TALKS ABOUT A WHITE CANADA

Mrs. Gordon Wright Says a Number of Very Bright Things

Deals With Many of the Existing Evils—Alone on the Rock of Righteousness Can Nations Build—Regards Mormonism as a Menace.

Mrs. Gordon Wright, president of the Canadian W.C.T.U., has been speaking in the west on "A White Canada," and among other things said: "White Canada might mean different things from different viewpoints was the speaker's first thought, and just as white light was a combination of all different colors, so the white Canada must eliminate from it every unwholesome quality. Mrs. Wright spoke of the natural resources of the country and what a really great chance Canadian women had to develop them. "If Canadian policy and Canadian politics are not in accordance with the ten commandments she will follow the tracks of the other great nations that have sinned," said Mrs. Wright. "For on the rock of righteousness alone may nations build. In fifty years, it is not too optimistic to look forward to a population of fifty millions, and our influence for good will be as we are able to develop the masses that come to our door. If we do not mould them they will mould us."

The Cigarette Evil.
One of the great evils that Mrs. Wright spoke of as a menace to the country was the cigarette evil. Her figures were most convincing of the growth of the habit in that there were one hundred million more cigarettes smoked in Canada this year than there were last year. It was through the influence of the W.C.T.U. that the prohibitive age limit law was brought in, and though inadequate since the figures are still 384,000,000 cigarettes consumed per year from the latest statistics, it was a move in the right direction. Mrs. Wright appealed to the women never to allow the evil to penetrate to their dominion and quoted the mothers in the watchful training of their daughters and cited many cases showing that it was the girls from being unsophisticated, not naturally depraved, that led to the trouble, and that it was the towns now, not so much the large centers where the mothers are carefully guarded. "The heart of every Canadian woman should be touched," said Mrs. Wright, "when she realizes that 1,500 girls from Canada go annually to the vice markets of the world."

Mormonism a Menace.
Mormonism was the next menace dealt with, and the speaker asked why we in Canada should tolerate what the European countries were shutting their doors upon, countries such as Austria, Prussia, and Holland. The British government also are on the alert, investigating the number of girls brought out by the Mormons to Utah and Southern Alberta. Mrs. Wright dealt next with the legalized liquor traffic, and quoted the famous words of David Lloyd George: "This is our ideal for England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, a land where you meet no drunkard, where two-thirds of the prison cells are empty because there is no liquor, a land where the curse of strong drink is removed from the land," and the saying of Jane Adams: "If we could only wipe out liquor we could practically wipe out vice." The speaker appealed to the individual effort of every worker to help exterminate this evil from the land.

The rapid influx of immigration was what appealed to Mrs. Wright most in the west, and she felt the danger of this tide coming to the country with greater force than could be handled. "Are the lower standards coming from Europe to rule us or are we to imbue them with our higher civilization?" She spoke of the missionary that had to teach the children and enter the homes of the foreign element particularly, and how great a work lay before dozens of missionaries of this kind, could the union afford to send them out. "If we are ever to win a white Canada, every man, woman and child must do their best," concluded Mrs. Wright.

CAPITAL FLOTATIONS WORST STOMACH TROUBLE ENDED
STANDARD OIL OF INDIANA PAYS BIG DIVIDENDS.
New Process of Sugar Manufacture Affecting Prices—Mine Has Paid Back 21,700 Per Cent. to Its Shareholders.
Toronto, Nov. 7.—The current year has been prolific in capital flotations in Canada, although the past couple of months have been quiet in that respect.
On the whole, developments in that connection have been of exceptional interest to the stock markets.
The present time is not propitious for further developments along those lines, but it is understood that plans are afoot in several quarters for new issues which may be brought out before the end of the year.
In all probability this year will provide a record in Canada for the creation of new companies and the reorganization of old ones involving the offering of shares for public subscription.

