VARSITY FEELS THAT IT WILL DEFEAT QUEEN'S.

Maynard is to Play on the 'Back Division—The Ladies' Curling Club's Annual Meeting—Other Local Sport.

Varsity "butts up" against Queen's at the athletic grounds on Saturday afternoon with the confidence of winning. And, by doing this Torontoites McGill for the senior intercollegiate championship. Sitter said that the game to-day would necessarily be one of kicking and the team had been trained with this in view. The ground makes such a course necessary, Queen's had a light practice on Friday in which a couple of new plays were worked out which may help Queen's to a better place in the estimation of Varsity. Queen's is quite sure of a victory.

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IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Work on the Steamer La Mohde is Now Well Under Way.

The work on the steamer La Mohde is well under way and the vessel will be completed in about ten days and ready for use at the opening of navigation next spring. In the meantime the boat will probably be sold by its present owners. The house boat Wenona, owned by W. H. Nichols of Brooklyn, was brought to the tug dock on Friday from Howe Island. It will have fifteen feet added to its length, which will make room for two staterooms.

The steamer Alexandria did not reach Kingston on her regular trip from Montreal, on Friday night. It was expected that she would arrive some time during Saturday afternoon.

The steamer City of Montreal arrived in port Saturday morning of her way to Port William. The schooner Abbie L. Andrew cleared on Saturday for Oswego. The tug Matagana and scow arrived at the wharf on Saturday, to load grain for Toronto.

The steamers Fairmount and Hamilton are due to arrive on Monday to discharge. The tug Hall from Montreal, with three grain barges, will probably be discharged on Monday. The steamer Belleville will make her last trip of the season west on Sunday night.

The steamer Britannic is due up from Montreal on Saturday. The steamer City of Hamilton went west on Saturday morning. The steamer Rickau King is due down Saturday evening from Smith's Falls.

The steamer Toller has been moved from the drydock wharf down to Richardson's elevator. Three and a half cents is the offering for storage grain, Lake Superior to Montreal. Boats holding out for four cents have not been placed. Two charters for this week's loading were made yesterday at three cents.

Grain freight shows little change and carriers will be busy to the end of the season.
