# WILL TRY TO AROUSE

## THE SLEEPING MEMBERS OF HIS CONGREGATION.

Rev. F. G. Robinson Preaches a Vigorous Sermon on the Question, "Is it Possible to Arouse a Sleeping Church?"

In Princess Street Methodist church on Sunday evening, Rev. F. G. Robinson took for his subject: "Is it possible to arouse a sleeping church?" In introducing the subject, he said that the early Christians used to sleep spiritually and the apostles Paul and Peter roused them up, and said Mr. Robinson intended to do the same this evening. What does the church stand for? To continue the work of Christ, etc. It was not a club, or a place where people could take things easy, but was intended to do practical work "the salvation of the individual and the community."

When people became church members they took upon themselves solemn obligations, but multitudes failed to keep them, and this was a proof that they had lost their love for Christ. There are others who profess to love Christ part of the time, they make a loud noise during special services once a year it may be, but for the balance of the year they are asleep. But this is not the religion of Jesus Christ. A genuine Christian is awake spiritually all the time. He is always engaged in God's service. Always in his place in the house of God on a wet or stormy Sunday. He is not all the time looking for some reason to take offence, for example, when the minister preaches a heart-searching sermon which touches some of his weak points, etc.

Mr. Robinson then went on to describe how eloquent some people could be outside the church, but in the prayer meeting or class meeting they were as silent as the grave, and when the meeting was over they would lament that the services of today are not what they were thirty or forty years ago. These people simply go to the house of God to find fault with the minister and other church members, who are trying to save souls. The reason that so many services are without life is because so many church members have gone to sleep, and are not doing their duty.

How many people there are in the different churches to-day who can pray until they almost shake the building, and yet you can never get them to assist in any work towards the salvation of precious and immortal souls.

"I want to tell you, brethren and sisters, that God will not bless an indolent or lazy church. If you are simply praying and doing nothing more we are insulting our Great Father in heaven. There are thousands of professing Christians who have never put forth the slightest effort to save an immortal soul, and spend all their time finding fault with those in the church who are trying to do so. But this is a mistake, for the Bible says that slothfulness is wickedness, and how will these people meet God who have entered the church simply that they might take a rest once or twice each Sunday in a comfortably cushioned pew. I question very much if these people who profess to be Christians who are doing nothing for the salvation of mankind and the uplifting of the world will ever get into the kingdom of heaven at all.

A church that is asleep, or a Christian who is not a worker, is injuring not only the religion of Christ, but keeping others from accepting Him as their saviour. Multitudes are stumbling over professing Christians, who are hypocrites into eternal destruction. The only reason why they do not get saved is because they do not begin to work for Christ and keep at it. Activity means not only your own salvation but the salvation of the church and the world."

In closing Mr. Robinson gave a heart-searching appeal to his congregation to wake up and become a living church, dead to sin and alive to righteousness, so that as a church and people Princess street would fulfil its mission and receive the commendation of the Master at last. "Well done, good and faithful servant," etc., and be welcomed around the throne by those they had been the means of rescuing from sin, and assisting in the battles of life.

This vicinity is one of great interest to geologist and mineralogist for everywhere technical terms are beautifully exemplified by nature.
