GUY McFARLANE - SUFFERED FRACTURE OF ANKLE

In Arts-Science Rugby Game on Thursday—The Arts Team Won—Tickets All Sold for Final Year Dance.

Beneath the pale light of the moon and with but half a minute to play, "Pat" Kennedy secured possession of the ball and after a fifty yard run, scored the final touch-down which made Arts the undisputed victors in their contest with the Science rugby team on the lower campus on Wednesday afternoon. It was a great game, witnessed by hundreds of enthusiastic students—a game whose result was ever in doubt.

At the end of the first quarter, the score was two all. In the second quarter Science, with the aid of the wind, picked five points more. Then came Arts' turn, and in the third quarter, they made seven points, two touches in goal and a try. Science scored one more point in the final quarter, but Arts clinched the game by getting another touch in goal and a try, making the final score 15-8.

The whole Arts' team played like veterans but special credit for the victory must be given to Hazlett and Hodden. For Science Elliott was the brightest star, though Erskine, Watts and Foulds were also conspicuous. The Science wing line was somewhat stronger than Arts, but otherwise the teams were most evenly matched.

The victory for Arts was marred by a sad accident which happened to Guy McFarlane, their sterling half back, who had the misfortune to have his ankle fractured in a heavy tackle. The Arts men are very jubilant over their victory for it is many years since they have had the honor of defeating the Science men. The game was impartially handled by Prof. Lindsay Malcolm and Prof. J. F. Macdonald. The line-up was:

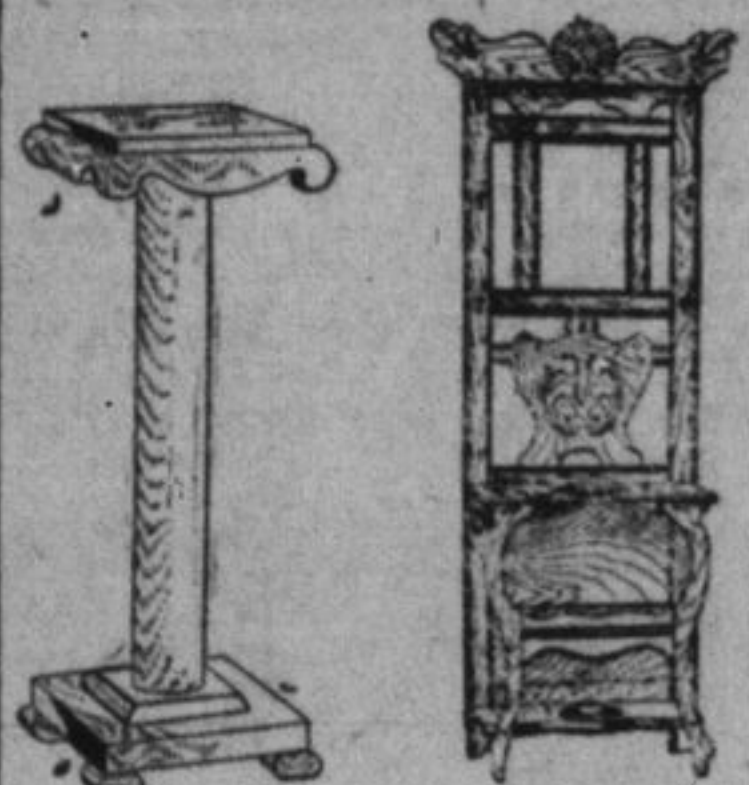

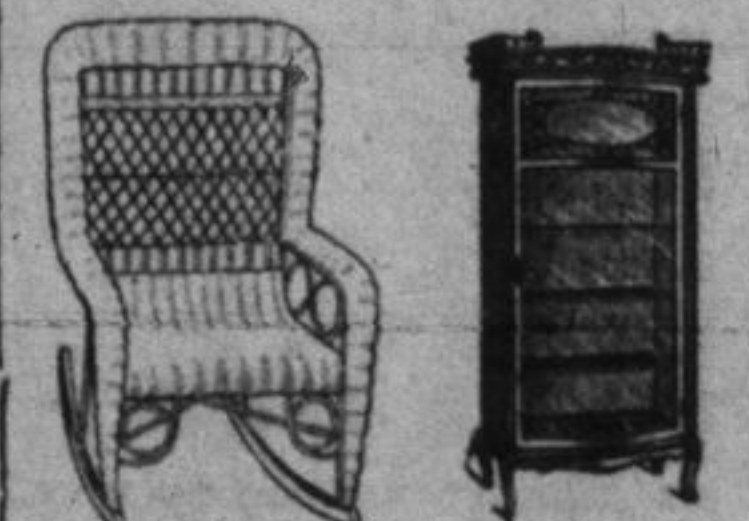
