

SIR EDWARD CLOUSTON Eczema Cured

DIED SUDDENLY IN MONTREAL, SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

He was Seized With Apoplexy—Born Sixty-three Years Ago—Created a Baronet in 1908.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—The death of Sir Edward Seyburn Clouston, Bart., one of the best-known bankers and financiers of Canada, occurred here Saturday afternoon. His age was sixty-three years.

Sir Edward ainted in the morning while engaged in conversation with a friend in the Royal Securities building. Recovering a few moments later he objected to being removed to the hospital, contending that he was all right. On the advice of his friends, however, he allowed himself to be conveyed to the Royal Victoria hospital where an examination was made.

The hospital authorities at first issued a bulletin announcing that the baronet's condition was not very serious, and that the fainting fit had been brought about by acute indigestion. About 2.30 p.m., Sir Edward's condition began to grow rapidly worse, and he passed away at 2.45 o'clock, death being due to apoplexy.

The deceased financier was the son of S. J. Stewart Clouston, chief factor of the Hudson's Bay company, and was born at Moose factory, Hudson's Bay. After spending a year in the service of his father's company, he joined the staff of the Bank of Montreal in 1855 as a junior clerk. He became general manager of the bank in 1890. He was elected a first vice-president in 1906, he resigned from that position of general manager last year.

Sir Edward Clouston was connected in one capacity or another with twenty large financial and commercial concerns and is reputed to have been worth well over a million.

In private life he was a generous supporter and worker for practically every charitable organization in the city. He was a great sportsman, and in his younger days distinguished himself as an athlete, playing lacrosse, football, and tennis equally well. He captained a Canadian team which played Harvard university football team in 1875. He was created a baronet in 1908.

To Cut 600,000 Ties.

In accordance with the tie-cutting privileges granted to the Grand Trunk Pacific railway by its dominion charter, the company has notified R. H. MacMillan, chief forester of British Columbia, that approximately 600,000 ties will be cut in the vicinity of Tete Jaune Cache. Under the agreement the G. T. P. is entitled to take all of these from live wood but an arrangement has been made whereby 150,000 will be taken from wood fire-killed last year. This is an experiment to test the relative durability of live and fire-killed wood. The railroad has further agreed to burn all the brush for a distance of 300 feet on either side of the right-of-way. An indication of the development which is to take place in the Upper Fraser valley one firm has made arrangements to put in two sawmills, which will each have a capacity of 175,000 feet per day.

RAN ON A MUD BANK

STEAMER TOILER IN A MISHAP ON SATURDAY.

Ran Aground Near Foot Wolfe Island, But Steamship Navajo Came to Her Rescue—Movements of Vessels Reported Along Harbour.

The oil steamer Toiler, which ran aground Saturday morning at the foot of Wolfe island, was released early in the evening, and was able to proceed on her way to Montreal.

The vessel was loaded with grain from Port Colborne, but it is stated that she suffered no damage, as she merely went on a mud bank when a slight mishap occurred to her rudder, in a narrow part of the channel.

Word was sent to Kingston, shortly after the accident, and the steamship Navajo was soon on the scene. The Navajo took up part of her cargo, and after this was done, the vessel was able to pull herself off.

The steamer Toiler has had many accidents, and a great many mariners are included to look upon her as a "hoodoo."

The steamers Frontenac, Cornwall and Hemeson of the Wrecking Co., also went to the oil steamer Toiler, which was in trouble at the foot of Wolfe island, and with the steamship Navajo, succeeded in pulling her off.

The steamer Eastwood is on her way from Montreal to Richardson's elevator, to take the cargo of grain which the steamer Tagona discharged. The Eastwood was held up at Cardinal on Sunday on account of the storm, but it was expected that she would arrive here during the day.

BOIL THE DRINKING WATER

Bill Contamination Disappears is Health Officer's Advice.

As Prof. W. T. Connell, Queen's bacteriologist, has found contamination in the city water supply, the medical health officer has notified the householders to boil their drinking water till he announces that the contamination has disappeared. That the harbor waters are liable to contamination at any time is evidenced by these tests of Prof. Connell, and the need of a filtration plant is again impressing itself upon citizens. Dr. Williamson, on Saturday, as soon as he received the bacteriological report of the tests, visited the water works pumping station and gave orders that an additional amount of chlorine be used in the water supply.

SERMON FOR STUDENTS

Dean Bidwell Preached First of Series Sunday Night. At St. George's cathedral, on Sunday night, Dean Bidwell preached the first of a series of special sermons for students, his subject being "The Christ of the Synoptic Gospels." His discourse was a most learned one and most instructive. He showed the essential unity of the picture presented in all three gospels, and dwelt upon the distinguishing features, making up the first three gospels, and pointing out that each presented the perfect Christ.
