Stoves to be dearer.

An Advance of Ten Per Cent. May be Made.

What is the next thing to be advanced in price? Why stoves. From the meeting of the Canadian Stove Manufacturers' Association, now being held in Hamilton, it is likely a resolution will be carried warranting a ten per cent. increase in the retail and jobbing prices of stoves.

The manufacturers claim that the increased cost of articles that enter into the production of stoves and high wages paid skilled and unskilled labor, necessitates the move. The standard price of stoves have increased very little within the past few years. The increase will apply, it is stated, to not only kitchen stoves and heaters, but gas stoves, furnaces, and all other heaters produced by foundries. If the increase applies generally to all heating apparatus it will make quite a difference in contracts for buildings.

One of the local retail dealers, in conversation with the Whig, on Friday, said that this move had been expected. He said his firm handled 500 stoves and heaters during the year.

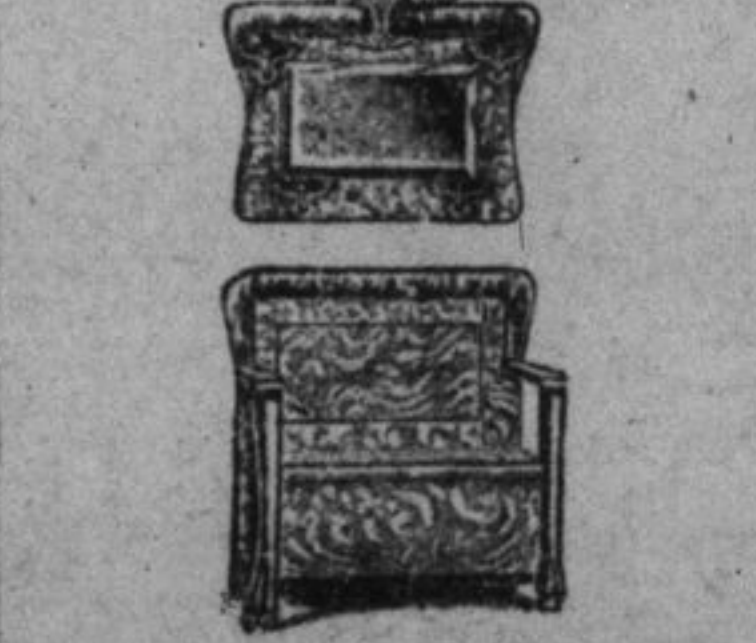

IN NEED OF QUORUM

TO DO BUSINESS OF CIVIC PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

Question of Heating City Buildings Has Evidently Been Shelved For Another Year—Committee is Without a Chairman.

A meeting of the Civic Property committee, was to have been held, on Friday afternoon, but there was no meeting, on account of lack of a quorum. Ald. Harrison and Ald. Litton, were the only members who put in an appearance. This committee has certainly had poor luck this year, in securing a quorum for the meetings. It was stated, yesterday, that the committee has only had one meeting since the middle of May.

The chief item of business for the committee was the selection of a chairman, pro tem, for the remainder of the year, to take the place of D. A. Givens, appointed to the position of city solicitor.

Another matter which was to have been considered, is the question of heating the city buildings, which has been up so many times, and shelved. It is not likely that action will be taken by this year's committee, which means that the old box stoves, in the city hall will continue to do service again this winter.

The question of heating the city buildings appears to be just as hard a problem for the aldermen to solve, as the paving of Princess street. One thing is sure, and that is that the question cannot be discussed unless there is a quorum, and it will be in order for Mayor Hoag to use "the big stick," and get the Property committee down to business.
