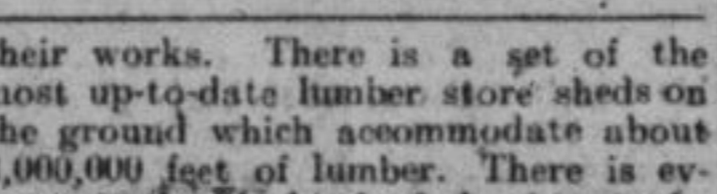

ANGLIN MILL BUSINESS

AN UP-TO-DATE SASH AND DOOR FACTORY. A Large Addition to the Old Buildings is Being Erected—Sixty Hands Are Employed. One of the liveliest of Kingston's industries and one at present indicative of growth and prosperity in the city, is the sash and door factory and saw-mill business of S. Anglin & Co., whose yards and works, at the east end of Wellington street, cover about two acres of land, stretching from Rideau street to the water's edge. The yards are on both sides of the railway tracks, entering and leaving the city, and all trains pass through this busy little place, which cannot fail to impress the visitor with the thrift and prosperity evident there.

their works. There is a set of the most up-to-date lumber shears, 3,000,000 feet of lumber. There is every conceivable kind of lumber to be found in these buildings, in its rough state as well as dressed stock for building purposes. Bordering the water are the power plant saw-mill, factory, planing-mill, machine shop, the power plant supplies motive power to the mill and factories, as well as heat from exhaust steam to all the buildings. The saw-mill is the oldest part of the works, having been the beginning of the business when logs were floated and then sawed at the mill, the familiar name which still adheres to it, "Anglin's mill." The main building of the factory is 500 feet long by 100 feet wide, and is two stories high. This building is equipped with up-to-date machinery of all kinds for shaping and milling house trimmings, doors and sashes. The company also manufactures office furniture. This part of the works is fitted with a blowing or suction system, which carries off to the furnace-room all cuttings, sawdust and shavings, to be burned and the smoke kept in the building free from dirt and dust.

Seibel thrust his head and arms through a manhole in the top of a giant vat to obtain the temperature of the container. A boy saw his feet slip from a ladder and summoned fellow workmen. Seibel died in the arms of his wife.

PAPER BOX FACTORY

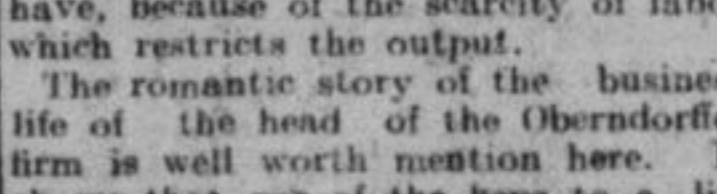
BUSY TURNING OUT A FINE CLASS OF GOODS. One of the Youngest Industries of the City Which is Making Great Progress—Company Manufacturing Boxes of Every Description—Under New Management. An industry which is filling a long felt want in the city is the Kingston Paper Box Factory, on King street west, opposite the Kingston Hosiery Mill. In addition to catering to all the local business the company carries on an order business, which extends from Halifax to Vancouver. Although one of the youngest of the industries in the city the box factory, as a result of able management, has made a name for itself, and is turning out the best goods of the kind ever manufactured in Eastern Ontario. At the present time the company has about fifty hands employed, and judging by the amount of business now being handled the staff will be increased within a very short time. The staff has been working overtime to keep up with the orders. J. G. Brown, the superintendent, who recently took charge at the factory, is a man of wide experience, having been employed in the box factories in New York, and for a time was also employed in the leading factories in Toronto. He knows the business from A. to Z. A representative of the Whig called to see Mr. Brown to learn something about the business, which is being conducted in the old stone building, which, by the way, is quite a landmark in the city, and was shown through the busy factory. Files of boxes, of all sorts and sizes, greeted the reporter's eyes, and the scribe was informed that they were going to various parts. Just now the Christmas rush is on, and the concern is putting forth every effort to get out all the orders so as not to disappoint any person. Mr. Brown has a patent on his collapsible boxes, which have been declared, by experts, to be the finest ever turned out. There is a big demand for these boxes, and everywhere they are in great favor. The company manufactures fancy paper boxes, and boxes for every line of business. They turn out a fine lot of millinery boxes, and in addition serve tailors, clothiers, hat-makers, furriers, nonfectioners, bakers, druggists, florists, grocers, dry goods, boots and shoes, fancy goods, hardware, stationery, in fact boxes for anything and everything. The company has something to suit the taste of everyone, and would be pleased to have their representative call and furnish estimates. The company's telephone number is 583. The box factory has been making a specialty of folding boxes, and has turned out an enormously large stock of them. It might be stated that just recently the box factory came under new management, and has been meeting with great success. It is expected that the first of the year the company will be employing about 125 hands. The business is owned and controlled by the British Whig Publishing Co., Limited.

