The Butchery in Progress. The butchery was in progress in th Galata quarter, or foreign business section, it was said. Galata lies along the Golden Horn, between the aristocratic residence district, known as Peru and Stamboul, the native city. Several fires were also reported to

have started. It was surmised here that the rioters must be soldiers who have been driven back from Tchatalia


