





**LIKELY TO BE SHIFTED**

**HON. T. W. CROTHERS NOT GIVING SATISFACTION**

As Minister of Labor—He Has Antagonized Labor—Hon. F. D. Monk May be Offered His Portfolio.  
Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The difficulties which the government canvassers are having with the labor vote in Hochelaga in consequence of resentment aroused by Hon. W. T. Crothers' attitude towards the C.P.R. strikers and his peremptory refusal of their application for a Board of Conciliation and Investigation, are likely to result in Mr. Crothers' transfer from the labor portfolio before long.  
The minister's handling of the first real problem he has had to meet in his administration of his department has not been politic, and has not commended itself to the judgment of Premier Borden and the other ministers.  
Mr. Crothers, it is believed, has unnecessarily antagonized a considerable section of the labor vote. It is known that he is not enamored of the labor portfolio, and would prefer another department. Premier Borden will cheerfully make the shift as soon as arrangements can be made.  
But with the session now opening it is probable that the promised re-arrangement of portfolios will have to be delayed until after prorogation.  
It can be stated, however, on good authority, that the reconstruction of the Cabinet following Mr. Monk's retirement was but tentative and a second "reconstruction" is in view. With the emergency contribution question out of the way, the Premier intends to bring Hon. F. D. Monk back into the Cabinet, as he is recognized as being the only man available who can hold the nationalistic for conservative party purposes.  
Mr. Monk is willing to come back as Minister of Labor, a department in which he has always taken special interest and for which he is better fitted temperamentally than for the more onerous duties of the Public Works Department.  
Hon. G. E. Foster is slated to become the government's diplomatic "imperial" minister, as Canada's advisory representative in London on all matters affecting the relations between Canada and the empire.  
Mr. Crothers will then, it is understood, become minister of trade and commerce, the difficulty of finding a minister of inland revenue will be dropped from the government at the first convenient opportunity, and a stronger man brought in to replace him, probably L. T. Marchal, who recently failed of cabinet preference owing to the difficulty of finding a safe seat for him. A. R. Boyce, member for West Algoma, is promised the solicitor-generalship.  
By this re-arrangement it is hoped to strengthen the government's present weakness in regard to Quebec representation in the cabinet, and to pave the way for a rehabilitation of conservative fortunes in that province with a view to the next general election. With Mr. Monk in the Labor Department, Quebec would have five ministers with portfolios, and one minister without portfolio, Hon. Geo. E. Perley.

**WOMAN TO CARRY VOTE**

**To Take Colorado, Presidential Ballot to Congress.**

Denver, Nov. 19.—To confer upon Mrs. Gertrude A. Lee, of Colorado Springs, the distinction of being the first woman messenger to take the vote of a state to the meeting of congress which counts the ballots for president is the aim of the women of Colorado.  
Mrs. Lee was named as one of Colorado's electors November 5th, and became the first of her sex ever selected to represent the people of any state in the direct balloting for president.  
The Colorado electors will meet shortly after the New Year to designate one of their number to take the vote to Washington. It is understood that Mrs. Lee will be selected to make the journey.

**ARCTIC RETURNS.**

**Many Changes in Magnetic Variations as Result of Trip.**

Quebec, Nov. 19.—The C.G.S. Arctic, Commander Jackson, which left here on June 29th last, returned to port on Saturday afternoon. All on board were well, and there were no complaints made by the members of the crew. The commander said he had seen employed most of the time taking surveys in Hudson's Bay straits, and as a result of the work there would be considerable changes in magnetic variations. He also took soundings and observations for ice conditions. He refused to express an opinion as to the practicability of the straits as a route for grain.

**WORK ON HUDSON BAY.**

**Contractor Says New Railway Will be Completed.**

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—J. D. McArthur, contractor for the Hudson Bay railway, was in Ottawa, on Saturday, and saw the minister of railways. Mr. McArthur is rushing work on the Hudson Bay line, and says that the whole work will be completed in 1914 within the time allowed for the construction of the road. Already the grading has been done for a distance of sixty miles. Supplies and equipment for the construction camps are being taken into the country this fall, and construction work will proceed on an extensive scale next summer.

**GERMAN NAVAL INCREASES.**

**Appropriations for New Battleships, Cruisers and Gunboats.**

Berlin, Nov. 19.—Some of the leading items in the budget of the German empire for the coming year are given in the Boersen Courier, one of the leading financial dailies.  
The total income and expenditure are balanced at approximately \$762,000,000 each, an increase of about \$74,000,000 over last year.  
The estimate for the navy is given at \$119,250,000, or an increase of \$1,300,000. The ordinary naval expenditure increases by \$4,000,000.