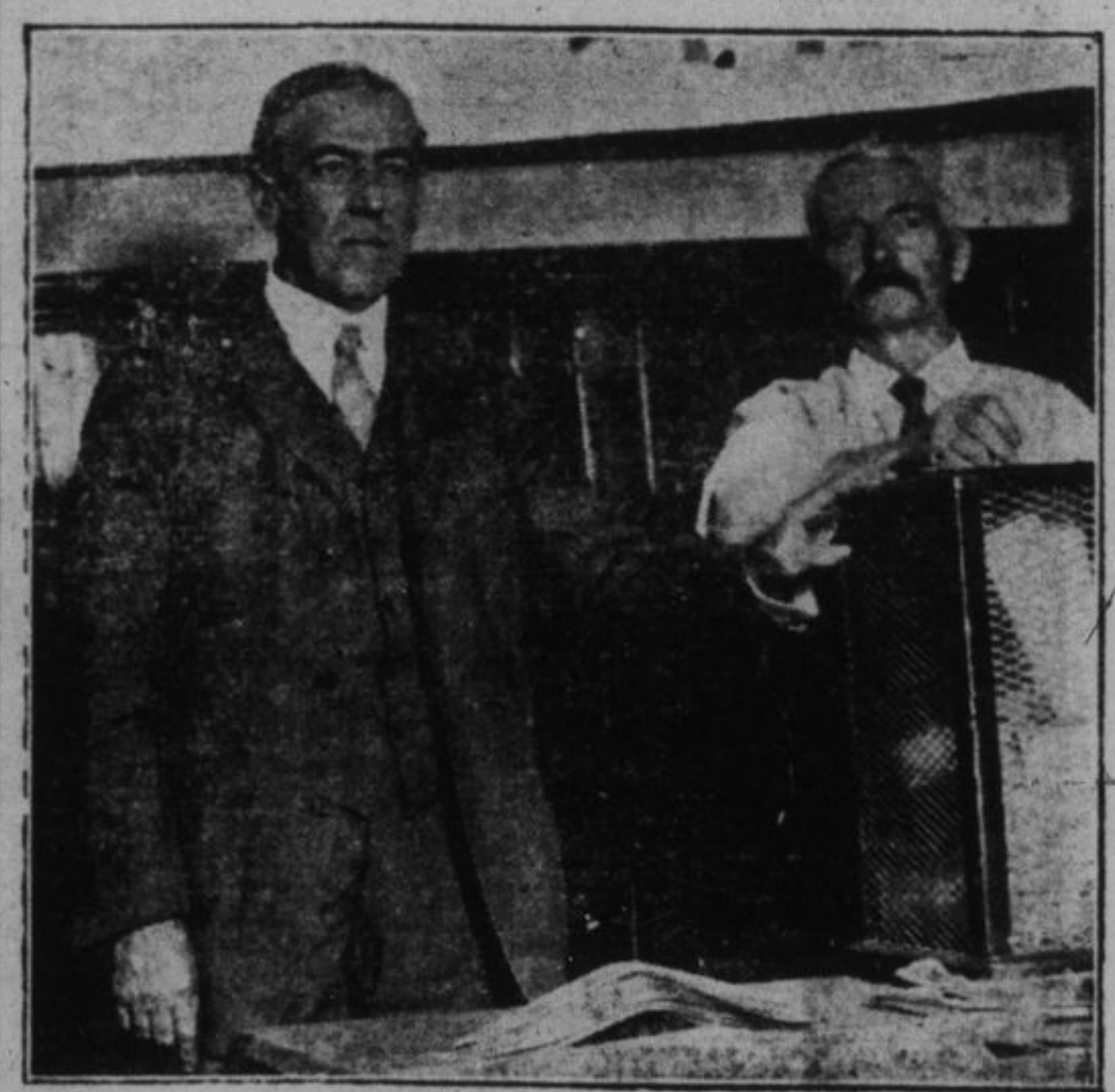
Pays Big Dividends.
New York, Nov. 7.—With the payment of the extra dividend of 87 per share in connection with the regular quarterly dividend of \$3, payable Nov. 30th, the Standard Oil company of Indiana will have distributed nearly \$1,000,000 to its stockholders since the 2,900 per cent. stock dividend of May 15th last. This company is the only one which has officially designated its dividends as quarterly. In connection with the new dividend, it is pointed out in some quarters that the recent downward tendency of the oil company stocks has developed a rather extensive short interest, and the result of this situation, in view of the now expected advance in the stock, is awaited with interest. The Indiana company is understood to be earning in the neighborhood of forty per cent. on its new capitalization.

