ON SALES OF CHEESE

FRONTENAC BOARD REALIZED THE SUM OF \$243,565.

Estimate Given of Business Carried on During Season Now About to Close--More Factories Should Sell on the Board.

That the sum of \$243,565.54 was realized from the sale of cheese on the Frontenac cheese board, for the season now about to close, is the estimate given by a member of the board, from these figures it will be shown just how valuable the cheese business is. Even at this, the amount realized was not as large as last season, an estimate giving the amount realized as \$278,145.

The estimate for this year is based on 22,212 boxes of cheese, with an average of eighty-five pounds to the box, and selling at an average price of \$12.90 cents per pound. In the season of 1911, there were 27,436 boxes of cheese sold, and the average selling price was 12 cents.

On fact which accounts for the decrease in the cash received for this season, over last, is that several factories boarded on the Brockville board. There were other factories shipping direct to Montreal, and some selling to Montreal parties as a result of communication over the telephone. There were also a number who did not make cheese, but skimmed the milk, and shipped the cream to the United States.

There has been a great falling off in the number of cheese boarded on the Frontenac cheese board, this season, and the matter was commented upon, at the last meeting. The board has not been receiving the support it should receive. It was hinted that if the fault was not remedied, the board would continue to go backward. Some factories had been boarding at Brockville, the members are looking forward to a campaign to have every factory a member of the board.

CHRISTMAS SHOPPING.

The Advantages of Doing It Early.

Early Christmas shopping is a threasure topic, but it will always be a live question, so long as many people put off to the last minute shopping that could as well, from their side, and much better as far as others are concerned, be done much earlier in the holiday season.

Early Christmas shopping should especially appeal to the ladies, who do most of the shopping. If the delay Christmas purchases till the last minute there is so much rush and crowding that they have really to buy things, and are thus deprived of the pleasure and delight of turning up-side-down the contents of a shopping basket, as Nicodemus postponed his repentance, then actual purchasing, to "a more convenient season."

There are three classes that would be benefited by doing Christmas buying early. The purchaser, herself, on whom it would have access to a better stock, and could have time to settle without undue distraction, the momentous question: "What shall I buy for a Christmas present?" Compelled to be the last they would not have to visit over-crowded shops, if those who have the time and leisure left the way open by doing their buying earlier in the season. Then the shop girls and sales men would have their hard lot lightened, and would not be subjected to the exasperating experience incident to crowds of jostling and insistent customers, each clamoring to be served and every other one not knowing what she wants to buy.

The weary shop-girl is the one who suffers most from delayed Christmas buying. She is necessarily dead tired from standing on her feet the whole day, and vexed and badgered by tumultuous cross-currents of demands on her services, forced to be polite to, and smile upon, exasperating customers, who would put murder into the heart of an angel. Early shopping and early buying would be real kindness to, and show Christian consideration for, the long suffering shop girl.

The Very Late Colled From All Over the World.

The naval bill will probably be introduced on Wednesday afternoon. Germany will build twenty Zeppelin airships at the beginning of an aerial navy.

At London, Eng., militant suffragettes set fire to the contents of mail boxes.

Furness interests deny the rumors of Richelieu Ontario and Inter-Ocean amalgamations.

C. E. Jenny, Grand Trunk passenger agent, Toronto, has secured a similar position in Pittsburgh.

At London, Ont., the cost of Hydro-electric power will be reduced ten per cent, about the first of the year.

At Cleveland, Ohio, Patrolman LeRoy Booker was shot and instantly killed by a gang of four men at the scene of a raid.

The State Hospital Commission reports that New York saved over a million dollars in a year by deporting 1,999 defective persons.

Just after warning her ninety-year-old son against handling was Mrs. Margaret Comers of Atkinson, N.Y., picked up a revolver and accidentally shot the boy. He may die.

Four men locked by mistake in the jury room of the supreme court in Toronto, were released.

A report just received from Regina states that steel-buying on the Grand Trunk Pacific from that city has now reached a point within half a mile of Moose Jaw, and will be completed in a few days' time.

An accusation was hurled at the heads of two aldermen of Maison-neuve, Que., to the effect that they had come to town beggars, and were now, thanks to pilfering of public funds, well on the way to become millionaires.

The second Christmas tourist season of the Grand Trunk Pacific will shortly be inaugurated when a through train will be run from Edmonton to Portland, Me., to connect with the White Star line, Leamington, which sails on December 7th. On this train will be standard as well as tourist sleeping cars, dining cars and every convenience of modern travel.

WILSON GOT 6,156, 748 VOTES.

Taft and Roosevelt Had 1,100,000 Over Him.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 29.--The popular vote for president in the election of 1912 shows that Wilson polled throughout the country a total of 6,156,748 votes; Roosevelt, 3,328,146; and Taft, 3,376,422. The socialist vote for Debs was 673,783, with the socialist count lacking in seven states. Chafin, the prohibitionist candidate, received 169,644 votes.

The combined vote for Taft and Roosevelt, therefore, exceeded that for Wilson by 1,147,514. Roosevelt led Taft by 561,718.

In 1908 Bryan's popular vote was 6,233,182, and that of Taft 7,637,678. This shows that the democrats lost 226,434 votes, while the republicans and progressives together polled 839,714 less than Taft in 1908.

STOLE A DOOR MAT

JOSEPH FOSTER SENT TO JAIL FOR TWO MONTHS.