**GIRL OF 14 YEARS REWEEDS.**

**Judge Says She Needs Spanking Instead of Husband.**

Forth Worth, Tex., Nov. 19.—Thirty minutes after fourteen-year-old Mrs. Annie Scroggins got a divorce from Will Scroggins she entered the county clerk's office with C. E. Lacey, obtained a license and married him one hour later.  
The girl is suing for possession of her six-month-old baby. Judge Swayne, who granted the divorce, heard another license had been obtained and went to the girl and threatened to spank her, at which her intended husband bristled up, but there was no encounter.  
Annie, to win her divorce, told the court she had found marriage a failure and that she had left her first husband nineteen days after marriage.  
"You ought never to have married at your age," said Judge Swayne, emphatically. "Marriage is a serious proposition and not child's play and I thought you found that out. You ought to be in school. I've a good notion to give you a spanking. You need that more than a husband."

**SURGEONS ARE WIZARDS.**

**Baltimore Doctors Make Hinge in Boy's Stiff Jaw.**

Baltimore, Nov. 18.—A remarkable operation which has resulted successfully was recently performed at a local hospital on a fourteen-year-old boy who, since birth, had been unable to move his jaws.  
From the time of his birth it had been necessary to feed the child through a tube, as the jaw bones were stiff, having no normal "hinges."  
The surgeon cut through the solid bone where the joint should have been, and modeled upon bones actual joints, and as nature usually provides. The child has left the hospital and now has the normal use of his jaws.  
Big Wheat Crop in Russia.  
Chicago, Nov. 18.—Russia has raised a spring wheat crop of 480,000,000 bushels and the rye crop is 1,126,000,000 bushels, which compares with 320,000,000 and 855,367,000 bushels, respectively, a year ago. That country will force its grain upon the importing nations and a condition of this kind was notable yesterday.  
The wheat crop of the southern hemisphere will soon come in direct competition with the crop of the United States and it will then be seen whether we are to meet the asking prices of the Argentine and Russia or allow our wheat to remain here and be carried into another crop.

**Woman Burned to Death.**

Stratford, Nov. 18.—Mrs. William Daly tripped while carrying a lighted lamp downstairs, late Saturday, in her house here, and fell to the bottom where the lamp exploded, saturating Mrs. Daly's clothes with oil, which quickly broke into a mass of flames and burned her to death. The woman was alone in the house at the time.  
Twelve kegs of lager were secured at the railway station at Maberly and shipped to Smith's Falls. The contractors will be charged with breach of the liquor license act.  
The Kemptville Advance reports the death of John Murphy, a veteran resident of that village, aged eighty-five years.

**More C.P.R. on Market.**

Montreal, Nov. 18.—On and after Dec. 4th next, \$20,000,000 of additional Canadian Pacific railway stock will be listed, bringing the total amount authorized to be listed at that date up to \$200,000,000.  
This indicates that the balance of a little over \$1,000,000, which the company had in the treasury, has been sold privately to a London syndicate, rounding the total amount of stock out which the company had previous to the arrangements now being made for the issue of \$60,000,000.  
The much-discussed dividend on Montreal Cottons common is now expected to materialize in about two weeks' time.  
George E. Musgrove, well known in London financial circles, has been appointed London representative for the firm of J. M. Robinson & Sons, St. John, N.B., and Montreal.

**To Make Best Showing Yet.**

Montreal, Nov. 18.—The Canadian Consolidated Rubber company for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31st, will, it is understood, make the best showing in its history. Trade conditions have been particularly favorable to the marketing of the outputs of all departments.

**SOLD ON GOOD BASIS**

**LETHBRIDGE CITY BONDS WERE SOLD IN ENGLAND.**

It is Said Some \$20,000,000 More C.P.R. Stock is Soon to be Put Upon the Market—Rubber Makes Good Showing.  
Toronto, Nov. 18.—The happenings of the past week have thrown a more hopeful light on the municipal debture situation. A debenture issue by Sydney, N.S., was over-subscribed in London, while G. A. Stinson & Co. have completed the purchase for London clients of \$623,000 city of Lethbridge debentures. This completes the sale of all the debentures which the city of Lethbridge has, and places the finances of that city on a good basis. This is the largest Canadian municipal debenture purchase which has been made in a number of months, in fact, since the purchase by the same firm of \$2,000,000 city of New Westminster debentures. It was also made on behalf of English clients.  
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**Safe Investments.**

London, Nov. 18.—Sir J. H. Roberts, Liberal M.P. for Denbighshire, says:—"My impression is that subject to steps being taken to examine carefully the nature of Canadian investments in real estate, there is still a large field of safe investment for British capital in the dominion."

