LIQUOR NOT OBTAINED

IN MILITARY CAMPS, BUT IN ADJOINING TOWNS.

What Hon. Sam Hughes Tells the W.C.T.U.—He Refers to the Kingston Camp he Commanded in 1910.

Special to the Whig. Renfrew, Oct. 30.—A letter to Mrs. M. Dettlor, North Bay, county secretary of the W.C.T.U., from the Hon. Sam Hughes, minister of militia, regarding the sale of liquor in instruction camps, read by Mrs. Dettlor here, and which was contained in the report of "Conferences with Influential Bodies," was a feature of today's session of the Women's Christian Temperance Union convention in session here in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church.

The minister of militia wrote as follows: "Re the sale of liquor in camps of instruction, I am very sorry to hear the report concerning liquor in camps. You will pardon me, but I am afraid your information is wrong. The liquor is not obtained in the camps, but, as I understand it, in the towns adjoining and there is very little of it used."

"You will permit me to say that in the Kingston camp of 1910, which I had the honor to command, there was almost an entire absence of any kind of liquor. No Women's Christian Temperance Union camp could surpass it, and I am sure if the dear good ladies of this country, such as you, were to come out to the camp occasionally, and go around, you would be more than surprised to find such a splendid lot of young men wearing the king's uniform and conducting themselves like gentlemen, with scarcely an exception."

The Kingston ladies and other attending the Women's Christian Temperance Union provincial convention at Renfrew to-day were urged, if they have the franchise never to neglect to vote. Mrs. W. Wilson Puzanley, Toronto, presented an important legislative report. It suggested, amongst other things, that men committing certain crimes against women should get their hands and feet disfranchised; more stringent legislation to prevent the white slave traffic; that the names of men who pay fines in connection with disorderly houses be published that it be made illegal for liquor to be sold from bars on civic or statutory holidays; and that clubs be put under the same restrictions and regulations as licensed bars.

There were also complaints that in some parts of Ontario the names of women entitled to vote had been taken off the roll and they had been unable to get them put on again.

They had made repeated returns into the burning hospital to bring out children, three of whom also lost their lives. The sisters who perished were all originally from Ireland.

THE FATE OF TURKEY

DEPENDS UPON THE BATTLE NOW BEING FOUGHT.

Servian King's Brother Led Cavalry Charge at Kumanova—A Turkish Officer Degraded and Shot.

London, Oct. 30.—The long awaited battle which will decide the fate of Turkey is now being fought. The army, under Nazim Pasha, minister of war, and commander-in-chief, is engaged, and according to Constantinople official despatches, the operations are favorable to the Ottomans. The despatches, however, do not indicate where the chief action is taking place or how the opposing forces compare. It is Turkey's last chance to retrieve an almost hopeless campaign. Nazim Pasha is fighting with his back to the wall; his communications have been cut off and it is impossible for him to get fresh supplies or reinforcements.

In Constantinople the feeling of confidence is reviving. It is believed that the war minister has at last assumed the offensive. But this is by no means certain, as the battle may have been forced upon him.

King's Brother Led Cavalry.

Vranza, Servia, Oct. 30.—At the battle of Kumanova the Servians lost 500 killed and 2,000 wounded. Turks lost 10,000 killed or wounded. All accounts of the fight pay tribute to the valor of the Servian officers and men. Lieut. Milich, commanding an infantry company, blew out his brains rather than obey a command to retire from an exposed position; whereupon the men charged the Turks, with the result that all of them were killed.

The cavalry, with the king's brother, Prince Arseno, at the head, charged repeatedly. The commander-in-chief, Crown Prince Alexander, was frequently on the firing line and entered the town while the battle was in full swing. Wherever he passed the soldiers, even the wounded, cheered.

Absence of War News.

London, Oct. 30.—There is a marked absence to-day of definite news from the Balkans. Even Sofia, which is generally full of reports of grand victories for the Bulgarians, would not reply to-day, to telegrams sent by diplomats of all the big cities of Europe. This is taken to indicate, perhaps, that the Bulgarians have met with a severe reverse at the battle of Erkeno River, which has been raging for two days. Constantinople has a comparison of casualties.

Vienna, Oct. 30.—Estimates made here from semi-official figures indicate that the Turks have lost seven thousand killed and eleven thousand wounded since the fighting with the allied troops began, while the Servians, Bulgarians, Montenegrins and Greeks killed and twenty thousand wounded. This would seem to indicate that the Turks have been generally fighting to death.

Degraded and Shot.

Constantinople, Oct. 30.—Aziz Pasha, cavalry officer, who was held responsible for the fall of Kirk Kilissa, was publicly degraded and shot here to-day.

Deer Hunters Depart.

Deer season opens on Friday and the hunting camps are already alive with dogs, guns and grub, waiting for the arrival of the campers. Many of the sportsmen are already on the ground, while others are preparing to go. A party from Battersea left on the 1.30 for Clarendon Station and are going into camp at Crotch Lake near there. The party carried their dogs and provisions and included James Johnston, of Kingston, George Kirkpatrick, Richard Lake, John Miller, and Fred Mathis, all of Battersea. Another camp is being made up at Crotch Lake and consists of Dr. Fred Nichols, John Sears and W. Morley who went on Tuesday. The rest of the party who go on Thursday are Dr. Nichols, Sr., Frederick Reid and Kent Martin.

Another party left on Wednesday for Barriere Station near which they camped at Mile Lake. The party consists of W. Blake, M.P.P., of Parham, R. Hamilton, Godfrey, S. Asselstine, Verona; Chester Godfrey, of Godfrey; George Smith, Harrowsmith; W. Stanford, Verona. The party will be joined on Thursday by J. M. Theobald, Kingston.

"The Merry Widow."

An operetta is a comedy with appropriate, indigenous, musical accompaniment. It is distinguished from musical comedy, because the latter is generally a dramatic and musical crazy quilt. Now we know all about it, and, therefore, we know more than the average American author or composer or that rare affair, one who is called on the program, a librettist.

This may be a vigorous, intolerant position to assume; but the announcement that "The Merry Widow," the queen of the Viennese operettas, will be offered by Henry W. Savage at the Grand Opera House, Thursday, October 31st, puts a lot of musical stiffening into one's spine, and causes the reflection that after all the American composer has had his lesson and either won't, or is unable to benefit by it, most probably the latter.
