### Should Have Franchise.

Prof. Macnaughton Addressed Montreal Women's Canadian Club.

Prof. Macnaughton, of McGill University, gave an address on "Woman's Influence," at the first luncheon of the Women's Canadian Club, held Thursday afternoon, in the Royal Victoria College. The speaker, in effect, that in his opinion women ought to have votes, but that it would be a thousand pities if in the process of gaining them, they should be obliged to come back with their heads on them, had no votes. Those quiet and gentle forces which are the secret of their true influence in the world. They are now and have always been a mighty power, even in the state, without votes. The Spartan women who could tell their sons to fight to come back with their shields on them, had no votes. Jane Addams has no vote and no voters, as she is a spinster, and yet she is by universal consent the first citizen of Chicago. And if the American people had set up the bull moose in a stall in their own house, as the Egyptians used to do with the Bull-God Apis, that result would have been largely due to the woman who has neither vote nor voter. She was the chief asset of the progressive republicans.

What are the main lines of women's influence? That is as much as to ask what are the great enduring interests of the human race which have been specially entrusted to her keeping? In these things, of course, neither sex has an exclusive responsibility for anything at all. It is only by the co-operation of both that the spiritual goods can be upheld and increased. But there is nevertheless a natural division of labor between them and there are some things for which women have always accepted and must always accept a special though not an exclusive responsibility. What are they? First, purity. Surely that is woman's central concern. When women are pure, you have the good times of human history. Second—what goes with purity and cannot be had without it—sensitivity to the more delicate aspects of the world, to beauty, good manners, and all the other things which cannot be eaten. On this continent and in this city where we are threatened by the most brutal forms of materialism, of insolent, vulgar wealth, and the lavish admiration of it, it is the women above all who have stood for the finer and sweeter things. Without them the doom of Sodom and Gomorrah would have overtaken us long ago. Third—pity, protective motherliness. There is enough of it among the women of Montreal—if only it could come to itself and be brought effectively to bear—to gather under its sheltering wings all that is bruised or wounded or broken in the young life of the city. These are the main lines of woman's influence upon our national life. The vote is a mere trifle compared with them. It will be dearly bought indeed by the sacrifice of weakening of the qualities which are needed to exert such influence. As the poet says, "It is everlasting motherhood that fits us to the heights."

With two good sand pits within three miles of Kingston, there is no reason for any scarcity of this article in the Limestone town, the Lampman declares. The Lampman notes that within the past two weeks two vessels have gone on the rocks in the St. Lawrence while running in fogs, endangering the lives of passengers and crews. It would not be in such a hurry, these two ships would not have been wrecked. It is foolhardy to run vessels through a dangerous river in fogs, no matter how expert the pilot or how many charts and compasses there are aboard.

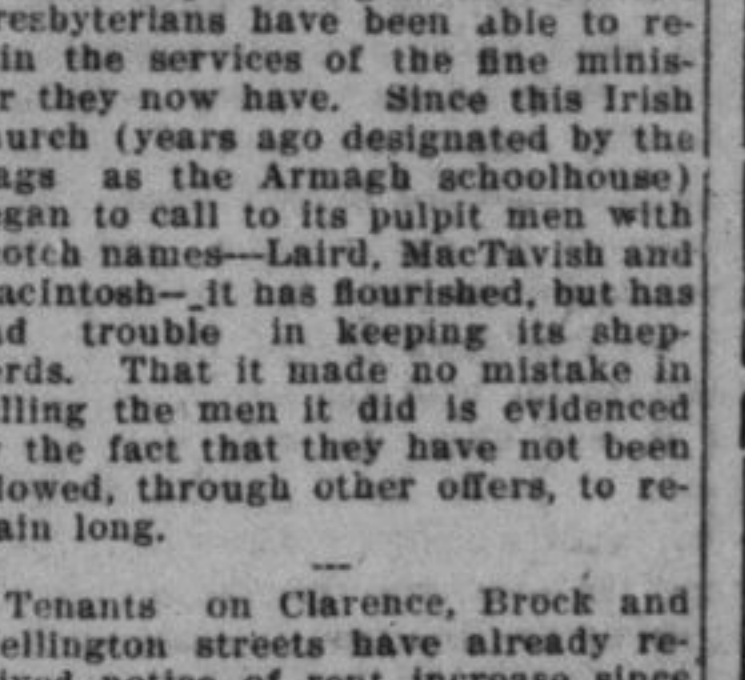
