The other expenses for this milk amounted to 53 ents a 100, and the entire cost was \$1.41. This milk sold for \$1.52 a 100, thus making a small profit. The average of the whole sold at \$1.46, or 44 cents less than the cost of production. At the present prices for milk it appears that cows giving less than 6,000 pounds of milk in a year cannot pay their way, if we figure the business as a business man hgures his business.
