MAY HAVE TO GIVE UP

EATING ANOTHER'S CAKE MAY COST \$105,000.

Famous Huber Will Just Unearthed Based on Possibility That Started at Harvest Feast in 1770.

Pittsburg, Nov. 30.—Enmity resulting from a thirteen years' age eating his playmate's cake at a harvest feast in 1770, in Germany, may have cost the old Harmony Society to refund \$105,000 with interest from 1845.

John Rapp and John Huber were friends in Wuertemberg until the cake incident. Rapp founded the Harmony society near here. Huber repudiated the society when his sister, Mrs. Rental and Mrs. Wagner, joined it. The community he gave warning that whatever he might will them must not go to the society but must be held under a separate trust.

When Huber died his fortune was obtained through the courts in France and merged with the society's funds. His will, just found among old papers in the home of Mrs. Sarah Rental of Rochester, Beaver county, was written in Honneur, France, in 1884. It specifically directs that the money left to his sisters go to their heirs and not to the society. The heirs will press their claim in court.

QUEEN'S MEDICAL COLLEGE.

Students Chosen as Delegates to Outside College Functions.

A long needed want at the medical college is being supplied by the faculty. It consists of a series of colored anatomy charts for the dissection room. The charts are about three feet square with enlargements of the different anatomical structures to about five diameters, on heavy cardboard and in several colors.

The Arts-Medicine students are in hot water again, and have just been asked for a bonus of forty-five dollars from the Arts registrar.

The walking stick supplied by Kinross and D'Este as a presentation for the Alma Mater to bestow on the student whose meritorious record stands highest at Queen's, will be contested for shortly by men from the different faculties. The regulations regarding the giving of the cane as a reward of merit are: that the student must be in the first year; that he has never failed at any examination in his college course; that he has played on a first team.

The representative chosen by the students is V. Blake, unanimously elected and one of the best known and most popular men in the medical college.

Invitations have been received by the Aesculapian Society from Laval Toronto and Western colleges for representatives at functions to be held at those colleges. Mr. de Beaupre will represent Queen's Medical Faculty at Laval's annual dinner; Mr. Williams at the Western Medical College of London; and Hugh MacInnon at the Toronto Varsity "At Home" on December 13th.

The Aesculapian society met on Friday afternoon. Seventy-five cents was voted to be paid to the Hotel Dieu for the expense of a window broken by medical students. The programme committee were given permission to expend to the amount of fifty dollars for menus, etc. The programme at the meeting was given by the second year and was heartily accorded to be the best yet. It consisted of violin solo, "The Echemian Girl," by Mr. Waite, assisted by Mr. Paul; piano solo by Mr. Burden and vocal solos by A. Truscald and V. Murray. At the next meeting the honorary president, Dr. James Third, will deliver an address.

Invitations have been issued for the medical dinner of the Aesculapian society to be held on Dec. 9th. Affairs are going very smoothly as the reports of the different committees, connected with it testify. Speakers have been obtained including Dr. Shearer, of Toronto, and Dr. Williamson, of the Toronto News, and the R.C.H.A. orchestra will supply the music.

No. 7 company of the engineering corps held their weekly drill at the armories on Wednesday afternoon. There was a good turnout and the boys look well in their new uniforms. Sergt-Major Books of the R.M.C. instructed them in signalling and other engineering tactics. A class in signalling has been started in connection with the corps.

PITH OF WORLD NEWS.

Lumsden Bros., wholesale grocers, of Hamilton, announce that they will remove to Toronto.

P. C. Coombes, of the Hamilton force, was suspended for thirty days for assaulting a fellow constable.

Dr. Varlow, M.O.B., of Galt, says that twenty-five per cent. of the children of to-day are mentally or physically defective.

The annual report of the Department of Labor notes an upward tendency in wages attended by an increase in the cost of living.

The Dominion Trust Co. has paid \$200,000, or \$7,500 a foot, for property on Main street, Winnipeg, now owned by the Bank of Commerce.

A dirigible balloon has been able to locate the American frigate Philadelphia, which was sunk off Tripoli about 1802, during the Barbary war.

Heber Lane, who disappeared from Ingersoll eight years ago, has been located as an employee on a boat plying between Duluth and Buffalo.

Hamilton Board of Control favors asking the government to suitably recognize Mrs. Fessenden, of that city, founder of the Empire Day movement.

Joseph Davenport, who invested the locomotive cab and pilot and built the first wrought iron bridge in the United States, is dead, at Zoar, Ohio, aged ninety-seven.

George W. Vale, of Waterloo, aged forty-eight, is dead from blood-poisoning, resulting from a scratched finger while at work in a shoe factory. He leaves a widow and seven children.

On the request of the consul-general of the United States at Winnipeg the Washington authorities have asked for a thorough enquiry into the conditions of the construction camps of Foley, Welch and Stewart upon Canadian railway works.

Hon. Mr. Graham has given notice of a motion calling for the original plans and specifications for the construction of the National Transcontinental railway between Quebec and Winnipeg, and for all documents relating to any changes made in them.

The German imperial chancellor refused to take any measures to relieve the meat scarcity, saying prices were high the world over and that it was not desired to expose German agriculture to the competition of imported frozen meat.

Thousands of citizens of Lawrence, Mass., last night, at a series of open air meetings, pledged themselves to support civic government and order to defend the same from "the slanders of her enemies." The meetings were to protest demonstrations of the Industrial Workers of the World.

Grain Growers' Guide.

Grain growers may have noticed pattern designs for ladies' garments which we publish from time to time. These patterns are made from matrices which we secure from New York, as there are none of this kind made in Canada. These matrices are invoiced to us at 50 cents per month, but the customs department in Winnipeg, has insisted on charging us \$4.40 on this 50 cents' worth of material. The duty is a specific one, being half a cent per square inch, though we have finally got it reduced to a quarter of a cent per square inch, or 440 per cent. We do not know of any higher duty in the tariff schedule.