Sold Mat at Second-hand Store, and Identified in Police Court--Several Complaints Made About Missing Door Mats Around City.

Convicted on a charge of theft, Joseph Foster was on Friday morning, sentenced by Magistrate Farrell to two months in the common jail. He was arrested on a charge of stealing a door mat, from the home of Mr. J. Daek, Alfred street. He denied the charge, but a door mat, secured at Sugarman's second hand store, Ontario street, was identified by Mr. Daek, as his property, and Mrs. Sugarman identified Foster as the man who sold the mat.

Several complaints have been made to the police about door mats having been stolen, and it would appear as if others besides Foster have been playing the game. Foster has been before the magistrate on a number of times for drunkenness. The police are now endeavoring to get trace of other door mats.

Two other cases were on the docket, the offenders being drunks. As it was their first appearance, the magistrate gave them a chance. One was a stranger in our midst, while the other was a local man, who just happened to fall by the wayside.

DIED FROM EXPOSURE.

Arose in Night, Leaving House and Perished in Snow.

A very sad and distressing death occurred Wednesday morning in the township of Elizabethtown, a short distance northeast of Addison, when Miss Louise Moore, daughter of Fredrick L. Moore, one of the best-known residents of that section, was found dead. The circumstances of the case are that Miss Moore, apparently arose in her sleep, and walked out of the house, and into a field, her body being found by her brother.

Dr. Harter, Athens, was called and found that life was extinct. She was sitting in a nightdress, and had one arm in her hand, the other was held in the cold weather. It is thought that in arising from a sound sleep she went out, and being so scantily clad quickly perished. Great sympathy is shown for the family. She leaves to mourn her loss, besides her father, four brothers and one sister. They are O. L. Moore, Wesley, John and Jasper, and Miss Agnes. She was thirty-five years of age.

TO PREPARE A BY-LAW

Regarding the Alignment of Houses on Streets.

The city engineer, at the meeting of the Board of Works on Thursday afternoon, called the attention of the members to the proper alignment of the houses on the streets, those being constructed monthly. He recommended the preparing of a by-law to regulate this, as is in force in other cities and towns. The board gave him the power, to confer with the solicitor and prepare the by-law defining that any new house built should not be placed near the roadway, than the present one, and that ones being constructed on new streets be kept a certain distance back from the street line.

A communication was received from the North American Smelting company asking for repairs to the wall on River street, and a crossing to be made on Orchard street, these streets being adjacent to their works. The board instructed the engineer to have the work done.

James Hendry, complained about the condition of the wire fence on King street, between Albert and Colton, wood street monthly. The engineer had received similar complaints, and, on motion of Ald. Peters the engineer was instructed to have the owner of the property put it in a safe condition.

POULTRY BUYERS AT NAPANE.

Three Carloads Taken Out--\$25,000 Paid to Date.

About \$25,000 worth of dressed poultry changed hands in Napane, on Thursday, when poultry buyers invaded that town and as high as 25c a pound was paid for turkey. Farmers and poultry growers from all the country surrounding flocked into Napane and the streets were alive with wagons. In front of the agent's office not less than 180 waggons were lined up to wait their turn. One firm paid out \$18,000 and took out of Napane about thirty-six tons of fowl. The three largest buyers were White Packing company, of Brockville, Napane Poultry company, of Jasper, and Gallagher, Holmes & LaFrance, of Winnipeg. An average price of 21c a pound was paid. Chickens sold at 14c and geese at 14c a pound. It is stated that the chickens are all small this year, and this is attributed to the wet weather. The largest sale made by a single person was that of Mrs. Joseph Hawley, who cleared \$377 on her poultry.

Mrs. M. Donohue, Venerable and Much Loved.

The angel of death entered the home of Mrs. Michael Mangon, Atkinson, Ont., and claimed for its victim her mother, Mrs. Margaret Donohue. Not the advanced age of eighty-nine years. She came to visit Mrs. Mangon in July, as was her custom, intending to proceed by way of the Rideau canal to visit at Jones' Falls and Davis' Locks, where her other daughters are staying. After a week's stay she was taken ill, thereby being unable to proceed on her journey of return to her home near Gananoque. She bore her illness with true Christian patience and on Nov. 9th her spirit passed peacefully to its reward.

Mrs. Donohue, whose maiden name was Margaret O'Connell, was born in County Galway, Ireland, in 1823. She was a sister of Rev. D. O'Connell, of Peterboro, and cousin of Rev. Eugene O'Connell, D.D., bishop of Fluvicopolis and Grass Valley. Her husband, William Donohue, of North Lake, predeceased her thirty-one years. She was a woman of many scholarly attainments. She possessed a genial disposition and was loved and respected by all who knew her. A large concourse of friends followed in her funeral procession to St. Ann's church, Brewer's Mills, where a solemn requiem mass was celebrated for the repose of her soul, by Rev. Father Traverser. The remains were then placed in the vault to await future interment. She is survived by four sons: William, of Mount Pleasant, Mich.; Daniel, of Buffalo, N.Y.; Patrick and Michael J., at home; and three daughters, Mrs. Thomas Kenny, Jones' Falls; Mrs. James Kenny, Elgin, and Mrs. Michael Mangon, Atkinson, and also twenty-five grandchildren and six or seven great-grandchildren. Her pallbearers were three sons, Patrick, Daniel and Michael, and two sons-in-law, Thomas and James Kersey, and her nephew, Daniel O'Connell.