**Financial Notes.**

Norman D. Perry, of the firm of Perry & Perry, Toronto, has been elected a member of the Toronto Stock Exchange. The seat he had previously purchased from Sir Henry Pellatt for \$18,000.  
On account of car shortages in Western Canada, a considerable amount of grain has to be hauled across the border to be shipped East by the United States lines.  
Cotton consumed in the United States during October amounted to 511,185 running bales, according to the census bureau's monthly report.  
E. W. Hamber, manager of the Dominion Bank, in London, Eng., will retire about Jan. 1st, 1913.  
It is understood that the Canadian Consolidated Felt company will in the near future make arrangements plants at Berlin with a view of perfecting the extension of the present mill to increase their output.

**Sees His Wife Drown.**

Redding Cal., Nov. 19.—Falling off the ferryboat plying across Pitt river near Henderson, Mrs. John Holmes tried to swim ashore.  
The current was swift and her clothing impeded her so she could not make it. She was drowned in view of her husband and the ferryman, who could not get to her assistance in time.  
Grain of Corn Kills.  
Gonzales, Tex., Nov. 19.—Frank Schot, jr., four years old, was killed when a grain of corn, tossed by his little sister, entered his mouth and lodged in his windpipe.  
Harold Baxter, Smith's Falls, is under arrest for an offence under the criminal code, assaulting a young girl.  
Rev. Melvin Taylor, of Grace Methodist Church, Ganoque, has had his salary raised from \$1,200 to \$1,400.  
John F. Campbell was sent to prison for three years for thefts of brass at Belleville.

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
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**A DIGITIZED COLLAR OF PRINCESS LACE.**

**BABY BLOWN OVERBOARD.**

**Carriage Picked up by Wind and Carried Away.**

Melbourne, Oct. 15.—A despatch to a local paper from Hobart says that yesterday a baby daughter of Mrs. Hennie Larnock was carried overboard from the deck of the steamer Adelaide and lost. The mother was wheeling the child in its carriage along the deck when some women passengers addressing her caused her to leave the handle for a moment, and during her brief absence a gust of wind filled the top of the cart and the light baby was whisked over the rail.  
For some hundreds of feet it was carried like an airship and then it somersaulted into the sea. A boat's crew was immediately lowered and the carriage was easily picked up, but the little one could not be found, and after several hours spent in the vicinity the crazed mother, who had to be locked in her cabin, was compelled to proceed without her baby.  
It is said that had the little one been strapped into her cart she would very likely have been saved for the wooden carriage would have kept afloat until the ship's boat would have reached her.

**Woman Beheaded.**

Rawlins, Wyo., Nov. 18.—Despite the pleadings of her six children, who stood around, Mrs. George Ryder, was today, beheaded with an axe in the hands of her brother, Melvin Davis, aged twenty-one, who was enraged because she repulsed his brutal abuse.  
Canadian Australian Service.  
The Canadian Pacific railway, yesterday, received a telegram from Vancouver advising that the new steamer the Niagara, which is the latest addition to the fleet of the Union Steamship company, of New Zealand, would take the fifth May sailing, next year, from Sydney, in place of the Zealandia and the corresponding trip from Vancouver. Under this schedule the new steamship is due at Vancouver on May 27th and timed to leave that port on June 11th. The Niagara is being specially built for the Canadian-Australian service, which is subsidized by the Canadian and Australian governments, and she will be the largest passenger vessel sailing in Australian waters. The Niagara's dimensions are: Length, 522 feet 4 inches; width, 56 feet; beam, 37 feet 6 inches, and over 13,000 tons. The vessel will be a seventeen-knot ship and is being fitted with combined reciprocating machinery, having three propellers, two driven by reciprocating engines and the third by a low pressure engine. This type of machinery has been adopted in some of the largest Atlantic liners and has given most satisfactory results. An interesting feature of the new vessel is that she will be fitted to burn either liquid fuel or coal. This involves special arrangement of bunkers and will add much to the cost of the ship, but the company feel that their enterprise in this direction will be justified by the many advantages which oil fuel affords.
