TURKS ARE FIGHTING

WITH DESPERATION IN FRONT OF CONSTANTINOPLE.

Captured 8,000 Bulgarians and Thirteen Guns—King Ferdinand's Troops May Meet Their Waterloo if They Hurry Things.

Constantinople, Nov. 18.—This city is trembling with a terrific cannonading going on to-day around the Tcha-talja fortifications. The Turkish troops are fighting desperately, and have captured eight thousand Bulgarians and thirteen large Krupp guns. There being no United States warships here yet, a detachment of one hundred marines from British cruisers has been landed to protect the United States embassy here. The city is quiet, but full of disease.

Bulgarians in Danger.

London, Eng., Nov. 18.—Several London and Paris newspapers contain detailed descriptions from witnesses of Saturday's and Sunday's severe fighting outside Constantinople. The artillery fire was tremendous on both sides and was terribly effective all round, bursting shrapnel and lyddite, tearing whole companies and battalions to pieces. All experts admit that the Turks are entrenched and fortified behind exceptionally strong defences, and the Bulgarians may be up against their Waterloo. King Ferdinand's best tactics, apparently, are merely to harass the enemy till reinforcements of Serbians and Greeks arrive, and then to make a dash.

Monastir Surrenders.

Belgrade, Nov. 18.—Monastir has surrendered to the Serbians, with 50,000 Turk soldiers, including three generals.

The deceased was well known in this city and is mourned by many friends in the university here.

MAYOR HOAG ON THE BENCH.

Presided at the Police Court on Monday Morning.

A young man, who has been drinking quite heavily of late, and who has a wife and family, pleaded guilty to being drunk.

D. A. Givens appeared for him, and told the acting magistrate that he would go on the "prohibited list" if given a chance, and the court decided to give him a chance to do better.

WILL OPEN ON TUESDAY.

Grand Trunk Freight Department Opens in Their New Sheds.

On Monday the freight sheds of the Grand Trunk railway, at the water's edge, between Johnson and William streets, which have been used since the running of that line into the city, were vacated by that department for general business. It was "moving day" with the freighters.

On Tuesday morning the new sheds on Wellington street, between Anglin's mill and Place d'Armes, will open for business, being built during the past few months to cope with the increased freight business along this line into Kingston. In the new yards there are seven or eight sidings, and three times the amount of floor space as in the old sheds, which will still be used for package freight, and the business of the company in connection with the boats. The offices in the new sheds are at the south end, and scales will be built outside, with the beam in the office.

PROTEST IS ENTERED.

Winnipeg, Nov. 18.—
Notice was filed Saturday on behalf of R. L. Richardson, independent candidate, protesting the election of Alexander Morrison, conservative, at the recent federal bye-election in Macdonald on the usual charges of corruption. The notice sets out as one reason for unseating Morrison that Premier Roblin and Hon. Robert Rogers intimidated the electors.

Late Sister Mary Cecelia.

The death occurred at the House of Providence, on Friday, of Sister Mary Cecelia (Louise Staley). She was a daughter of Daniel Staley, of this city. She was thirty-eight years of age, and entered the order 18 years ago. Besides three brothers in the priesthood, Revs. Arthur and Melvin, of Toronto, and Lewis and Ralston, she also leaves a sister, in the order of the cloistered nuns at Loretto Abbey, Toronto, her father, Daniel Staley, Mrs. M. Shyne, Toronto; Mrs. (Dr.) William Borsard, Ottawa; Mrs. A. Brooks, Toronto, and Miss Norah, of this city, and two brothers, Frank and Albert, Toronto.
The funeral took place Monday morning, to the Chapel of Our Mother of Sorrows, where a solemn requiem was sung. Interment took place at St. Mary's cemetery.

Returned From New York.

Dr. William McCarthy has returned from New York city, where he was attending the Clinical Congress of Surgeons, Gynaecologists and Obstetricians, at which there were representatives from all over America and Europe, about 2,500 being present. Dr. McCarthy has brought home a number of photographs of the work in the congress and operations. He has also a splendid large photograph of the Canadian Club dinner gathering in New York, at which he was a guest. The picture shows, among other familiar faces, that of Rev. Principal Gordon, of Queen's.

Case Was Postponed.

The appeal in the case of Michael J. Lawless, of the Anglo-American hotel, who was recently fined by Magistrate Farrell, for selling liquor to a member of the "prohibited list," was to have been heard by Judge Price at the court house at eleven o'clock Monday, nothing, but owing to the absence of H. F. Sticks, U.S. counsel for Mr. Lawless, the case was enlarged for two weeks.
