THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S CADETS ARE HOPEFUL

MEETING OF THE POLITICAL SCIENCE PARLIAMENT.

The Alma Mater Society to Hear a Debate on "Home Rule for Ireland" Next Saturday Evening.

The political science parliament met for the second time, on Wednesday afternoon, and in the absence of the speaker, Prof. Skelton, Dr. Swanson presided.

A bill was introduced by the government to revise the bank act, so as to secure government inspection, an increase in the gold reserves held, the prevention of bank mergers and the abolition of the emergency note issue clause in the act by requiring that the banks increase their capital, the basis of note issue, instead of putting up huge rest funds. Argument was restricted largely to the bank inspection clause of the act. The speakers for the government were Messrs. Tuigg, Rutledge, Fleming, McNally and Fraser, while Messrs. Spankie, Keeler, Long and Garvoek led the attack for the opposition.

At the meeting next Wednesday the government will resolve itself into a provincial legislature, and will introduce a bill to abolish bilingual schools in Ontario. Two weeks from Wednesday the budget will be introduced by the finance minister. Three changes will be advocated in the present tariff—a bonus to steel industry instead of any tariff protection, the reduction of the duty on machinery, and the increase of the preferential tariff. Great perturbation occurred in the government ranks when it was announced that Premier J. R. Lowry had been called west by business, and will not be able to pilot them on the political seas for three weeks at least. The government will hold a caucus at once to choose a leader in his absence.

At the meeting of the Alma Mater Society on Saturday night, there will be a debate between Arts '12 and Arts '14 on the subject, "Home Rule for Ireland." Messrs. J. P. McLeod and Boydwill uphold the negative side of the question for '12, and Messrs. Millikin and McNab for '14 will look after the rights of the Irish.

Medicine '14 won the McEwen cup by defeating Arts '15 on Wednesday on the lower campus by the score 3-1. It was an interesting game, but the medicals outplayed the Arts men at all stages.

It is likely that there will be a soccer game played in the near future between the all-stars of Arts vs the all-stars of Medicine.

Arts '13 defeated Arts '14 in an interesting game of rugby on Wednesday on the lower campus by the score of 10-2. Gadenhead, Garvoek and Lewis starred for the winners and Millikin and McLachlan for '14. Prof. Malcolm and Mr. Dunlop handled the game in an impartial manner.

Thursday afternoon will see an exhibition game between Arts and Science in which first team men will not be barred from participating. With such stalwarts as Hazlett, Rodden, P. Kennedy, Ellis and Sitter, Arts can see nothing but victory in store for them.

KINGSTON STREET MARKET.

More Hay Brought in This Week Than Last.

The number of loads of hay brought in by the farmers so far this week is double that of last week, for the same period. Up to Thursday morning thirty loads had been weighed on the scales at Place d'Armes. Work is slackening down somewhat on the farms of the district, and this may be one reason for more hay being sold on the street. The prices remain about the same—\$14 and \$15 a ton, unless the crop is held in the barns the selling price on the streets will be lower. A local dealer told the Whig on Thursday morning that only the best of the Canadian crop could be exported to the United States, as the crop on that side of the border was especially good and bounteous.

Butter fell in price on Thursday's market. It sold for 31c and 32c, and some of the good housewives bought quantities for 30c a pound. Eggs remained at 40c a dozen. Turkeys brought from 15c to 17c a pound. Ducks sold at \$1.25, fowl from 80c to \$1, and chickens from 70c to 90c a pair.

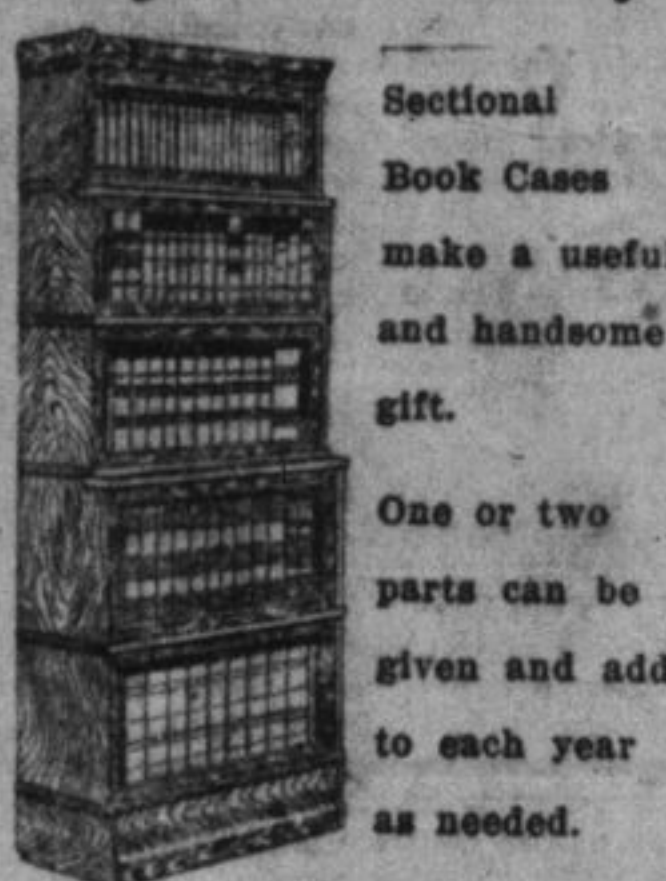
