MEETINGS OF FARMERS

TO HEAR ADDRESSES ON AGRICULTURAL TOPICS.

First Institute Meeting of County at Hartington on Thursday—Speakers: W. W. C. Shearer and J. T. Taggart.

The Farmers' Institute meetings of Frontenac county were opened on Thursday afternoon at Hartington. Mr. Truesdale was called to the chair and made a few remarks as to the benefits to be derived and the knowledge to be gained by the farmers who attend these sessions. He introduced W. C. Shearer, of Bright, Oxford county, who, he understood, came from one of the best cheese producing sections of Western Ontario. Mr. Shearer is president of one of the largest co-operative cheese factories, where the whey is all pasteurized and sent home to the patrons (sweet daily) to be fed there to hogs and calves. His factory produced 250 tons of cheese during the season of 1912, and from this 2,750 tons of whey were received by the patrons and hundreds of hogs were fattened and sold as a result.

Mr. Shearer took for his subject "The Breeding and Feeding of Bacon Hogs For Profit." The audience soon found that he was thoroughly master of his subject. He told them some of the good points to be observed in choosing a good sow, such as length, good width, plenty of silky hair, and from twelve to fourteen teats. He emphasized the benefits to be derived from allowing the young pigs to suckle until eight weeks old. After weaning he esterated the made pigs and looked in their mouths for "black teeth," which were sometimes found and nipped off with a pair of small pinchers. He explained the most progressive feeders of his district were now only giving two feeds daily instead of three as formerly. He explained how the hog's digestion worked and showed how so much more profit accrued from a full feed morning and night and entirely saving the noon feed. He advocated assorting the pigs, placing all pigs of equal weight together in one pen, maintaining that they fed more evenly, looked fatter and sold better, as that system set no enils.

J. G. Taggart, B.S.A., of Snydenham, district representative for Frontenac county, was next introduced and took for his subject "Alfalfa," and he advocated a dry soil, clean and rich and would sow at least twenty pounds of seed per acre, with about a bushel of barley, two as a nurse crop. He told his audience to take two cuttings per season and to leave the third cutting to die and protect the roots from severe frost. He also said it was well to inoculate the seed with a culture, which could be procured from the Agricultural College at Guelph.

Another session was held at eight o'clock in the school house. A much larger audience was present to hear the speakers than during the afternoon. Mr. Taggart spoke along the lines of co-operation for the farmer, and delivered a splendid convincing address. Mr. Shearer gave a great many excellent pointers on "Successful Agriculture." The meeting was brought to a close by votes of thanks to the school trustees for the use of the schoolhouse.

DEATH AT SYDENHAM

Of Charles Ruttan on November 21st, Aged Eighty-one. Born at Sydenham, where he resided all his life, Charles Ruttan died at his home, on Thursday, Nov. 21st. He was eighty-one years of age and his illness had been of some months' duration. The deceased old gentleman had been one of the prominent residents of the county which had been an active interest in its affairs up to a few years of his death. He was a member and reeve of the township of Loughboro council for a number of years, but retired a couple of years ago. He also represented Loughboro in the county council for about thirty-five years, serving on the important committees. The deceased was a liberal politician, having held the office of clerk of the third division court for thirty-five years, and a subscriber of the Whig all his life. He was a Methodist in religion, and the funeral was conducted by Rev. Mr. Tripp to Sydenham cemetery, last Sunday. He is survived by his widow, who was Miss A. Purdy, of the Bath Road, the couple having celebrated their fiftieth anniversary four years ago. Four children also remain: Dr. F. S. Ruttan, Woodstock; E. G. Ruttan, Sydenham; Mrs. F. Ferguson, Inverary; and Miss A. Ruttan, of Newport, Rhode Island.

MAN AND HIS WIFE

Were Placed on the "Prohibited List" on Friday. On Friday morning License Inspector C. W. Wright added four names to the "prohibited list" and among the number a man and his wife, who were recently before the court for drunkenness. They have a family, and the Children's Aid Society took up the matter, and at first it was thought that the children would have to be taken away from them. The couple repented and asked to be given a chance to do better, stating that they would place themselves on the "prohibited list" and they did. Then the authorities dropped the matter to see how they behaved. The other two placed on the list are also volunteers, one having been on the list before.
