PLANS AN INCREASE

STOCK MELON FOR WINDSOR HOTEL SHAREHOLDERS.

Cedar Rapids Co. Plans Increase of Capital Stock—Standard Oil of Indiana Paying Well.

Montreal, Oct. 29.—The Windsor hotel directors have issued a proposition to the shareholders to exchange their rates for those of a new company in the ratio of two of the new for one of the old.

A circular asking for proxies has been sent out on behalf of the directors and is understood to have been freely responded to.

The company's property has increased in value to such a marked extent within the past few years that a stock "melon" has been anticipated for some time.

The real estate holdings of the company alone exceed the present outstanding capital of the company.

The present authorized capital is \$2,000,000, of which \$1,500,000 is paid up, on which dividends at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum are paid.

According to the plan proposed, a new company will be formed, with a capital of \$3,000,000, the shares of which will be exchanged on the basis of two of the new for one of the old. The present market price of the shares stands around 150.

A provincial charter, under the name of the Windsor hotel company, limited, has already been secured and the entire assets and undertakings of the present company will be taken over.

The directors unanimously recommend that the shareholders agree to assist in carrying out the proposed reorganization.

Made 3,000 Per Cent.

New York, Oct. 29.—A regular quarterly dividend of three per cent. and an extra dividend of 7 per cent. has been declared on the \$30,000,000 capital stock of the Standard Oil company of Indiana. Last May the company declared a 29.99 per cent. dividend, increasing the capital stock from \$1,000,000 to \$30,000,000. Three months ago its initial regular quarterly dividend of 83 was declared. The present declaration if maintained, represents 3,600 per cent. per annum for original holdings.

To Increase Capital.

Montreal, Oct. 29.—The Cedar Rapids Power and Manufacturing company plans increasing its capital stock from ten million to fifteen million dollars. This will be done by the issuing of 50,000 shares of new stock at a par value of \$100. The details of the proposed issue have not yet been made public. A meeting of the shareholders to authorize the issue is called for November 4th.

Suit to Stop Sale.

Boston, Oct. 29.—A bill in equity has been filed in the Supreme Court, in which Sir Frederick W. Gordon and other capitalists interested in the Butte Central Copper company are named as defendants.

It is alleged in the bill that the defendants are intending to sell 7,000 shares of the stock to one Clinton at 1.60 a share, while the ruling market price is between \$7 and \$8. The petitioners desire to have the transfer of the stock adjourned and a receiver appointed.

Sells Serial Notes.

Montreal, Oct. 29.—Grand Trunk Railway company has sold \$2,700,000 4 1/2 per cent. Car Trust notes, maturing serially in one to ten years to Blair & Co., of New York. There has recently been considerable enquiry for car and equipment notes from Canadian companies, owing to the ready market which can be secured for them from trust and insurance companies.

Financial Notes.

The firm of J. P. Morgan & Company, New York, received \$3,000,000 in International Harvester Stock as a commission for the sale of D. M. Osborne & Company's plant to the syndicate trust.

There is a rumor that the Nipissing Mines Co. will increase its dividend in the very near future.

Dividends payable by Canadian companies during November, while no means equal in amount to those disbursed last month, will run into the millions of dollars. Payments by some of the chartered banks will help to swell the total by a considerable extent.

A. E. Ames & Co., Toronto, stock brokers, are opening an office in Montreal.

The Grand Trunk Railway traffic earnings for the week ended October 21st were \$1,132,152, an increase of \$108,260 over the same week last year.

The Bank of Montreal, in addition to the forthcoming regular quarterly dividend of 2 1/2 per cent., has declared a second bonus of 1 per cent., making the full payment for the 12 per cent.

The Canadian Car & Foundry Co. is making application at the next session of parliament for authorization to construct and operate a line of railway between the Dominion and Turcor plants. The line will be about three miles in length.

Dividend and interest disbursements by railroad, industrial and traction corporations in the United States next month will amount to \$161,425,275, as against \$94,039,471 in November a year ago, or an increase of \$10,325,804.

A report is being circulated to the effect that the Bailey Cobalt Mines Limited, has of late been buying its own stock on the market with a view of reducing its capitalization, and it is believed that about a million shares have been taken up in this manner. The company has an authorized capitalization of \$5,000,000, of which 4,250,000 shares have been issued.

3,000,000 ABNORMAL.

Costs \$200,000,000 a Year, Says Dean Sumner.

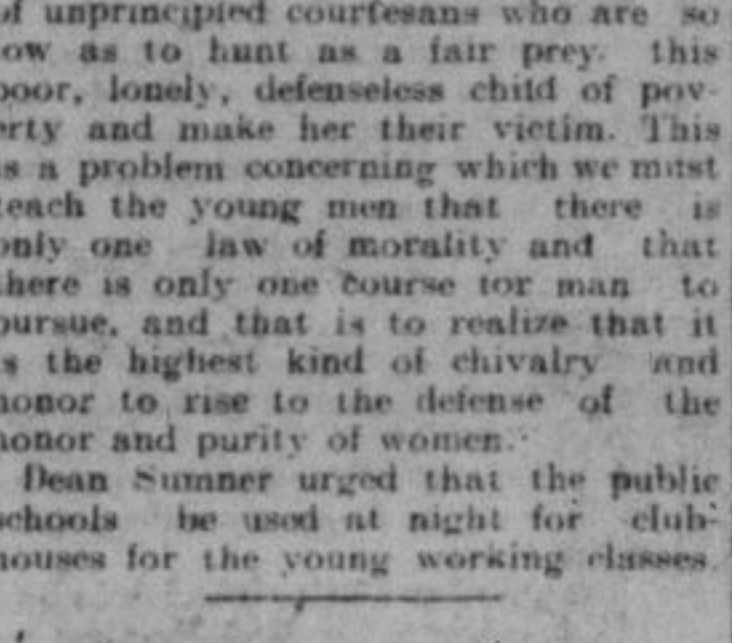
Springfield, Ill., Oct. 29.—There are 3,000,000 abnormal people in the United States, and it costs \$200,000,000 a year to care for them, so it was asserted by Rev. Walter Taylor Sumner, dean of the Protestant Episcopal cathedral of Chicago, in the annual address to the Illinois State Conference of Charities and Correction. Sixty to seventy per cent. of the abnormal, he added, could be saved by education.

Referring to the social evil in Chicago the dean stated that the business there yields \$16,000,000 annual profits, maintains 5,000 women regularly and claims 1,000 female recruits every twelve months.

"It is hard to state," he went on, "what contributes to this supply of 1,000 souls a year—the housing conditions, the economic conditions, ignorance and despair and discouragement, social attainments, the lack of a place to go for honest, simple, clean recreation and the one great thing, man. It is a man problem, not a woman problem, that we face. See these thousands, actually thousands, of young girls as they leave the stores and the marts of industry to go home—tired to the point of recklessness—to some little attic, crowded in, with coarse, vulgar men, tired and hungry and lonely, hungry not only for food but for a word of sympathy and love and what do they meet? The advance of unprincipled courtesans who are so low as to hunt as a fair prey this poor, lonely, defenseless child of poverty and make her their victim. This is a problem concerning which we must teach the young men that there is only one law of morality and that there is only one course for man to pursue, and that is to realize that it is the highest kind of chivalry and honor to rise to the defense of the honor and purity of women."

Dean Sumner urged that the public schools be used at night for clubhouses for the young working classes.
