Record Business.

New York, Oct. 30. - While incoming orders of United States steel since first of October have shown wide fluctuations and a week ago estimates were made of decrease in unfilled orders for this month, there has been heavy increase in orders in last ten days, until now it is practically certain that untilled tonnage for October will show increase of between 350,000 and 400,000 tons. Should present rate business keep up until end of month, here is a chance that a new record for increase in unfilled orders will be established this month for year 1912.


