**SOME NEW SECURITIES THAT ARE BEING PUT UP BY ATLANTIC SUGAR REFINERY.**

The Gold Output in Rhodesia—The C.P.R. Compared With the American Roads—Was Money Market Manipulated?

Toronto, Nov. 28.—D. Lorne McGill, in Toronto, arranged with Messrs. Murray, Mather & Company the final details of the issue of securities of the Atlantic Sugar Refinery, Limited, to be offered in Ontario by that firm. The capitalization of the company will be \$1,000,000, consisting of 80,000 preferred stock, and 8,500,000 common stock. The preferred stock will be issued shortly with a bonus of common stock, while the bonds will not be issued until the completion of the plant at St. John, N.B. The refinery will cost over \$2,500,000, and will have a capacity of 2,500 barrels a day.

**Initial Dividend.**

Montreal, Nov. 28.—The Ontario Power company has declared an initial dividend at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent. on its common stock, payable Dec. 2nd, to stock of record Nov. 30th. This is the company from which the Hydro-electric commission obtained its power. It is capitalized at \$8,215,000 in common stock and \$11,272,000 in bonds and debentures.

**Rhodesia Gold Output.**

London, Nov. 28.—The output of gold in Rhodesia, South Africa, for October was 54,666 fine ounces, valued at \$230,672 compared with 54,774 fine ounces, valued at \$230,575 in September.

**C. P. R. Compared With U. S.**

Montreal, Nov. 28.—With the 800,000,000 new stock just issued outstanding, Canadian Pacific will have \$250,000,000 stock, compared with New York Central's \$222,729,000. St. Paul's \$232,000,000, and Atchafalaya's \$256,000,000, points out the New York Post. Because of its higher rate, however, Canadian Pacific's annual dividend requirements will amount to \$26,000,000, against New York Central's \$11,136,000, St. Paul's \$13,900,000, and Atchafalaya's \$15,876,000. With \$453,877,000 stocks outstanding, Pennsylvania has the largest annual dividend requirements, the 6 per cent. in that issue calling for \$27,232,000. Union Pacific must earn \$24,982,000 over fixed charges to pay off its shareholders.

**What They Will Pay.**

New York, Nov. 28.—Messrs. R. B. Lyman & Co., former members of the Consolidated Stock Exchange of New York, who maintained offices in Toronto, Buffalo and New York, and went into liquidation a short time ago, have sent out notices to their creditors that they will pay a dividend of 2 1/2% on the dollar as soon as the claims have been rendered, and will follow this amount with a similar amount one year from the date of the first payment. Toronto brokers and speculators are numbered with the creditors, but the loss in the Canadian city was not very large.

**\$750,000 Brewery Company.**

St. John, N.B., Nov. 28.—It was announced to-day that the reorganization of Ready's Breweries, Limited, of St. John, N.B., is complete. It is understood from reliable sources that this has been effected by interests closely identified with J. M. Robinson & Sons, of St. John, N.B., and Montreal, members of the Montreal Stock Exchange.

As a result of the reorganization and the taking in of additional capital, it is said that a vigorous campaign for the extension of its business will be inaugurated.

The authorized capital of the new company is \$750,000.

**Was Market Manipulated?**

New York, Nov. 28.—That manipulation of the money market to check stock advances is being conducted at present is the assertion made in commission houses now. It is said the banks are not as hard pushed as appears on the surface, although it is noted that losses to the sub-treasury are very large.

**Financial Notes.**

An authority informs the Monetary Times that Canadian municipalities have ready to market \$50,000,000 of municipal debentures. That fact can scarcely be called a tonic for the London market.

The new National Steel Car company, of Hamilton, in which C. H. Caban, Montreal, is interested, have already received orders for 1,500 cars, while the new Nova Scotia Car Works, with which the McCurdy in-

terests are identified, have orders on hand for 2,500 cars.

Strand Frank earnings for the third week in November: 1912, \$1,953,798; 1911, \$951,284; increase, \$1,002,514.

Earnings of the Republic Iron and Steel Co. are running larger than at any time since the improvement in the steel industry began.

The United States Steel Corporation has taken the contract for the erection of the Grand Trunk Pacific terminal at Prince Rupert, B.C.

Since April 1st last there have been listed on the New York curb securities of a par value of \$475,399,500. These include many industrial as well as mining companies, with capitalizations ranging from \$100,000 to \$20,000,000, the latter the United Cigar Stores of America.

**Wolfe Island Death.**

Wolfe Island, Nov. 27.—Oliver Jenkins, owner of the fast pacer mare Syka Direct, has gone to New York to attend the Old Glory horse sale. H. Card has also gone to attend the sale. Born to Mr. and Mrs. William McAdoo, a daughter, Daniel McGlynn and John Lacey are holding a dance in the C. M. B. A. hall on Friday evening.
