**HOSPITAL WOMAN'S AID**

HELD ITS ANNUAL MEETING ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Raised \$13,000 During the Year—Mrs. J. C. Connell Was Re-elected President—A Resolution Passed.

The regular monthly and the annual meeting of the Woman's Aid Society of Kingston general hospital was held Wednesday afternoon, in the boardroom, a goodly attendance of members being present.

The business in connection with the regular meeting was first taken up, including reports from the different committees as well as one from the visiting ladies for the month.

The president submitted the annual report. During the year the sum of about \$700 has been paid for linen, cutlery, dishes and other things for the hospital, also the salary of the dietitian. With the exception of tag day, from which the sum of \$900 was realized, the year has been taken up with the preparation and carrying out of the Festival of Empire, and as a result of the work a sum amounting to over \$12,000 will be handed to the building committee, to be applied to the erection of the new wing in this connection the following resolution was passed unanimously:

"That the thanks of the society be tendered to all who assisted in making the Festival of Empire so great a success; to all the members of the various committees; to the many workmen who gave their services freely; to all who assisted in the various entertainments; to contractors and others who made donations of materials and services; and to all who contributed in any way to making up the large amount of money to be devoted to the erection of the Empire wing of the hospital."

The election of officers then took place, which resulted in the reappointment of the committee of last year, namely: President, Mrs. J. C. Connell; first vice-president, Mrs. H. A. Calvin; second vice-president, Mrs. J. E. Reid; treasurer, Mrs. G. A. McGowan; recording secretary, Miss Agnes Gibson; corresponding secretary, Mrs. A. Clarke; buyers, Mrs. D. Murray and Mrs. W. G. Craig; executive committee, Mrs. John McKay and Miss Strang.

**WANTED! A QUORUM**

OF CITY PROPERTY COMMITTEE TO DO BUSINESS.

Ald. Givens Presided All Alone—Board of Works and Utilities to Consider the Street Railway Company's Paving Offer.

The City Property committee was to have had a meeting on Wednesday afternoon but the chairman, Ald. Givens, was the only member who put in an appearance. The forestalling by-law and the heating of the city buildings constituted the budget. The chairman would like to have a by-law submitted to the people at the January elections authorizing the issue of debentures for the outlay in installing a heating plant in the city buildings, as the question seems too large for the Finance committee of the council to handle.

**Street Railway Question.**

This afternoon, the Board of Works is to meet, and the members of the Finance committee have been asked to confer with it regarding the street railway company's conditional street-paving offer, which depends upon the price of power not being raised when the present agreement with the city is renewed. The Board of Works would like to have the paving of the business streets along the line of the railway commenced next spring, and if an agreement is made with the company this coming winter, all can be in readiness to start the work before the 1st of May next.

**Work on Barrie Street.**

Weather permitting, the city engineer expects that the paving of Barrie street, up to Union street, will be finished next Tuesday. Next spring the remainder of the street, up to Princess street, will be done, and afterwards, Wellington street, from West to Clarence, will be tackled.
