CONTINUOUS DEMAND FOR MEDICAL PRACTITIONERS.

Dominion Medical Council Regulations Do Not Please Medical Students—There Will Be Too Many Examinations.

The graduating class last year numbered sixty-three. All these men had no difficulty in securing positions in hospitals and other institutions throughout Canada and the United States, in fact there were ten openings which were not filled. This speaks well for Queen's graduates and also seems to contradict the cry that the medical profession is overworked. Even now a letter has been received by the registrar from Mr. McIvor, a citizen of Crowley, Alberta, asking for a young doctor to reside in the town, as, like in many instances of these rapidly growing western towns, there is no doctor opportunity to grow up with those towns, however, does not seem to appeal to the young graduates as would be expected.

The decision of the Dominion Medical Council in Ottawa has not been received altogether with favor by many of the undergraduates. Besides more than doubling the examinations, the fees have been greatly increased. The Ontario council consists of three written and as many oral examinations, while the dominion has seven written and about nine oral. These examinations include subjects like bacteriology which a medical man after leaving college, has very little opportunity of studying and keeping in touch with.

An Ottawa dispatch says—The order of the Canadian rugby union that Ottawa seconds must play at Kingston on Saturday is commented on to-day in the Citizen which says:

"The Ottawas have not yet received any word from President Davidson regarding the semi-final, but it was to have been played here and there may be objections to the trip to the limestone city. They would have had to go to Hamilton for the final, however, so the ruling looks a fair one. The question will be taken up at the meeting of the Ottawa executive tomorrow night, and it is probable that the intermediates will be voted sufficient funds to cover the expenses of their trip to Kingston on Saturday. The seconds would, of course, have a better chance of beating the cadets in Ottawa than at Kingston, and then losing the Rough Riders in the final, but it is up to the Canadian union and the Ottawas must obey orders or sacrifice their chance for the championship."