CIGAR MANUFACTURERS

WELL-KNOWN BUSINESS OF S. OBERNDORFFER & CO. Mr. Oberndorffer Started on Very Little—By Thrift and Energy He Succeeded—He is Enthusiastic Over Kingston's Prospects. In a review of Kingston's industries from the standpoint of growth and prosperity, one of the most interesting factors to be met with is the S. Oberndorffer Cigar manufacturing business. Here one finds a business built on optimism, thrift and economy, and finds a man at its head whose life has been one of prosperity and benefit to the community. The factory occupies a four-story brick building on Ontario street, near the foot of Barrack. It has a 60 foot frontage, and is about 120 feet deep. The plant and property represent an investment of about \$40,000. This firm supplies some fifty homes in the city with wage earners and the man on this work earns good pay. In regard to help Mr. Oberndorffer stated that skilled men in this line were hard to get and here he could use 100 men if he could get them. The firm was obliged to be satisfied with much smaller markets than it would otherwise have, because of the scarcity of labor which restricts the output. The romantic story of the business life of the head of the Oberndorffer firm is well worth mention here. It shows that one of the keys to a life of optimism and cheerfulness is hard work, a steep hill to climb and patriotism to one's home city and one's own business. Simon Oberndorffer came to Kingston from Germany when quite a young man with scarcely anything in the way of worldly possessions and very little knowledge of English. He acquired a little stock of jewelry and here he worked steadily for years until he had established a good business connection, and had by incessant thrift laid by enough money to open a store in the city. The Oberndorffer jewelry store was one of the landmarks of old Kingston, and for twenty years he retained this business on Princess street where Rees' confectionery store now stands. After he was some time in the jewelry business Mr. Oberndorffer started to make cigars in a small way in a building across the street. At first he manufactured for purely local trade. As time went on the same energy that had built up his

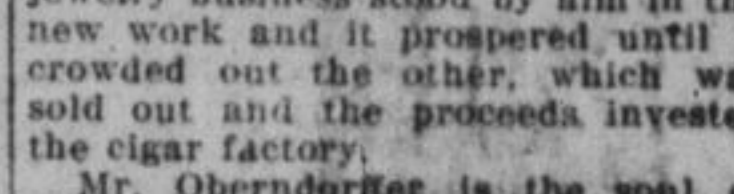

Although eighty-five years of age, he takes long walks daily and knows every nook and corner of the city, perhaps better than any one else. Not a new house escapes his notice not an improvement. The pavements, the sidewalks, the parks, everything meets his observation and is retained in his wonderful memory. He will tell you that the recent growth of Kingston is wonderful and predicts a glorious future for it. He would change it for no city in America. Mr. Oberndorffer has always been active in public affairs and has served in the city council. He is the friend of every philanthropist and greatly interested in the Odd Fellows' Relief association, of which he is really the father. He has been an active Oddfellow and is a past master of that order. He is also a prominent Mason and a member of the Scottish Rite.
