A major foul consists of throwing the stick to prevent a score, tripping an opponent when the latter is attempting to score, cross-checking, charging from behind, kicking, and slugging.

For the first offence a fine of \$5 will be inflicted. Second offence, \$10, and banishment for 20 minutes. Third offence, banishment for balance of the game.

In addition to the foregoing, a match foul shall be when a player disables or injures an opponent. For the first offence the penalty shall be \$25 and banishment from the ice until the injured player is ready to come back. The second and third offences shall be dealt with as in the case of major fouls.

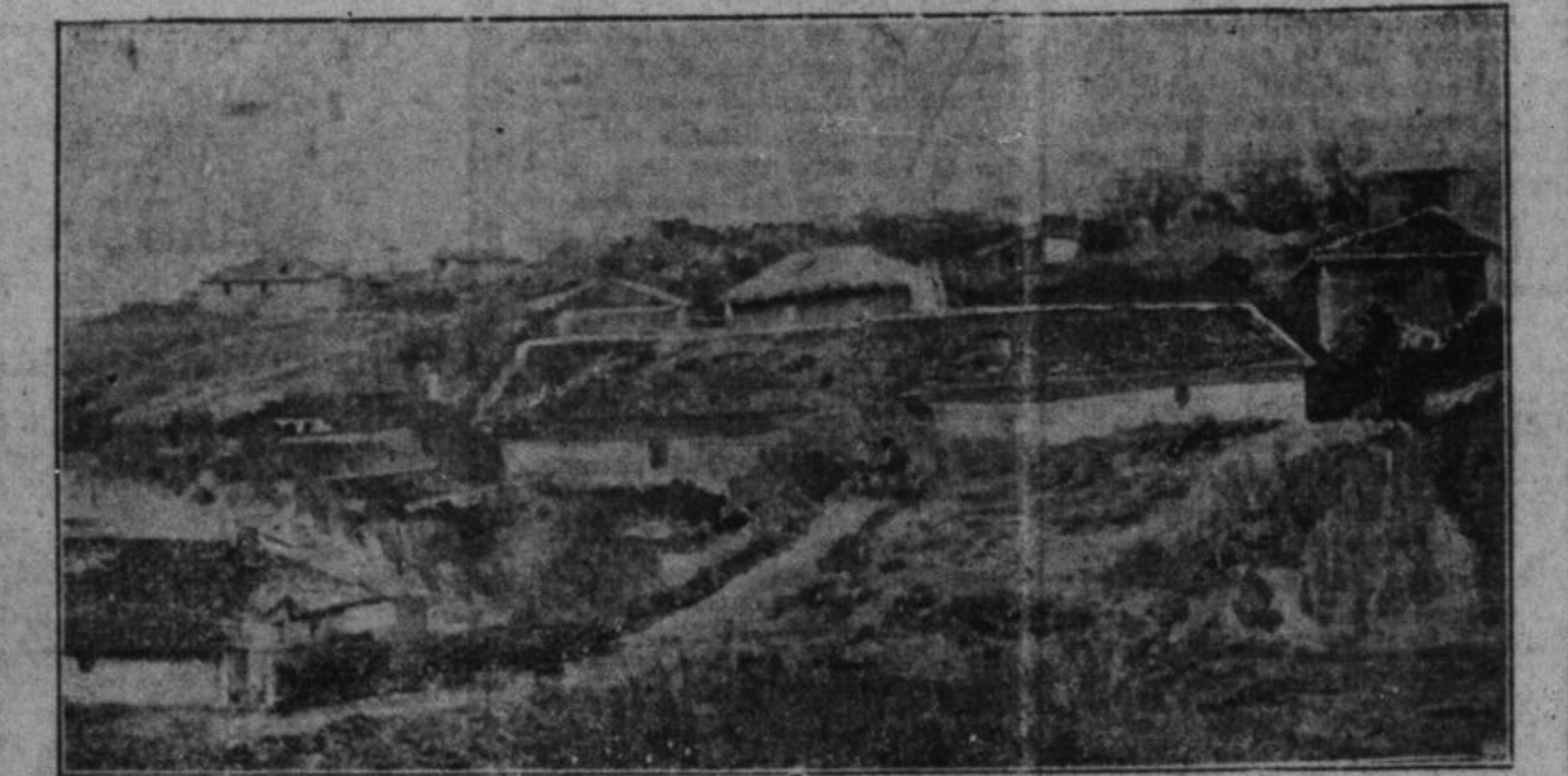
**A Madoc Fish Story.**

**RELIGION DOES NOT REACH**

To the Pocket Book of Majority of Christians.

Rev. F. G. Robinson preached, in Princes street Methodist church, on Sunday morning, on "The Evidences of True Conversion," and among other things said that a man cannot be a true Christian who does not consecrate his wealth as well as himself to God. He said many people's religion was of the head; sometimes it reached to the heart, but in few cases did it reach the pocket-book. Mr. Robinson also said, "We must lay aside at least one-tenth of our income to God's cause, and if this sums down the treasury of the Lord would be filled to overflowing and as a consequence, whenever anything was required for the schemes of the church, there would always be something on hand."

In the book of Malachi we read: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse," etc. If the Jews were required to give one-tenth Christians of the twentieth century should give twice as much. How many people there were in our churches who would say "Take my silver and my gold," and yet if you asked them for anything for God's cause they would respond "I hold," said Mr. Robinson, "that if we do not give to God's cause, and give until we feel it, and feel it keenly, we shall get very little credit for it in the kingdom of heaven."
