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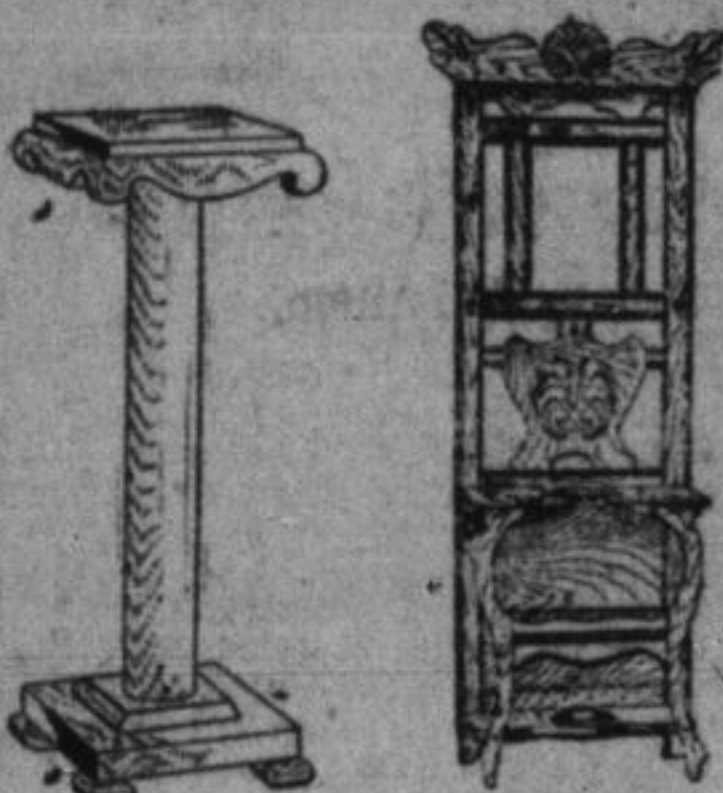

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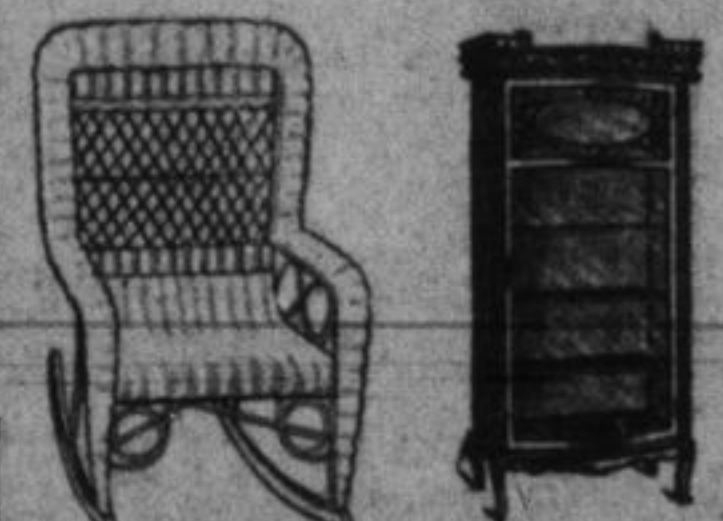

THE COUNTY COUNCIL CONCLUDES ITS BUSINESS FOR THE YEAR.

New School Inspector Starts on Salary of \$1,700 a Year—Increased Grants Given to the Hospitals.

It was nine o'clock on Friday night before the county council went into session, as the majority of its members had spent most of the day in a visit to the Sydenham high school.

When the council convened, Dr. William Gibson and J. J. Behan addressed it and asked for an increased grant to the Hotel Dieu. It was stated that the Hotel Dieu performed the functions of a general hospital, as it treated last year 583 non-Catholics and 1,056 Catholics. County patients totalled 285. The institution this year paid a water rate of \$802, as against \$75 last year, the rate having been raised. The delegation's request was referred to the Finance committee.

A by-law was passed confirming the appointment of Thomas D. Minnes as county auditor at \$150 a year. Another by-law was passed confirming the appointment of S. W. Truscott as public school inspector for South Frontenac, at a salary of \$1,700 for the first year; \$1,800 for the second year; \$1,900 for the third year, and \$2,000 for each subsequent year. The sum of \$300 travelling expenses is allowed. The inspector is to reside in Kingston and not holding any other office without the consent of the council and the sanction of the government. Councillor Hamilton reported on the manufacture of tile in the jail this year. A good profit had been made.

On recommendation of the Property committee these contracts for fall supplies were awarded: meat H. Waddington; groceries, J. S. Henderson; bread, J. J. Lackie. Councillor Gordon reported for the special committee which met the City Property committee on Oct. 17th last and asked for the abolition of market tolls and forestalling by law. The county council was to be notified of the result at its November session, but the matter has not yet been finally dealt with by the City Council.

On motion of Councillors Foley and Cronk, this resolution was unanimously adopted: "That this council desires to place on record its appreciation of the valuable services rendered by Dr. William Spankie during the twenty-seven years that he has so faithfully served it in the capacity of public school inspector, and its extreme sorrow at his retirement from the position which he has for so long a period so highly adorned. His admitted ability, unflinching courage, indefatigable zeal in the discharge of his public duties, together with his unique power of settling the many questions in which adverse interests had to be reconciled, has placed this county under a deep debt of gratitude to him. His kindness to both teachers and pupils will long make his name a household word. In whatever sphere his future may be, we trust the council wishes him an earnest God-speed, and hopes that his efforts may be in the future, as in the past, crowned with the highest meed of success. That this resolution be placed upon the minutes of the council and a copy thereof forwarded to Dr. Spankie."

The final session of the council was held on Saturday morning. A by-law was passed fixing the charitable grants as follows: General hospital, \$1,300; Hotel Dieu, \$800; Infants' Home, \$175; Orphan's Home, \$175; Children's Aid Society, \$175. The incomes are \$290 for the general hospital, \$200 for the Hotel Dieu, and \$25 each for the other three. Councillor Donaldson moved, seconded by Councillor Rutan, that \$1,000 additional be voted for the completion of the Sydenham high school wing, the contractor being unable financially to complete the work without a further grant. The motion was lost.

The claim of the Gananoque high school board for pupils' loss was laid over until the January session on motion of Councillors Salmon and Taylor. A vote of appreciation was passed to the retiring warden, J. D. Godkin, for the able manner in which he had presided over the deliberations of the council during the year.