Paid High Dividends.
Toronto, Nov. 7.—The Temiskaming and Hudson Bay Mining company directors have declared dividend No. 13 at the rate of 200 per cent., payable on Nov. 14th. This is the seventh dividend for the current year and brings the total dividends paid up to 21,700 per cent. of the capitalization. Another payment of thirty per cent. is expected next month. The distribution of profits, including this latest dividend, amounts to \$1,684,137.

No Acquisition by Frisco.
New York, Nov. 7.—It is authoritatively stated that there is no truth in the rumor from the southwest that the Frisco system will take over the Missouri, Oklahoma and Gulf Railway on January 1st. This company has rented some trackage from the Frisco but it was stated that these are the only relations existing of contemplated between the roads.

Ordered 15,000 Cars.
Pittsburg, Nov. 7.—United States railroads have placed orders for nearly 15,000 cars and 97 locomotives, with inquiries in the market for 40,000 cars and 200 locomotives.
The pressure for semi-finished steel was but little relieved, although the output of steel ingots for October was 2,800,000 tons, which exceeded the previous maximum monthly record by at least 150,000 tons.
The Carnegie Steel company took foreign orders for 400,000 tons of steel products during the first nine months of the year, which is a new high record.

Affecting Prices.
New York, Nov. 7.—There was a seven point drop in American Beet Sugar in New York, and the other sugar securities were also on the weak side. While the fear of drastic tariff action by the democratic government is generally credited with causing the drop, it is also being quietly said that the discovery of a new process for the manufacture of sugar, which will eliminate a large amount of present expense in having a lot to do with it, is understood (that the rights to this new process are held by the United Fruit company).

Lorne McGill and F. H. Anson of Montreal are here consulting the commissioners. An unconfirmed report says the city wants \$1,000,000 as a deposit as a guarantee of bona fides, or the right will revert to the city.

DISSIPATION KILLS MEN.
Women Live Much Longer, Statistics Prove.
Paris, Nov. 8.—The greater longevity of women than of men is shown by recent French insurance statistics the advantage of the feminine side being almost one-third.
Thus the average age at death of feminine annuitants on one company's books is seventy, while for men it is barely 50. Another company has several centenarians, all women, on its books. These annuitants have already received their money back five or six times over. The company is thinking of revising its tariff, making the scale for women much higher.
A distinguished doctor, when asked to account for women's longer lives, said:
"Men live much harder; smoke and drink too much, even though they rarely work too much. Women are wiser and think of the future, rarely smoke and drink one-tenth as much while their pre-occupations and moral sufferings are much less intense."
"At forty a woman is in the plenitude of her physical powers, while a man at the same age had probably contracted organic weakness which will shorten life."

ATTRACTED ATTENTION.
Posthumous Children Who Have Become Famous.
The birth of a posthumous child of John Jacob Astor arouses especial interest and sympathy because of the tragic death of the father in the Titanic disaster. Yet all posthumous children excite such sentiments. Some of these children have, moreover, attracted additional attention from the world in after life through their own achievement.
Alexander the Great has been said by some historians to have been born after the death of his father, but according to other authorities Philip of Macedon lived to enjoy the companionship of his son for several years. It may be that Alexander's stepbrother was a posthumous child, but that has not been proved.
Ben Johnson, the Elizabethan dramatist, was born in 1573, a month after his father's death. He was fortunate in acquiring a stepfather who was a good friend to him and gave him an excellent education.
Thomas Herbert was of posthumous birth, so says his elder brother, Lord Herbert of Chesham. He is remembered chiefly as the brother of Lord Herbert of Chesham and of George Herbert, the poet.

Early in the seventeenth century another child came into the world under similar conditions. This was Abraham Cowley, the English poet. His father, who had been a grocer in humble circumstances, died shortly before the death of the son. Thanks to the unflagging struggle and devotion of his mother the boy received a good education and his poetic genius had opportunity for development.
Dean Swift was born a few months after his father's death. Kindly disposed relatives helped his mother with his upbringing and education. Adam Smith, author of "The Wealth of Nations," put in his appearance in this world some four months after the death of his father.
Still another English poet was a posthumous child. This was Thomas Chatterton, who was born in Bristol about the middle of the eighteenth century.
Andrew Jackson, seventh president of the United States, was born in a little log cabin on the border line between North and South Carolina. In that same cabin his father, who had come to America from the north coast of Ireland, died a few days before the birth of his son.
