THE LAURIER SCHEME A FAR REACHING CAUSE TURNED THE TABLES WILL RECOMMEND

OF IMPERIAL POLICY TAKEN UP BY BORDEN.

Whose Co-Partnership Policy Has Greatly Simmered Down—New Plan Proposes Simply a Permanent Imperial Defence Council.

Ottawa, Oct. 29.—Premier Borden's imperial policy of a complete co-partnership union with the motherland and representation on an Imperial Council dealing with Imperial matters, as a condition of Canadian contribution to Imperial defence, has simmered down to a comparatively modest and far less radical plan. The scheme now proposed as a co-terminus and partial defence of the government's policy of direct contribution to the imperial navy, is in effect, the expansion of the somewhat vaguely constituted Imperial Defence Council. It is proposed to make it a permanent, more influential and more authoritative advisory board, representing officially all the important parts of the empire.

The premier realises the difficulties in the way of Great Britain's sharing her present responsibility for her foreign policy with the overseas dominions. He doubts, too, the political expediency of entering into any binding contract with the motherland and with the sister dominions governing all the partners of the empire in matters of defence and foreign policy.

He is becoming convinced that imperial unity is based on local autonomy and on freedom of concerted action on matters of common interest rather than on elastic and formal partnership papers binding each partner to accept fully the decisions of "The Firm" in all matters. But pre-election declarations of policy on the naval question and the subsequent statements both in England and since his return two months ago render politically necessary some peg of autonomy on which to hang the proposed direct emergency contribution. Hon. Mr. Monk has left the cabinet, but some at least of the principles for which he contended and the votes thereby influenced cannot be overlooked.

Accordingly the government here has been negotiating with the imperial government for the adoption of some compromise scheme of imperial federation which will enable Premier Borden to say when proposing the emergency contribution that he has at least achieved something in the direction of an imperial council. Hon. G. E. Foster has been engaged on this task in England during the past month.

What has been evolved is in effect simply the proposal made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the last imperial conference. It is proposed to erect the Imperial Defence Council into a permanent and official board representing all parts of the empire, with full advisory but very limited executive powers in matters of common defence.

The council would advise on matters for concerted defence and be a medium for a mutual exchange of confidential military or naval information, and on recommendations or suggestions from the mother country or from the dominions. To enhance its authority and prestige it is proposed that members of the overseas governments should be appointed to it, thus bringing these governments into direct and practically constant touch with imperial defence developments.

It is understood that the premier has Hon. George E. Perley, minister without portfolio, in mind as the active representative of Canada on the proposed council. Hon. G. E. Foster is also suggested, but the government needs him for the present to help out in debate in the house, and he wishes to be given a chance first to conclude a trade agreement with Australia.

FOR THE NORTH TEMPERATE ZONE RAINS.

Dr. James Munro, of Winnipeg, Tells the Reason—Northern Snow Melting—Changes Will Give Canada Access to New Sources of Wealth.

Edmonton, Alta., Oct. 29.—Statements concerning the ever-changing climatic conditions, which, he frankly admits, may be startling to the scientific world as well as to the layman, were made in an interview in Edmonton by Dr. James Munro, M.P.E., of Winnipeg, who has given the subject the study of a lifetime. He said:

"From information gathered from many sources, both from Europe and America, I am led to believe that there is a far-reaching cause which may account for the tremendous rains covering the whole of the north temperate zone; reaching across Canada, across the Atlantic ocean, covering England and Scotland and northern Europe and Asia. The continuous and universal rainfall this summer extending over the portions of the earth named, following a year that was noted for its large rainfall, has caused me to endeavor to get at the basic principle or cause of this phenomenon."

"Newton, by applying his theory of gravitation, combined with so-called centrifugal force to the earth, and assuming that an ebb-tidal rotation in a form of equilibrium or a homogeneous fluid rotating with uniform velocity, was one of the first to prove that the interior of the earth was a molten mass, and that the rotary motions of the earth, combined with the attraction of the other planets, together with the sun, kept the earth suspended and whirling through space."

"Now, the radiation of the earth's heat is causing a condensation of the surface of the planet, and this contraction at certain points tends to throw up the interior matter to points where the earth's shell is perhaps thinner. This has recently occurred in the northern Pacific ocean, where large new islands have been thrown up."

