BY A BATTLE WITHIN THE NEXT FEW DAYS.

Bulgarian Troops Break Through Turkish Line From Greece to Black Sea. Turks Suffer a Big Disaster.

Paris, Oct. 22.—Diplomats believe here that the Balkan war will practically be settled by a battle looked for within a few days between the Turks and the Bulgarians at Adrianople. Whichever way the victory goes, it is expected the losing side will easily come to terms. The Montenegrins will not be easily satisfied.

Stubborn Resistance. Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 22.—Official reports received here to-day say that four Servian armies are advancing slowly into Turkish territory, but are meeting with stubborn resistance. Servian troops have surrounded Humana, and a settlement is expected momentarily.

Turks Suffer Disaster. Sofia, Oct. 22.—According to the Bulgarian government's own statement, their troops have broken through the entire Turkish line from Greece to the Black Sea. If this should prove to be true the Turks have suffered a disaster of the first magnitude.

Will be Short Lived. Washington, D.C., Oct. 22.—Youssef Zia Pasha, Turkish ambassador to the States, broke the news of the war started, issued a statement last night in which he said that the trouble would be short-lived, and these countries should be punished for impertinency. He charged the Balkans with trying to stir up revolution in Macedonia.

MET FARMERS IN WEST WHO HAD LEFT FRONTENAC SOME YEARS AGO

And Have Grown Wealthy in Saskatchewan—J. E. Anglin, of Battersea, Returns From Western Trip. J. E. Anglin, of Battersea, who has been touring the west, has just returned and give the Whig a few impressions of his trip.

Among other interesting things, Mr. Anglin told of running into a busy hive of farmers who had left this vicinity about seven years ago, for Saskatchewan, where they have prospered and grown rich, to our eastern way of counting wealth.

He just met George Sutherland, formerly of Battersea, who invited him to his home. Mr. Sutherland took him round to his neighbor, Robert Shannon, formerly of Sunbury, son of ex-Reeve Shannon, of Storrington. Together they went for a whirl in Mr. Shannon's car and called on the other members of the community.

George E. Clark and William Loucks, formerly of Keselville; James Gordon, formerly of Pittsburg; John Miller, formerly of Perth Road; Robert Gay, Sunbury; Robert Keeler, Keselville; Robert Thomas, Battersea, all received a call and gave Mr. Anglin a hearty welcome for "Auld Lang Syne."

Mr. Clark says they are all doing well and everyone of them takes the Whig and still keeps a warm spot in his heart for the old home. Mr. Sutherland has built one of the best places in the Saskatoon district and as for dwellings, our farmers in the east do not dream of such homes.

He said that the house erected by Mr. Shannon was one of the finest in the vicinity of Saskatoon. When they arrived there seven years ago the population of Saskatoon was 400. It is now 23,000, and one can hardly hear for the noise of the building works where pneumatic hammers keep up a din all day long.

Mr. Anglin said he thought the Saskatoon district was the best he had visited. In regard to the real estate business, with respect to which his trip was made, Mr. Anglin said that he found that an awful lot of wild schemes were hatched there and emptied on the unsuspecting east.

"On my way in to Saskatoon," he said, "about eight miles from the city, I saw an automobile out on the prairie and it was explained to me that they were looking for their town lots." The city of Saskatoon's subdivided to more than eight miles out of the city, and people have sunk money in land that will never realize if they hold it a lifetime.

Mr. Anglin said that offers had been made to him to market this stuff in the east. He had, of course, refused the offers.
