THE COUNTY COUNCIL THE BEST IN THE TOWN

IS IN SESSION AT THE COURT HOUSE.

Resignation of Dr. William Spankie as Public School Inspector Received—The Doctor Explained His Position at the Request of Councillor Foley.

The Frontenac county council opened its November session on Tuesday afternoon. In attendance were Warden Godkin and Councillors Salmon, Kennedy, Foley, Hamilton, Gordon, Hawkey, Miller, Stinson, Cronk, Thomson, Franklin, Rutan, Fisher, Donaldson and Taylor.

Letters were read from T. H. Henry, of Morrisburg, F. E. J. Corbett, Lake, M. R. Reid, Sharbot, Lake, and S. A. Truscott, Iroquois, applying for the position of public school inspector of South Frontenac. It was decided to hear the applicants on Wednesday afternoon.

At the Wednesday morning session Councillors Calvin and Grimshaw were present, in addition to the above named members.

The resignation of Dr. William Spankie, as public school inspector for South Frontenac, was read. He expressed to the council his thanks for many kindnesses to him during his long term of office.

McIntyre & McIntyre wrote asking council, on behalf of Leslie Fleming, of Ottawa, for fifty dollars damages. While driving a motor car over the Joyceville Road, eight and a half miles from the city, Mr. Fleming suffered an accident and alleges that the road was in a dangerous condition.

The deputy minister of education reported that the department approved the continuation in office of M. R. Reid, M.A., inspector of North Frontenac.

The Loughboro council asked that the Desert Lake bridge be made a charge upon the county.

W. F. Nisde, county solicitor, reported that there was no legal liability on the part of Frontenac council to make good fees to the amount of \$200 for attendance of pupils of this county at the Gananoque high school. It need pay only from a sense of duty.

Councillor Foley wanted a statement from Dr. Spankie as to the reasons for his resignation. The doctor had been a faithful and a competent official of the county and if the council could do anything to retain him, it should do so. Councillor Foley was not satisfied with the action of the educational department in not approving Dr. Spankie's continuance in office.

Dr. Spankie replied that he did not think there was anything he could add to what he had written. He had served the county twenty-six years and a half, and not one complaint had been entered against him. That was something that would linger long as a pleasant memory. The doctor referred to the law on the matter of inspectorships. He understood that the chief objection to the department at Toronto had against him was alleged deficiency in hearing. Last week he had received an invitation to withdraw his resignation and undergo another hearing test. When he underwent examination by Dr. Merchant, the provincial inspector, some time ago, he had been unwell, and was treating himself for a cold. Inspector Spankie laughingly said that it was pretty evident that he was neither old nor feeble. If the council decided to elect someone in his place, he would be glad to give his successor every help and initiate him into the office. The best of feeling would prevail, even if he had to retire. Of course, it was hard after so many years to have to give up a position that he had filled to the satisfaction of the people of Frontenac.

The question of accepting the doctor's resignation was deferred till a later session.

Prof. Alexander Laird reported on the work of the Children's Aid Society, towards which the county council makes a grant of \$150 a year. Last year, twenty-three Frontenac families were dealt with by J. C. McConachie, the agent. This year forty-eight families were given attention.

It was arranged that charitable institution delegations would be heard on Thursday afternoon.

Addresses were made by two of the city pastors, Rev. G. I. Campbell, of Queen street Methodist church, and Rev. John Webster, of Brock street Methodist church. Rev. Dr. Ryckman, and Rev. A. W. Stewart, of Wolfe Island. Rev. J. Lidstone and W. K. Shortt, of the city, also were on the programme.

Members of the choir contributed musical numbers. Solos were sung by Miss A. Brener, Miss A. Timmerman and W. Mack. An entire consisting of the Misses G. Mitchell, A. and E. Timmerman and A. Brener, and W. Mack, J. Dykes, H. Robinson, and W. Woods was rendered, and a duet by Miss G. Mitchell and W. Mack.

WORK IS PROGRESSING
ON NEW HOUSES BEING ERECTED IN THE CITY

For the Kingston Realities Under Jago & Harris, Contractors—Erection of Fifteen Double Houses Will Represent Outlay of \$53,000.

The work of the new houses for the Kingston Realities is progressing well, under Jago and Harris, contractors, on Stephen street. It was expected that all the foundations would be finished by Wednesday, and the brick work is up above the windows of the first floor on a number of them.

City Engineer McLelland commenced work on the sewer about a week ago, and it is going along satisfactorily.

The erection of these fifteen double houses by the Kingston Realities, represents outlay of \$53,000, including the land, and means a great deal for the city at large, filling, to some extent the need of mechanics' homes, as well as increasing the values in that section of the town.

What is Proposed.
The Great Gulf Lands, Limited, having large holdings in Alabama, in which several local men have interests, has given an option on its property to the representative of an English firm who may buy them out. The option is until the end of November and if taken up will mean a large profit to the holders of the land. If the English firm does not buy the Gulf Lands Company will sell a quarter of its land and pay for the rest with the proceeds thus becoming outright owners of the remaining three quarters. This they will subdivide and sell in farm lots. J. C. McConachie of this city, in Alabama looking after the interests of the company, says he believes the later scheme to be the more profitable but the returns will not be as speedy.
