GREATNESS OF NATION AN UNFAIR DISMISSAL

DETERMINED BY ITS NATIONAL CHARACTER. W. S. BURKE WAS RELIEVED OF HIS POSITION

Rev. J. A. Macdonald Delivered Strong Sermon on Social Problem at Chalmers Church on Sunday Evening.

Before a congregation which filled Chalmers Church to overflowing, Dr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, preached a strong sermon Sunday evening on the social problem, and how it was faced by Christ. "There are two problems which must be met by everyone of us," said the speaker, in his opening remarks. "One is the problem of living with ourselves, alone, that is the personal problem, and the other is the problem of having to live with the other people the social problem, and it is the latter problem I wish to speak to you about."

The problem had to do with our personal relations in the home, and the inner circles of our associates, the obligations between master and servant, employer and employee, the question of work and wages, capital and labor, international lines of peace and war, and anything which had to deal with the social life. In the present day, there was a keen competition in the "social swirl" to see who would be the greatest, the most talked about, and whose name would appear in the newspapers more than another. Selfishness and disregard was shown, to advance one's interests. This spirit was shown in many cases where a vacant office was to be filled. To secure the office, the influence of the lodge, influential and political friends were brought to bear. But Jesus faced the social problem, and in so doing, revealed a new social idea, in that we were not to be judged by material forms, but by personal character, and all that was noble. There was great need to-day, for the declaration of this fundamental principle of God—the influence of human character. What is the human product? Is the output to be but a few more millionaires, and masters of industry? "A nation will never be regarded as great, because of its vast territory and equipment for war. National greatness will be determined by national character—by the quality of citizenship, and by the standard of service."

One half the trouble in social, industrial, political and national affairs, is caused by the desire of people for a prominent position they are not fit to occupy, or for a larger income which they are unable or willing to earn. One half the trouble springs from this root.

Jesus stands for just the opposite position. He awaits an opportunity to serve. What a revelation would take place in our social community, business life and in the common life of to-morrow, if we would but await the opportunity to serve. The speaker referred to the recent election in the United States, and pointed out the great willingness of the men seeking office, to serve the people. There was the conviction that in the past, they have been under the Gentile rule. The Christian was revealed, that the strong should bear the burdens of the weak.

And what is the relation of Jesus to the age-long problem? What solution has He to offer? His motive was that of love. The motive of the Christian service is not self-interest. "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." "If you love, you must hear. Love can strike the cords of selfishness in any life. Thou shalt love, but not only the people you like, for that would be easy; you must love the unwashed—the people who are not in your set. It is not easy for you add I to love them, but Jesus did. We have learned Christ only, when we have learned to do this."

All this would mean a radical change—a new birth, a new creation. The power of service would be measured by the capacity of love. Christ had the power to lift men up, and our power would depend on the height of our love. The speaker gave a most powerful presentation of his subject, and was listened to with keen interest throughout. During the service J. D. Bankier rendered a fine solo.

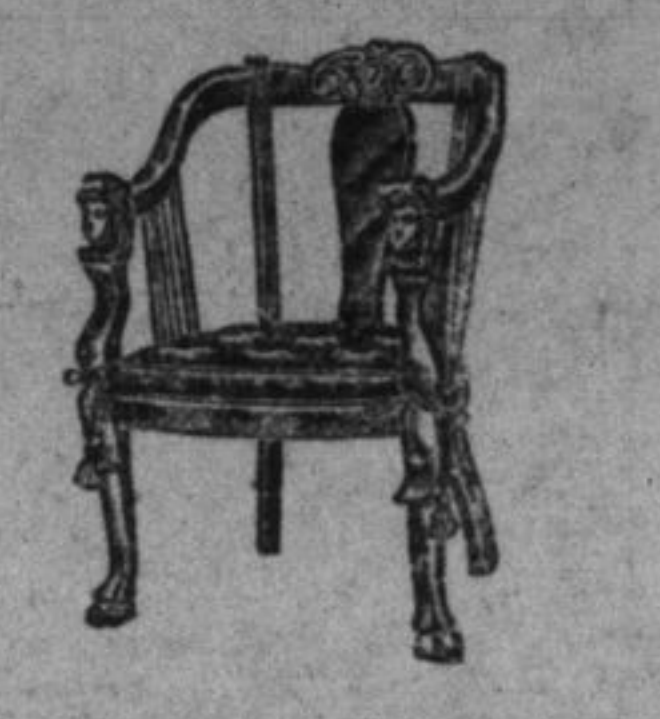

IN MARINE CIRCLES

MILLION BUSHELS OF GRAIN WILL BE HANDLED

Before Close of Season at M.T. Co's Elevator in Kingston—Thomas Byrne Killed While Trimming Grain on Barge Ungava in Montreal—Movements of Vessels.

The Montreal Transportation Company expects to handle a million bushels of grain here before navigation closes. At the present time, four steamers are in port, to discharge at this elevator.

While trimming grain on the barge Ungava, of the Montreal Transportation Company, at Montreal, in the rear of the St. Lawrence flour mill, Thomas Byrne was killed and Robert Hamilton so badly injured that his right leg had to be amputated.
