DR. SPANKIE RETIRES TOOK WRONG BOTTLE

AS SCHOOL INSPECTOR FOR SOUTH FRONTENAC.

The Government Refuses to Ratify His Re-Appointment—What the Reasons Are—The Doctor a Splendid Inspector.

Dr. William Spankie, of Wolfe Island, will, on December 31st next, retire from the position of inspector of public schools for South Frontenac, which he has occupied for the past quarter of a century. According to the statutes, when a county inspector is not notified on October 1st that his services are satisfactory to the Department of Education, it becomes the duty of the County Council to replace him. This is what has happened in the case of Dr. Spankie, and at its November session, the Frontenac coun-

cil will make another appointment. One of the applicants is S. Truscott, principal of the Iroquois high school, a native of Sydneyham and a graduate of Queen's University.

The retirement of Dr. Spankie comes as a great surprise, for he is one of the best county inspectors in the province. No one in the government educational inspectorate service knows better the needs of the public schools. It is said that other inspectors objected in recent years to Dr. Spankie practicing his profession, besides acting as Frontenac inspector. Again it is hinted that the conservative government is getting "back" at the doctor for his independent political views. Although he is a Tory, he has criticized the provincial educational system at various times. Whatever the cause of the doctor's retirement, the province loses from active service one of its best inspectors, and the people of the county will exceedingly regret that this will be his last year to visit the school houses that have known him for so many years.

The present inspector's salary is \$2,000 a year, with travelling expenses. A new inspector would start at \$1,600.

TAKING WRONG MEDICINE

WOMAN SUDDENLY EXPIRES.

In Mistake for Whiskey, She Swallowed Concoction Left by a Veterinary Surgeon for Horses.

St. Louis, Oct. 29.—A swallow of horse medicine, which she mistook for whiskey, caused the death of Mrs. Louis Achelpohl, wife of a farmer of Orchard Farm, St. Charles county.

About a year ago an eighteen-months-old child of Mrs. Achelpohl died within half an hour after it had been given a dose of medicine by a physician. Investigation revealed a mistake had been made in the amount of drug administered to the child.

Mrs. Achelpohl, who was threatened with a chill, took a dose of medicine just before bedtime, and followed it with what she thought was a glass of whiskey. Her husband, who had retired, remembered a veterinarian had left the horse medicine in a whiskey bottle, and asked his wife if she was sure she had the right bottle. Mrs. Achelpohl assured him there could be no mistake, but Achelpohl was not satisfied. He investigated, and found his wife had taken the horse medicine.

After telephoning for a physician another way used by Achelpohl, but they were not effective. The woman died within ten minutes after taking the draught. She is survived also by one child, a son, twelve years old.

ALLURING VOICE IS STILL

Famous Civil War Vocalist Dies in Poverty.

Chicago, Oct. 29.—Jules Lombard, the golden-voiced singer of the civil war, is dead. The man whose voice popularized "The Battle Cry of Freedom" and lured 20,000 men to answer the war call of Abraham Lincoln, has closed his long life of fame. Lombard was eighty-four years old, poverty-stricken, and deserted save for the presence of an aged sister-in-law, Mrs. Mary Lombard, in the three little rooms the couple have called home at No. 102 West Sixty-eight street. He died of old age.

BETTING FAVORS WILSON

As the Next President of the United States.

New York, Oct. 29.—According to the New York Telegraph, betting on the presidential situation in Wall street is still very light, with an overwhelming sentiment in favor of Wilson. The odds still remain: Wilson, 4 to 1; Taft, 1 to 3, and Roosevelt, 1 to 5.

A bet of \$1,000 to \$400 that Wilson would be elected, found no takers yesterday, and it is a case of even money on Taft or Roosevelt winning the popular vote.

FALSE TEETH PART COUPLE.

Husband, Who Says Wife Appropriated His Set.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 11.—Judge Warner granted William Miller, seven years old, a divorce from his wife, Caroline, aged seventy-two, after hearing some unusual evidence. Miller charged his wife with taking his false teeth and converting them to her own use. The couple had been married seven years.

DEATH IN BOYISH PRANK.

Florent Rifle and "Wild West" Fatal Combination.

Chester, Pa., Oct. 29.—Isaac, four-year-old son of Mrs. Lottie Woodfort, died at the Chester hospital as the result of being shot in the head by Harvey Wilson, seven years old, who, it is alleged, pointed a Florent rifle at his companion while playing "Wild West."

THE TURKS DISAPPEAR

WHEREABOUTS OF SULTAN'S ARMY UNKNOWN.

Victorious Bulgarian Army Still Advancing—It Looks as if the Turks Would be Driven Out of Europe Altogether.

London, Oct. 29.—An interesting question at the present moment is the whereabouts of the Turkish army of which nothing definite is known.

The news that Eski-Baba has been taken by the Bulgarian cavalry apparently without resistance, shows that Nazim Pasha's army is not where it was supposed to have been—on the line between Kuleli Burgas to Kule Burgas. It may be further west in the direction of Demotica, but it is generally supposed that it has retired from the line of the railway and entrenched itself on the long line from Memotica to Teboria. Constantinople despatches continue to speak of the readiness of the Turkish army to take the offensive, in any case, a few days must see something decisive.

The victorious Bulgarian army is still advancing. It has occupied Bulharisar and is marching towards Kuleli Burgas. It is reported that the Bulgarians have blown up a bridge over the Tchorlu river, showing that the turning movement is making rapid progress.

Unless the Turks are able to take the offensive vigorously, the present indication is that they will be driven out of Europe altogether.

Austria Will Consent.

London, Oct. 29.—It is believed here that Austria is weakening under pressure being brought by other great powers, and will consent to the demand of the Balkan states for a slice of European Turkey, providing these states are reasonable in their requirements. This is taken as an optimistic sign by diplomats who feared Austria's attitude should the Balkans win the war.

Allies Will Win.

Paris, France, Oct. 29.—Three big battles between Turks and Bulgarians (Turks and Serbians, and Turks and Greeks) are expected to-day within the next few hours. Military experts here consider it practically certain that the allied troops will win all of them, not only because of the consistent and conclusive success of the Balkan states, so far, but because the Turkish troops are practically cornered at their various positions. There is hardly any doubt that after these three fights the Turkish troops will be routed and retreat in disorder towards Constantinople with the victorious armies sharp at their heels.

Monday's Play Was "Bunty Pulls the Strings."

Appreciative audiences enjoyed the production of the Scotch comedy, "Bunty Pulls the Strings," at the Grand on Monday afternoon, and evening. It was seen here last spring, and made a great hit. This time there were changes in the company, Miss Davicy MacNaughton taking the role of "Bunty" in a charming manner.
