The most dangerous diseases are ar, contracted by drinking impure wa not well heeded. Or perhaps far mers have a false confidence in the pur Reviewing the results obtained since 1887, it is an alarming fact that only have been shown to be pure. Manwat rs-clear, brilliant, odorless drawn from farm wells and quite un suspected of containing any impuri ties, have been found to be seriously

contaminated. Action should be taken in this mat ter by every farmer. Samples sent to Frank T. Shutt, Experimental farm Ottawa, will be tested free. In cases of polluted water, information can be secured from this source also as to the best way to remedy the evil.

Talk on Feeding.

Practically all of the special feeding in this country involves the use of milk, thus producing "milk-fed" chickens. These are also exported i to some extent. Milk, while the least expensive, seems to be the most essential constituent of the ration, and when a feeder can not get milk in some form he generally does not attempt to fatten poultry commercially.

Of ten the packer has to feed his poultry to suit the demands of his mar ket, but generally if a man has high-class product he can make his own market, catering somewhat to popular fancies.

Notes of Interest.

Plow the land as early as possible. To make it still better, disc the land if possible two or three weeks. before plowing. This discing makes a better seed bed, as the stubble is mixed with the soil. The discing also buries weed seed and grain which makes them germinate and the plowing will, as a rule, make a better crop than spring plowing, especially so if the land is disced first. Then, again, there is too little time in the spring to do the plowng. Nor West Farmer.

Manitoba's agreultural depart ment will th's year receive a special subsidy of \$32,000 from the federal treasury. Half of it has already been paid over. Hon, George Lawrence proposes the following dis posal of it: \$18,000 for demonstration farms; \$6,000 for extension work of the agricultural college; \$4,000 for demonstration trains; \$2,000 for ploughing matches, and \$2,000 to encourage the poultry industry. This is the first federal aid of this sort for the western prov-



V. C. Man In Workhouse.

There is at present in the infirmary of the Cambridge (Eng.) workhouse an ex-noncommissioned officer of the army who holds the Victoria Cross. and is a member of a family of soldiers, three brothers, two sons, and eight nephews either serving or having served in various branches of the

The man is James Collis, who was born in Cambridge in 1851, and enisted in the 46th Foot in 1872. He was transferred to the R.H.A., and ent out to India, where he arrived just before the war broke out with Alghanistan. Collis went to the front with Major Blackwood and E Battery of B Brigade of the R.H.A., and was present at the disaster at Maiwand, when the British force was almost annihilated by Ayub Khan,

Collis, who was then a gunner, loadreached after great difficulties. He was nearly cut off on the way, and to save

Twelve months later, at a parade on the Poonah racecourse, Collis had his name called out and had the Victoria Cross pinned on his cost by Lord Roberts (then Gen. Roberts). Collis afterwards joined the Bombay police in which he became an inspec




