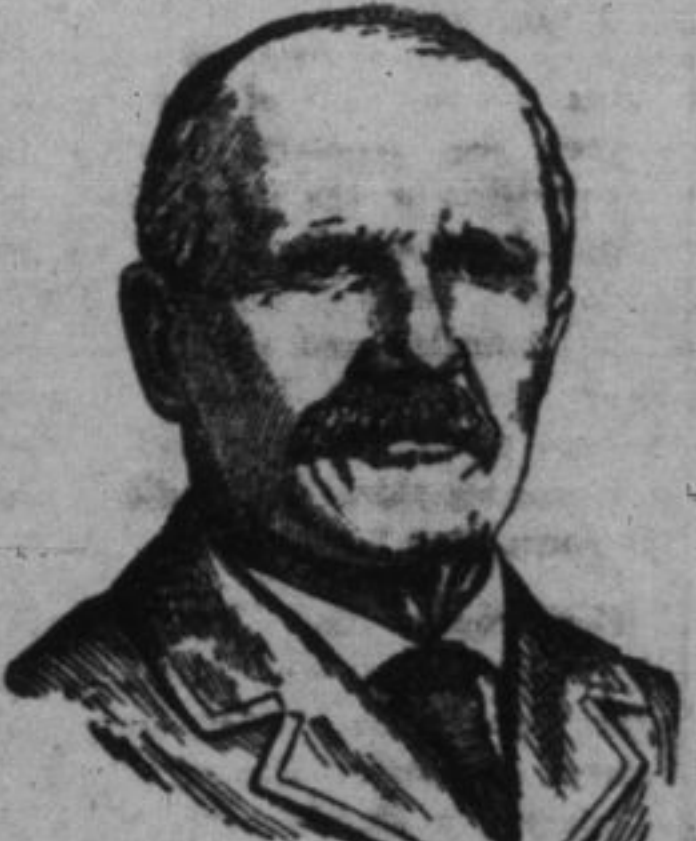

IMMENSITY OF PLACE How He Escaped An Operation

THAT JESUS HOLDS IN THE WORLD TO-DAY.
Fine Sermon in St. Andrew's Church on Sunday Evening by Rev. W. J. Clarke, D.D., of Montreal.

The Sunday evening service at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, was conducted by Rev. W. J. Clarke, D.D., Montreal. The preacher brought out in a most emphatic manner the immensity of the place that Christ Jesus holds in the world to-day and gave a few simple reasons for the importance of his place. Dr. Clarke's address was beautiful in its simplicity and held the large congregation in the closest attention. He read his text from II Corinthians—"To wit that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself."

What strangely different meanings the word God has conveyed to men at the various periods of the world's history, he said, first the thought of many gods was man's belief, then one God, a terrible being or at least one who was indifferent to human suffering. The latter idea is still present with us. Is it any wonder that men sometimes regard God as indifferent. "I visited a man recently who had a large family and was paralyzed into utter helplessness. He turned on me savagely for an explanation of his case."

"God was in Christ Jesus." What was God's thought of Jesus. The man who has exercised so strong an influence over the world. What an utterly inexplicable thing it is, the place he holds in the world's life. On the one hand passionately loved and served by great numbers of people, on the other hated and despised, his superb attitude to the world, the helplessness of mankind, His wonderful and tender love. He appealed to the outcast woman, he appealed to the scholar, to Nicodemus and to the wealthy Joseph. What a place he holds in human thought.

We often think that the world would have missed if certain great men had not lived. Shakespeare who gave the English race a language and a great literature. Tennyson, who gave us "In Memoriam." But when we speak of Jesus we pass into another atmosphere. Oh, how He never faded the streets of Jerusalem. His work and His teaching was the flower and fruit of them all. The others all shine with His light and if the blight of a great sorrow comes now to any of us, to whom do we go?

If we were possible to take Jesus and all that He means to the world out of history we cannot conceive the loss. "God was in Christ." The mighty God of the ocean and the storm was in Christ. It is good to know that the great eternal being when He presents Himself to the human race is such an one as Christ Jesus. He was in this guise reconciling the world unto Himself. That men might understand who He was, if the eternal God is such an one as Jesus need we be afraid of Him, and how can we fail to long for freedom from whatever would offend Him?

We have in our modern times many problems, but of all problems that should demand our attention, the most important is this, "Is it true that God is such a one as Jesus?" This is what the gospel teaches. It's the old, old story of Jesus' love to the world.

DIED AT SHARLOT LAKE.

The Late James Ryan, Veteran of Crimean War.
The death occurred at Sharlot Lake on Friday night of James Ryan. The deceased gentleman for years was a resident of that place. He was born in Ireland seventy-eight years ago, and was a veteran of the Crimean war. He leaves a wife, two sons and five daughters: John, of Sharlot Lake; Martin, of Toronto; Mrs. Purcell and Mrs. McKim, of this city; Mrs. John Redmond of Sharlot Lake; Miss Maud at home, and Miss Mary, of this city.
The remains were brought to the Kingston and Pembroke railway and the funeral took place to St. Mary's Cathedral, where a solemn service was celebrated by Rev. Father Hanley, after which the remains were interred in St. Mary's cemetery.

Rushing the Road Paving.

The work on the new pavements on the four downtown blocks is being rushed along. The block on Clarence street, between Wellington and King, is now completed and the first wagon drove over it on Monday morning, but it will not be open for traffic up as far as Wellington street until the block from Brock to Clarence is completed. CONGREGATION OF COOKE'S Will Try and Retain the Services of Its Pastor.

The call to Rev. J. W. McIntosh from Prince Albert, Sask., has caused regret on the part of the members of his congregation of Cooke's church. At a meeting of the session, held on Sunday evening, a resolution was passed urging Mr. McIntosh to remain in his charge in Kingston, and representatives were appointed to press the claims of Cooke's church before the presbytery when it meets in December.

A member of the congregation, in conversation with the Whig, said that Cooke's was certainly "up against it" with regard to its ministers. Rev. Prof. Alexander Laird, and Rev. Dr. MacLachlan had been taken away after considerably short pastorates to fill other positions, and now, Mr. McIntosh's possible departure comes as a great shock. Mr. McIntosh has not been with the congregation for a year. His call to the west is keenly felt, as he has won the way to the hearts of the members of his congregation, and started on what augurs to be most successful work.

However, Mr. McIntosh has not decided his intention to accept or decline the call to Prince Albert, and the action of the session stands pending the name.

What is Now Provided For. The Canadian naval service law makes full provision for an emergency, and for lending our ships to the British government when necessary. That law also asserts the principle of Canadian control of control by the government and parliament of Canada. There can be no objection to that except from those who distrust the government and parliament of Canada, distrust their honesty and their patriotism, or hate Canadian self-government. There is nothing in the naval service law limiting the size of our fleet, or prescribing the kind of ships to be built. Mr. Borden may order any kind of ships he pleases under that law. A.J. he has to do is to enlarge the present fleet, and use the law that is in on the statute book.

Old English Sunday.

Those who object to Sunday amusements sometimes speak as though in bygone times our countrymen were exemplars in their observance of the Sabbath. In 1855, however, a chronicler, quoted by Mr. Nevill, in "The Merry Past," estimated that over 300,000 Londoners spent their Sundays in the inns and ten gardens round the metropolis, and the condition of these pleasure-seekers at nightfall is calculated to be as follows: Sober, 50,000; in high glee, 90,000; drunkish, 30,000; staggering tipsy, 15,000; raggy, 15,000; dead drunk, 5,000.—London Chronicle.
