COMMENTS ON SATURDAY'S RUGBY CONTESTS.

Ottawas Hopeful of Defeating Argonauts in Toronto—The Toronto Opinion is That 'Varsity Will Defeat Queen's Here.

Toronto Globe: If Queen's play the kind of game at Kingston on Saturday that they played against University of Toronto in the Blue and White will have to be at their best to win.

Should Varsity tie McGill for the Intercollegiate championship, it is likely that Ben Simpson, of Hamilton will referee, as he is agreeable to both teams.

In the event of H.M.C. winning the Intercollegiate intermediate series will play Ottawa, in Ottawa, on Nov. 23rd, the winner going west to meet Rough Riders in the final Nov. 30th.

Toronto Globe: Varsity should win from Queen's on Saturday, but with Maynard not in the best of condition, it looks like McGill for the Intercollegiate championship.

Varsity has a pretty classy back division at present even without Maynard, Crawford, Foster and Curzen are good ones.

Toronto Argonauts will use the same back division against the Ottawas on Saturday. They will also retain the identical line that finished out last Saturday's game.

Argonauts built an additional blusher, to hold 600 extra at the Ottawa game Saturday.

Father Stanton says that the Ottawas were miles below form last week and does not think they will have much difficulty in downsing the smaller, providing they get back into the stride which they used against the Tiger and Montreal teams.

Secretary Art Gray, of the Varsity rugby club, is in receipt of a letter from McGill, stating that in the event of a tie in the senior series, McGill would like to suggest Lansdowne Park, Ottawa, where there is seating accommodation for a large crowd.

Varsity do not prefer Ottawa, and would toss with McGill to see whether the game be played at the M.A.A. grounds, or at the Royal York, Toronto. In the event of the teams not agreeing, the Intercollegiate executive will decide the place.

Ottawa Citizen: "Jack" Williams has a grievance because of criticism in connection with his outside kick in the third quarter of last Saturday's game, when the Ottawas were within a few yards of the Argonauts line.

"I went out there to obey the signals," said Williams. "The quarter-back called for an outside kick and I delivered what he wanted. The correct play would have been a high punt over the line. We would have been sure of one point and probably six."

Sudden Death of J. M. Clarke. Seldom has news of a death caused such widespread and heartfelt remorse as that of John M. Clarke, Belleville beloved and only son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Clarke, Pittsburgh. For the past two years he has been in the employ of the G.I.H. and on Sunday morning, October 20th, while looking out the cab window inspecting the car wheels, was struck by Lancaster bridge and death was instantaneous. The remains were taken back to Cornwall and left in charge of the undertaker three who forwarded the casket to the T. I. junction, where it was met by relatives of deceased and W. Edwards, undertaker, Gananoque, who conveyed the body to his father's home, the deceased's wife and daughter having been there a week previous to the accident.

Mr. Clarke was a member of Moira Lodge, No. 11, A.F. & A.M., G.R.C., Belleville; Duferin L.O.L. 1269, Pittsburgh, and a Presbyterian in religion, having been an active member of St. John's church for years.

His funeral service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Heede, and interment took place on Tuesday, Oct. 22nd, the cortege being one of the largest ever witnessed in this vicinity, over one hundred and twenty conveyances following his remains to Willow Bank cemetery. A number of G.I.H. trainees were present to witness the last obsequies of a much beloved fellow worker.

He leaves to mourn his loss his father, mother, five sisters, viz: Mrs. V. Bullock, Gananoque; Mrs. E. J. Foland, Saskatchewan; Mrs. T. H. Conner, Killarney, Manitoba; Mrs. J. G. Higgins, and Mrs. William McLeod, Pittsburgh, and a sorrowing wife and little daughter, Nina Gertrude, ten years of age.

His popularity was evidenced by many beautiful floral tributes.

Big Gains Shown. London, Nov. 9.—The October statement of the Board of Trade shows increases of \$51,608,500 in imports and \$23,938,000 in exports. The imports of food, raw material and manufactures each increased about \$16,000,000, and manufactured goods and coal made the largest gains in the exports.

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How Governor of Oregon Decided Fate of Murderers. Portland, Ore., Nov. 9.—Five convicted murderers in the Oregon state penitentiary at Salem, doomed to death by popular vote of the people of the state, will hang on the same day, December 13th, 1912. The date of their execution was set by Governor West, when it had become certain that an initiative bill to abolish capital punishment had been defeated by an enormous majority.

All the murderers had been reprieved by Governor West, who has scruples of conscience against the death penalty. Dissatisfaction at his action caused the governor to put their fate before the people. The vote was practically two to one in favor of hanging them.