"Reports also state that the Japan current has changed its course, striking northern Canada and Alaska at a much higher point than formerly. The mild winds from this current flowing northeasterly are melting the snow on the tops of the Arctic and the winds from the north are carrying the moisture-laden clouds south and east, not depositing their moisture in rain and snow."

"This has been a cool, cloudy summer, and we have wondered where all the rain came from, as the cloudy atmosphere did not permit the sun to draw its moisture from ordinary lakes and rivers. Again, it is my belief that the accumulated ice at the south Pole, coupled with the throwing off of the large number of enormous icebergs at the North Pole, has caused the earth to slightly change its centre of gravity, thus throwing the Arctic zone farther south, causing the sun to evaporate its snow and ice to a greater extent than ever before. Note the great number of icebergs that have been reported in the Atlantic ocean the last few years. The Yukon country and Iceland were experiencing greater heat this year than ever was recorded."

"Only the other day it was reported that a great glacier more than a mile in length had broken from that fringe of Alaska, which cuts the Yukon from the Pacific ocean. Nature is slowly unfolding her wondrous plan. With the melting of the northern snows and the warming of the waters of Hudson's Bay, she will give Canada access to new sources of wealth which for centuries lay latent and undeveloped. We will soon hear the whistle of the bay wharves, the products of the Empire will be loaded and unloaded at our great inland port, and out of the days of gloom we will behold the rainbow of hope scattering its blending colors into a land of glory. Our people will take new courage to go on and conquer, having faith and assurance that behind the dark clouds there are silver linings, and back of the whole an all-wise Providence."

WOMAN'S WIT EFFECTIVE IN THWARTING ROBBERS.

Hears Burglars in House and Slips Away With Big Sum of Money They Are After.

Washington, Pa., Oct. 29.—While robbers were ransacking the upper floors of the John Murphy residence near Burnsville in the afternoon, Mrs. Murphy returned home. Hearing the men upstairs she slipped quietly into the dining room and procured \$325 which she had hidden the day before in a clock.

Walking out again without letting the burglars become aware of her presence she fled for a mile across fields and through woods to the Taylor school, where she hid herself from their scratches and almost exhausted. She quickly told the story to her son, a pupil there, and he summoned help. When a posse reached the Murphy home the robbers had left, after having ransacked every room in the house. It was known throughout the neighborhood that Mr. Murphy had received \$300 for a gas lease.

INVOICE OF POLITICS FROM BUSINESS, BIG OR LITTLE.

Publicity of How Every Cent Was Spent, the Names of Recipients and Detailed Explanations of the Purpose Twice During Primary and Campaign.

Washington, Oct. 29.—Divorce of politics from business—big or little—by enactment of corrupt practices acts more stringent than any of the "model" laws now in effect in several states, will be the demand, urged upon congress by the Clapp committee.

One senator favors \$10,000 as the limit; another favors \$5,000. Publication of how every cent in any campaign was spent—the names of recipients and detailed explanation of the purpose—twice during the primary and general election campaigns.

Prison sentences as well as heavy fines of campaign officials who break the law.

Adjustment of the law to cover both the convention and primary nominating systems for president and all other candidates.

To impose on each presidential candidate knowledge of the amount and source of his financial support by requiring the candidate's certification to the statement of his finances.

To require not only national campaign managers but state, district and even ward or precinct managers to report the money received or spent.

Strict accounting of all campaign promises of appointment or political rewards.

Machinery to enforce the new law, it is learned, may cause creation of a new federal bureau of elections.

WIFE HORRIBLY HAKED.

Drowns Himself After Fatally Injuring Defenceless Woman.

London, Oct. 29.—The tragedy of a husband's revenge, as grim as anything in the pages of Guy de Maupassant, was revealed in the King's Cross crime.

Mrs. Ellen Coxon, aged forty-eight, was found early in the morning, terribly wounded at her home in Judd Street. A taxicab driver saw her leaning against the first floor window of a room over a barber's shop. There was no other occupant of the room, out a chopper was lying by the side of the window.

The woman must have been attacked while lying in bed, and had tried to protect herself, for the first finger of her right hand had been cut through to the bone. Her head was shockingly injured.

Her assailant had then left the room, and had locked the door behind him. It was only the fact that the injured woman had been able to struggle to the window that led to the discovery. She was taken to the Royal Free hospital, where her condition was held as hopeless.

Her husband, Edgar Coxon, had only just been released from Pentonville prison, having completed a term of six months' hard labor for attacking her with a hammer. She was a reluctant witness against him.
