietor of the Hub restaurant, was accidentally struck in the right eye by a shot from an airgun and will lose his sight.

The ore product of the boundary and Kootenay mines was over fifty thousand tons. For the year to date over 1,900,000 tons have been shipped. Demonstrations at Nelson prove the existence of platinum ores in the province.

Ester Iyer, Endicott, N. Y., are dead and four companions, Mrs. Dyer and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Walsh and Earl Crispin, all of Endicott, N. Y., were injured as a result of Mr. Crispin's car being struck by a train on a grade crossing.

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LATE SIR R. J. CARTWRIGHT.

Resolution of Executive of Equitable Life Assurance Society.

The following is a copy of a resolution passed by the executive committee of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, held on October 16th inst., on the death of Sir Richard Cartwright, and an engrossed copy of the resolution will be sent to the family of the deceased as soon as it is prepared.

"This committee has learned with deep sorrow of the death of Sir Richard Cartwright, who for many years served the society as a trustee in Canada.

"A man of noble character and distinguished public service Sir Richard had a clear understanding of the sacredness and beneficence of the institution of life insurance, and unflinchingly supported it with voice and pen.

"He brought to the office those masculine qualities which had made him a leader of men, and, with rare ability and devotion protected the interests of the Equitable policyholders.

"We desire to record, on their behalf, the appreciation of Sir Richard's character and services, which is so eminently due."

Sir Richard Cartwright was appointed a trustee for the Canadian policy holders of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York in 1899, and has acted as such continuously until his death. His associates at the time of his death were Hon. Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., of Toronto, and Hon. William Harty, of Kingston.
