**AGAINST HYDRO-ELECTRIC.**

St. Catharines Council Decides Against Proposal.

St. Catharines, Nov. 13.—Not one word was said in favor of the adoption of Hydro-Electric power in St. Catharines, at the meeting of the city council, when a petition from one hundred ratepayers for an estimate on Hydro-Electric power for St. Catharines was considered briefly in committee of the whole. It was unanimously decided that as the street lighting contract with the Lincoln Electric does not expire for over two years, and as it would be necessary for the city to expend \$50,000 for a transformer plant and distributing system, when the council believes the cost would not be lower, the time is inopportune for going into the question.

**TO ATTEMPT TO DRIVE IMMORTAL DRAMA FROM THE STAGE OF AMERICA.**

High Church Officials Indorse Movement for Clean Plays and Modesty, in Dress Committee Planned in Every City.

New York, Nov. 12.—With the personal indorsement of Cardinal Fahey and in accordance with the bull of Pius X. to the daughters of the faith, Miss Eliza O.E. Lummis, the instigator of the National Catholic Theater Movement, has issued an outline plan for organization.

Active co-operation upon the part of cardinals, archbishops and bishops with the laity of their respective dioceses is asked in this concerted effort to bring all classes, irrespective of tradition of immoral drama from the American stage.

Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, Cardinal O'Connell of Boston, Archbishop Jordan of San Francisco, the bishops of Newark, N.J., Bismarck, Va., have already assured the Cardinal of New York of their readiness to further the project.

Cardinal Farley upon his return next week from the Pacific coast, it is expected, will announce the personnel of the national and local committees.

"National Catholic influence," declares the official plan of the organization, "must be concentrated upon practical demonstration in New York while foundation is being laid at the same time in every city for support of reputable plays."

The plan of organization as officially outlined provides that a national committee shall invite the formation in each city of a Catholic civic committee under the supervision of its bishop, which in turn shall appoint sub-committees to cover special fields.

The problems of the drama, the lanes and modesty in dress must be solved through the action of the laity themselves. The purpose of the scheme will be the education of the critical faculty in the people through social discussion, the church calendars and the Catholic press.

Cardinal Gibbons assures the Cardinal of New York that "in trying to uplift the moral tone of our plays," he has his hearty support.

"Frightened with strong possibilities for good or evil," writes Cardinal Gibbons, "I would gladly see effected this noble purpose of eliminating vicious passages from plays otherwise harmless."
