TO RETIRE AS JUDGE

LORD ALVERSTONE SUFFERS STROKE AND CANNOT RESUME.

General Isaacs Likely to Succeed—First of Jewish Race to Head Court.

Lord Alverstone, more widely known in this country as Sir Richard Webster, and who through his frequent visits to the United States has come into touch with most of the leading American jurists, sustained a stroke of apoplexy not long ago, and although the matter has been kept very quiet, yet his condition has become so much more grave of late, that even if his days are prolonged, which is improbable in the extreme, he will never be able to resume his seat on the bench as Lord Chief Justice of England.

That lofty office, far more ancient than that of the Lord High Chancellor is about to become vacant, either through death or resignation—possibly before this letter appears in print, and the government will be called upon to present King George the nomination for a successor to the post, which carries with it a salary of \$40,000 a year, and the offer of a peerage of the realm.

According to custom and tradition, the office should go to the Attorney-General, Sir Rufus Isaacs, and, if appointed, he will be the first member of the Jewish race and creed to preside over the court, which is particularly styled "The Court of our Lord the King, before the King himself," and to occupy the seat which has been filled by men of such historic fame as Hardwicke, Mansfield, Coke, etc., who set at naught the illegal mandates of the all-powerful Lord Protector, Oliver Cromwell, and Gascoyne, who "rated, rebuked and sent to prison, the immediate heir of England," afterward Henry V.

Formerly popular impression prevailed that it was necessary for a lawyer to belong to the established Protestant church of England, in order to hold the office of Lord Chief Justice. But this belief was dispelled when, after careful investigation as to whether or not there were any legal obstacles, the late Lord Russell of Alibon, a devout Roman Catholic, was appointed to the post. It was then definitely established that no questions of creed were involved in the appointment to any judicial office save that of Lord High Chancellor, who, as "keeper of the sovereign's conscience," must necessarily belong to the same church as the latter, namely, to the Anglican rite.

The oath of the Lord Chief Justice, as entered in the book of oaths in the crown office, binds him, among other things, "to do right to all the King's subjects rich and poor, without having regard to any person; not to take any gift or reward of gold or of silver, or any other thing which might turn him to profit, except what or drink, and that of little value, of any man that has any plea or process hanging about him; not to take fees or livery of any person but of the King; not to delay any person's common right for the King's letters, or the letters of any other person, not for any cause; and, in case any letters come to his contrary to law, to certify the King thereof, and proceed to do the law, the same letters notwithstanding."

If Lord Alverstone survives his present illness he will be entitled on his retirement to a pension of \$15,000 for the remainder of his life. He is a fairly rich man, having amassed a considerable fortune by his very big and lucrative practice at the bar prior to his elevation to the bench, his average income in these days being estimated at some \$150,000 a year.

That Lord Alverstone should have been stricken in this fashion will, doubtless, come as a blow to his many American friends and acquaintances. For if ever there has been a man that conveyed the impression of bodily and even athletic vigor it has been the lord chief justice, a big man, large in heart and brain. His seemed physically equipped for big things.

At Cambridge he carried everything before him in the inter-university sports, and was the champion runner, also a noted cricketer. He managed by means of athletic exercises to keep himself in wonderful condition until recently, this being partly by physical exercises, partly by his abstemiousness alike in food and drink, and partly, too, by his perfectly even temper, untroubled under the most trying circumstances.

He is wonderfully musical, and an accomplished organist, and was never so happy as when seated at his splendid organ in the large hall at Winterton, his beautiful place in Sussex. He used to be passionately fond of shooting, retaining a forest each year for deer-stalking in Scotland, where he is known by the neighboring lairds, all of whom have territorial titles, as "Pump Court," the latter being a seat in the London Inns of Court which is familiar to every member of the English bar.

Lord Alverstone has not possessed the silvery eloquence of his predecessor in the office of Lord Chief Justice, namely, the late Lord Russell of Killowen; nor has he Russell's sparkling wit. In his appearance he suggests the prelate rather than the jurist.

His voice, heavy and inflexible, savors of the music of the brass vessels in the rubric of the church. It is usually pitched in a high key, and may be said to be in keeping with the somewhat sacerdotal appearance of whom "Dicky Webster," possessed of the kindest heart, which accounts for his popularity, this manner is at first misleading.

For there is a certain austerity of voice, and a supercilious elevation of the eyebrows or best acquaintance, which are not precisely inviting, but the effect of which is always rapidly dissipated when he has been induced to sing a comic song, at which he has been an adept.
